Miss Rodeo Sansevere Big crowds gather for revamped Rodeo

Ask the eldest of five Sansevere siblings who she takes after more, she likely will say her mother, Mary, one day. And the next day, she may say her father, Bob.

"I feel like I'm a lot of both," chuckled Samantha Sansevere, who spent this past week and weekend representing her hometown and state as the reigning Miss Rodeo Minnesota

Sansevere kicked off her upcoming busy summer schedule as announcer for "Family Fun Night" on Wednesday, June 23 at the Buffalo Rodeo Grounds.

The microphone and spotlight are nothing new for the Sanseveres. Her mother is a former Minnesota Vikings cheerleader. Her father has been in the media spotlight for years as a sports columnist for the Pioneer Press Newspaper in St. Paul, as well as a longtime radio personality for the KQRS Morning Show in the Twin Cities. He's also a current member of the Buffalo-Hanover-Montrose School Board.

Samantha has her own media gig as well, currently working full-time as a Radio Show Host for iHeart Media. She also works as a Morning Show Producer at Twin Cities News Talk.

When Sansevere is not busy doing her day jobs, she spends most of her time working with her mother at Enchanted Hollow Stables, located at their family's ranch in Buffalo Township.

"My mom and I are business partners. Together we run a riding school," Samantha said. "She is the barn owner, and I am the barn manager and head riding instructor. We both teach horseback riding, horse camps, riding classes and trail rides together. I'm a little bias. It's a really wonderful place. Everybody is so supportive.

The cowgirl in Samantha comes from her mom, who grew up on a farm in Wisconsin. Her dad grew up on the Jersey shore.

"He had nothing to do with horses until he met my mom," Samantha said. 'He's been very supportive throughout, and we wouldn't be here today if it wasn't for him."

With things opening up more this summer, **Enchanted Hollow Stables**

has become a busy place. "During our busy summer season, we have over 80-100

riders for a weekly session," Samantha said. "On top of that, we have horse camps that have 12-15 kids riding throughout the weekday. We also have about 20 horses that we use during a lesson program on a regular basis and about 60 horses

in total." Samantha and 14 of her horses and riding students from Enchanted Hollow Stables kicked off the threeday rodeo festivities last Thursday by doing two laps around the arena during the Grand Entry Opening

Ceremonies.

Serving as Miss Rodeo Minnesota is extra special for her, who missed out on last year's rodeo with it being canceled due to Covid. She was the 2020 Miss Buffalo Rodeo Queen, which currently belongs to Leah Andersen, a native of Bemidji and current resi-

without a rodeo. Now, it's really nice to be able to be here for my hometown rodeo. There's a lot that goes into being a rodeo queen that I never thought about."

Travel is the biggest difference. Some of her rodeos she will attend later this summer include stops in Hamel, Isanti and Waconia. Her first rodeo this calendar year was last February

in Rapid City, South Dakota. In December, Samantha will represent Minnesota

at the Miss Rodeo America Pageant in Las Vegas.

Ironically, being a rodeo queen was never on her long-term radar.

"I heard a couple years ago they were looking for a new Miss Buffalo Rodeo, and I just thought it sounded like fun," Samantha said. "That led to me being interested in being a rodeo queen. I really enjoy it. I

The MSHSL has a team and individual portion of the tournament. The top-40 teams from the State Trap Shooting Championships held June 14-22 in Alexandria qualify for the MSHSL state tourney, as do the top-100 individuals with the highest average throughout the five-week regular season.
