# Blue Ribbon Beard Bonanza returning to Isanti County Fairgrounds in Cambridge

The event is sponsored by the Minnesota Beard and Mustache Coalition, Isanti County Fair, Level-Up Beard Co., South of the River Facial Hair Club, Bad Jack, Thunder Brothers Brewery and Willow Bridge Center. The Blue Ribbon Beard Bonanza is part of a nonprofit charity organization that fundraises for cancer awareness, said Aaron Berg, organizer and co-host of Blue Ribbon

"Each contestant is also judged on, like, crowd appeal or appearance or their persona when they come up on stage," Berg said. "It's similar to maybe Miss America-type pageant, where there's an interview session and then, 'Tell us about yourself and fancy costumes or outfits.' Or some people just come without it. So there's a whole variety.

"And you can tell in the crowd, who are the serious competitors, and who are the guys that just showed up for the event and heard about it and want to participate," he continued. "So the more professional are the people who've been in multiple contests. You can pick them out of the crowd."

Berg explained that contestants will receive an honest evaluation of their facial hair: its symmetry, length, size, girth,

### **Cambridge woman** killed in crash

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A Cambridge woman was killed in a crash on Highway 65, in Isanti Township, on June 4, at 6:07 p.m.

According to the Minnesota State Patrol, a freightliner semi, driven by Aklilu Alem Gebremichael, 32, of Dallas, was crossing the northbound lanes of Highway 65 at 278th Lane Northeast, when a 2000 Buick Lesabre, driven by Bianca Mae Rogalski, 25, of Cambridge, traveling northbound on Highway 65, struck toward the rear of the freightliner on the driver's side. Rogalski was pronounced deceased at the scene.

Road conditions were reported dry at the time of the incident, and both drivers were wearing their seat belts.

Besides the Minnesota State Patrol, the Isanti County Sheriff's Department, the Isanti Police Department and the Isanti Fire District responded to the scene.

### Motorcyclist killed in Harris

On June 6, at 9:05 p.m., the Chisago County Emergency Communications Center received a report of a motorcycle crash near Jess Avenue and Sunrise Road in Harris.

Upon arriving on scene deputies located the 51- yearold male driver and lone occupant deceased. Initial investigation appears the motorcyclist was traveling west on Sunrise Road near Jess Avenue when it left the roadway and crashed in the ditch. The driver's information is being withheld at this time until next of kin can be notified. Chisago County Sheriff's Office is investigating the crash.

Assisting agencies include North Branch Police Department and Lakes Region EMS.

### Ever Cat Fuels to pay \$300,000 for air quality violations, failing to have required permit

Press release provided by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency

Ever Cat Fuels, LLC, will pay a \$300,000 civil penalty to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) for air quality violations at its biodiesel production facility in Isanti.

After a multi-year investigation, the MPCA determined that Ever Cat Fuels operated without a required air-emissions permit and failed to meet multiple federal requirements.

MPCA staff received a report of a methanol, biodiesel, and waste vegetable oil spill at the Isanti facility.

The company stated that the wastewater generated from recovering the spill was incinerated in a thermal oxidizer at the facility two days after the spill.

The MPCA found that on multiple occasions, the wastes generated from spills at the facility, which would have been classified as hazardous waste, were diluted with water and incinerated.

The MPCA issued an administrative order that required Ever Cat Fuels to:

- Apply for an air emissions permit.
- Conduct air modeling.
- · Comply with national standards regulat-

ing air pollutants and equipment performance in their facility.

- · Submit emission inventory reports for 2009-2018.
- Install temperature monitoring devices and flow indicators on both thermal oxidizers.
- · Submit an operations and maintenance manual for all air pollution control equipment. · Apply for an air emissions permit for its
- pilot plant in Anoka. MPCA rules and regulations are designed

to protect human health and the environment by limiting pollution emissions and discharges from facilities.

When companies do not fully comply with regulatory requirements, the resulting pollution can be harmful to people and the environ-

When calculating penalties, the MPCA takes into account how seriously the violations affected or could have affected the environment, and whether they were first-time or repeat violations.

The agency also attempts to recover the economic benefit the company gained by failing to comply with environmental laws in a timely manner.

What were your feelings on Signing Day? "I'm really excited. I didn't think it was going to be this big, so it was really exciting.


### Larissa Block, track

## Cambridge-Isanti Bluejacket boys ride depth to M8 track title

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Cambridge-Isanti boys track coach Kent Viesselman was ready to celebrate after his team won the Mississippi 8 Championship at North Branch on Wednesday, June 2.

"But our kids were quiet – even though we had just won the conference," Viesselman explained. "One of the boys said to me, 'We wanted to do our best. We expected to win the conference.' I don't think that's being cocky – they were just very confident.

"I thought that this was our best overall team performance. We placed in every event, and that was a big deal. And in many events we placed two or three kids. I told them, 'It's OK to celebrate winning a conference title.' And they did."

The Bluejackets finished with 187.5 points, outpacing second-place Monticello by more than 34 points. But C-I won only three field events on the way to the title, which is a testament to the team's depth.

"We coach every kid, so that gives us depth," Viesselman said. "And it also means we're less likely to have a bad performance, because even if one kid does not do well, we will absorb that result and keep scoring points."

Senior Jacob Ziebarth cleared 6-4 to win the high jump, while senior Ethan Hintermeister cleared 14-8 to lead a 1-2-3 finish in the pole vault along with freshmen Riley and Micah Wilson.

Another big effort for Cambridge-Isanti came in the discus, where seniors Trent Beseth and Luke Olson took the top two spots. Both landed big throws that exceeded their seed distances by a wide margin, with Beseth covering 140-10 and Olsen throwing the discus 138-4.

And the Bluejackets took second and third in the long jump behind junior Devin Larson (21-6.5) and Riley Wilson (20-5.25).

That depth was a C-I hallmark throughout the meet. For example, in the 800 junior Zander Gallmeier was second (2:06.42), while senior Austin Otier was fourth (2:09.26) and junior Joshua Provost was eighth (2:11.64). The 14 points that trio provided was more than any other school mustered in that event.

That also happened in the 110 high hurdles thanks to senior Andrew Head in second place (17.24), Riley Wilson in third (17.24) and freshman Blake Viesselman in fifth (18.29) for 18 points. That trio also took 3-5-7 in the 300 hurdles for 12 points despite not finishing better than third place (Head with a time of 42.95).

"In the field events and the hurdles, we really had some outstanding results," Kent Viesselman said. "Having your third person place means they performed well. It was such a great team effort."

And Cambridge-Isanti's depth also shined in the four relays, as the Bluejackets took second place in all four for 32 more points.

### C-I girls place second at meet

The Cambridge-Isanti girls track team trailed only Monticello in the Mississippi 8 championship, with the Magic posting 188.5 points while the Bluejackets had 164

"It wasn't like we were blown out – it was only 18 points," interim coach Linda Droubie said. "Monticel-

lo is a very strong team, so our girls can be proud that they finished within 18 points of them."

Cambridge-Isanti scored the bulk of its points in the sprints and the field events. Sophomore Anika Larson led a 1-2-5 finish for the Bluejackets in the 200, winning the event with a 26.84 clocking. Junior Aiyana Knight was close behind with a time of 27.00, while junior Lacy Leverty was fifth at 28.50.

Knight won the 400 with a time of 1:00.01, while freshman Annie Hennen placed third with a 1:05.86 clocking.

Cambridge-Isanti also had an impressive showing in the field events, including a 1-2-5 finish in the high jump, with sophomore Ada Schlenker winning after clearing 5-0. Senior Emily Jones (4-10) was second and junior Ashley Ladd (4-8) was fifth.

Senior Larissa Block won the long jump with a 17-4 leap, while senior Kaylee Clement was third (16-7.5). Jones won the triple jump with a leap of 34-4.5, while Schlenker (32-7.5) was fourth.

Leverty (13.61) and Clement (13.731) took 2-4 in the 100, while sophomore Kendyl Izzo placed second in the 800 with a 2:36.58 clocking. Seventh grader McKenna Sjobert took third in the 3,200 (12:37.14) and was sixth in the 1,600 (5:44.81).

Droubie said she hopes her team learned some lessons about competing in a top tier meet.

"We had some athletes who were younger, and they struggled a little bit," she said. "They didn't get a chance to compete last year, so this was probably their first big meet.

"In cross country we had a couple of runners who were disappointed in how they ran in the league meet, but they totally rebounded at sections. If you are going to have a 'tough' meet, would you prefer to have it at the conference meet or at sections? Clearly at conference.

"We'll come back strong and learn from this."

### North Branch finishes third in girls meet, sixth in boys

North Branch had a number of top performances at the Mississippi 8 Championship meet it hosted, and those strong efforts lifted the girls into third place with 89 points while the boys took sixth with 47.5 points.

On the girls side, senior Paige Bauer won the pole vault by clearing 11-6, placed second in the long jump with a best leap of 16-8.5, and took third in the high jump by clearing 4-10. A pair of seventh graders, Ella Dick and Brooke Giese, finished second and fourth for the Vikings in the pole vault.

Senior Abby Schulte placed second in the shot put with a best throw of 33-0, while senior Alexis Torres took fifth in the discus with a toss of 99-8. Eighth grader Ella Kuhlman took third in the 300 hurdles (50.11), while fellow eighth grader Sophia Benedict placed fourth in the 400 (1:06.51).

On the boys side, senior Harrison Toussaint was the top performer for the Vikings. He won the 110 hurdles with a time of 16.11, and his 41.73 clocking of the 300 hurdles earned him the top spot in that race as well.

Junior Justin Ramos took second in the triple jump (41-9) and freshman Carson Weber claimed seventh (38-1.5), while junior Logan Murphy tied for sixth in the high jump (5-8).

### **Unique True Team meet for C-I Girls**

The Cambridge-Isanti girls finished 11 of 12 teams in the Class 3A State True Team meet, which was held virtually by teams using results from a previous meet. The Bluejackets used results from a meet at Big Lake from two weeks ago.

The virtual nature of the event did not take into account discrepancies in weather, meanwhile the Bluejackets ran on a windy day in Big Lake while other teams did not face the exact same condition. Also, star sprinter Aiyana Knight did not run at Big Lake because of injury.

"It was a tremendous accomplishment for the girls to make it to True Team State," Droubie said. # **Sports**Braham baseball advances to winners' bracket title game

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The Braham baseball team has made a magical run through the winners bracket of the Class A Section 5 tournament.

The Bombers, the No. 2 seed in the East bracket, opened tournament play with a 6-1 victory over East Central on Tuesday, June 1, then knocked off Onamia by a 3-1 score the next day.

That lifted Braham into the winners bracket semifinals and a contest on Friday, June 4, against No. 4 seed Ogilvie, which had upset top-seeded Hinckley-Finlayson in the previous round. The Bombers prevailed by a 9-1 margin, setting the stage for a contest against Sebeka, the top seed from the West bracket, on Monday, June 7, that was not completed at press time.

"Pitching and defense have obviously been a big part of our success," Braham coach Aitor Leniz said. "The East Central game was 1-1 into the bottom of the sixth because Jonah Johnson pitched great, and we found a way to score some late runs and win.

"Hayden Lee pitched very well against Onamia, and Caleb Schusted pitched well against Ogilvie. Defensively we made almost all of the plays behind them, and we started to hit the ball better against Ogilvie on Friday to score a few runs and give ourselves some breathing room.'

If Braham won against Sebeka, the Bombers advanced directly to the championship on Thursday, June 10, at Pierz starting at 4:30 p.m. If they lost, they dropped to the consolation bracket, where they could advance to Thursday's championship game with a win on Tuesday, June 8, against an opponent that was not determined at press time.

Cambridge-Isanti faced an uphill battle as the No. 8 seed in the Class 4A Section 7 tournament. The Bluejackets dropped a 12-1 decision to top-seeded Andover on Wednesday, June 2, then were eliminated with an 18-4 loss to Anoka the following day.

North Branch dug itself a hole by losing its first game in the Class 3A Section 7 tournament, but the Vikings remain alive thanks to three straight wins in the consolation bracket.
