# **BUSSWITZ FAMILY RECOGNIZED AS CENTURY FARM**

Brian and Pam Busswitz of rural Westbrook are celebrating their 2021 Century Farm. Brian is the 5th generation and the sixth owner of the family farm.

Ernest and Caroline Cohrs, Brian's great-great grandparents came from Neudorf/Plattdorf Germany in 1878 along with their son Ernst (Ernest). They settled in Dovary township. Son Ernest purchased the farm from the railroad in 1894, thus beginning a family odyssey that continues to this day.

After farming it for eighteen years, Ernest passed the land down to his son Henry Cohrs and his wife Christine, who farmed it for sixteen years. Henry passed the farm to his daughter Christine and her husband, Leander Busswitz. Leander and Christine farmed it for fifty years. Leander then passed it to Arlen Busswitz who farmed it for 4 years before passing it to Bri-

Busswitz. After fifteen years on the farm, Marvin and LaDonna moved into Westbrook in 1997 and passed it on to Brian, who has owned and operated the farm for 24 years. Before Marvin and LaDonna moved to the family farm, they lived approximately a mile away, and Brian and his brother kept their 4-H project animals in the barns on the "home

Over its over 100 years of existence, many different crops and animals have been part of the lifeblood of the farm. At present, Brian raises corn and soybeans. Some of the family had cattle, Marvin had dairy cows, Arlen had horses and a donkey among other animals. Brian's grandmother Christine (Teenie) Busswitz raised chickens, ducks, peacocks and other birds when she lived on the farm. She moved off of the farm about 1982, having lived there well over 50 years.

Brian reminisced about Teenie, and said that she was the "personality of the family." Among the family an's parents Marvin and LaDonna history papers they had on the din-

## **Walnut Grove City Council** seeking a full-time police officer

WALNUT GROVE — City Clerk Paula McGarvey told the council she has written an ad, seeking candidates for the police officer position. The position became open when former officer Nicole Knakmuhs resigned last month as Walnut Grove's police officer.

She wrote a job description for candidates to study. She has contacted several community colleges in regards to finding candidates that have completed their training. The council discussed things that they might do to attract a person that would fit their community. They talked about having a person from the community that would be able to communicate with a new officer to offer information to help the new officer on how things are done in the community.

The council discussed the possibility of purchasing a property that would be adjacent to a property already owned by the city. They thought if the two parcels were combined it would make the property easier to sell to

someone wanting to put a new home on it. If the city acquires the property they can get assistance from the county to do any demolition or cleanup.

Water and wastewater report:

Kerwin Armitage told the council the sprocket he received for the clarifier at the wastewater facility does not fit. He said they could get it modified for about \$300.00.

Armitage said he has received quotes from two water tower companies. The first quote was from McGuire Iron, for recoating the water tower for \$44,000. The second quote from KLM Water Tower was for \$200,000 which included sand blasting the whole tower. The first quote from McGuire would last for five to seven years. The quote from KLM would last for 30 years.

The council felt that the city couldn't afford spending \$200,000 at this time.
