Bluejackets send 3 individuals to state gymnastics

For the past few years, the Cambridge-Isanti gymnastics team has carried a burden into the Class 2A Section 7 meet.

The Bluejackets had claimed the team section title in each of the past 11 years. And C-I had advanced to the state tournament in 20 of the past 23 seasons, as well as 30 times since 1982 – more than any other Class 2A school.

As a result, the expectation of another state team berth may have felt like an added weight on the team's shoulders.

But this year Cambridge-Isanti's best team score was well behind those of both Anoka and Forest Lake. That is why coach Wendy Rooney and her gymnasts entered this year's meet, which

was hosted by Forest Lake on Friday, March 19, with a different attitude.

"Usually when we enter the section tournament, there's a lot of pressure on us to extend the streak," Rooney said. "We knew we weren't the top-ranked team coming into the meet, so not having the pressure of being No. 1 allowed us to relax and to have fun. Our goal was to have our best meet of the year."

In that sense it was mission accomplished for the Bluejackets, who posted a team score of 143.850, a mark that was a full point higher than the team's previous best. Unfortunately that score was not enough to advance the team to the state meet, as Forest Lake won with a 145.825 team

Four seniors from different high schools united in support of Zach Stoltz, an admired Pine City Elementary School teacher and coach.

The seniors' fundraising and support initiative began when they learned Stoltz recently had to undergo open-heart surgery and now is recovering.

The seniors involved include Jared Carpenter and Lydia Adams of Pine City High School, and Taylor Anderson and EllieMae White of Rush City High School. They produced red shirts with "Hearts for Stoltz" imprinted on the front, and "Two Teachers," "Two Schools," and "One

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Community" written on the back.

"So I knew Stoltz from sixth grade as a teacher, and I also had him as a football coach when I was in seventh, eighth and ninth grade," Carpenter said. "So that's kind of along the lines, why I was kind of brought into this, because he's helped me through a lot through football, school and everything like that. So he's a huge part to me, too."

The reason for the two school communities coming together is because Stoltz is married to Rush City High School teacher and coach Erika Matzke Stoltz. About two years ago, Matzke-Stoltz was diagnosed with breast cancer and underwent treatment.

score while Anoka was second with a 144.875 mark.

Cambridge-Isanti tied Forest Lake for the high team score on the uneven parallel bars with a 35.250 mark, and it placed second to Anoka on the balance beam with a 35.625 score.

In a pleasant surprise, sophomore Alison Barber led the Bluejackets with a fifth-place finish in the all-around with a 36.100 mark, while fellow sophomore Laci Lorinser was sixth at 36.025. Barber placed second the beam with a 9.375, the highest individual event finish for the Bluejackets in the meet.

"It was easily Alison's best meet of the year," Rooney said. "She competed with a new vault today, and she stuck both landings. It was the best beam routine she has had all season - she really stepped up.'

Junior Laci Leverty was third on the bars (9.200) while Lorinser was fourth (8.975) and Barber tied for sixth (8.800) in that event. Leverty also finished fourth in vault (9.475) and floor exercise (9.500).

While the team finish at section may not have been what Cambridge-Isanti had hoped for, the team's high score, combined with a Mississippi 8 conference title, made for what Rooney judged to be another successful season.

"There were so many unknowns, it would have been easy for this team to be unfocused and not motivated," said Rooney, who was voted Section 7 coach of the year. "But these girls really pushed themselves, and we made a lot of im-

Esget, an eighth grader, placed second in the all-around competition at the Class A Section 7 meet hosted by Big Lake. Esget's 36.525 score in the allaround included a first-place effort on the bars (9.025) and a third on balance beam (9.075).

Meanwhile Bauer, a senior, won the vault with a 9.425 score. Isackson-Rod, a senior, will compete on two events in the state competition: She placed fourth on the bars (8.6) and tied for third on the floor (9.3).

All three will perform in the morning session, which begins at 11:30 a.m.

The Vikings finished third in the team competition with 135.425 points, while the Rush City Flamingos placed seventh with 127.600 points. Defending state champ Big Lake won the team title with

"Like this is beyond generous," Matzke-Stoltz continued, adding that during their illnesses she and her husband couldn't imagine not being able to teach anymore. "This is our calling, and for you guys to be so thoughtful to think of us in our time of need ... as young adults ... this is going to take you so far in life."

Braham, Rush City win openers before bowing out of section tournament

Braham boys basketball coach Jeff Eklund watched his team miss a couple of key shots in the waning moments of its Class A Section 5 first-round contest against Hinckley-Finlayson on Thursday, March 18.

But he was confident his team could get the basket it needed to force overtime against the Jaguars when he called timeout despite his team trailing by 2 points and just 19.3 seconds on the clock.

"We had missed some easy shots," Eklund admitted. "We have some guys who can get to the rim, so we decided to spread the floor and attack the basket. Caleb [Schusted] likes the moment, and he was able to knock down the shot."

Schusted, a senior, drained a short jumper in the lane with less than five seconds left to force overtime. Then the Bombers dominated the extra session, outscoring the Jaguars 16-6 to claim a 74-62 victory.

Schusted was just one of the stars for the Bombers, finishing with 14 points. Several of the team's leaders were unlikely heroes: For example, junior Jonah Johnson scored 15 of his team-leading 18 points after halftime to key his team's comeback.

"Jonah is a big, strong kids who's a phenomenal athlete," Eklund said. "In the second half he decided he was going to be more physical than anyone else on the floor, and you could see him impose his will on people.

Another emerging hero was junior Mac Nelson, who was asked to play extended minutes as several teammates fought through foul trouble. Nelson contributed 11 points, including a 3 early in overtime that helped his team take command of the contest.

There have been games where Mac Nelson hasn't played a lot of minutes," Eklund said. "Because of foul trouble, and because of the way he played late in the season, he played some huge minutes for us – and he made a huge 3-point shot in overtime. He earned everything he got."

The first half of the contest was tightly contested, with a number of lead changes before Braham forged a small lead late in the period. But Hinckley-Finlayson sank a shot from beyond half court at the buzzer to tie the game at the break, then used that moment to lead for most of the second half.

"We were up by 9 with a few minutes left, but Hinckley is a good team and coach [Dan] Kreft does a good job of

The Cambridge-Isanti girls basketball team opened section play with a familiar opponent

And that was an unsettling feeling.

The Bluejackets, the No. 2 seed in the Class 4A Section 7 tournament, drew seventh-seeded Duluth East in their opening round game on Saturday, March 20. Four days earlier the Greyhounds had traveled to C-I and claimed a 57-51 victory.

"We've talked all year long about having a laser focus, and Tuesday night, even before tipoff, I didn't like our focus," Cambridge-Isanti coach Jody Ledahl said. "But the three days of practice after that, and in this game, that laser focus was there - especially defensively. Tuesday we may have taken them a little more lightly than we should have. In the rematch, we didn't."

The proof was in the Bluejackets' 60-43 victory in Saturday's section tournament contest.

Ledahl said his team did not change any strategy for the rematch. Instead his team focused on improving its defense after allowing Duluth East to shoot 55% from the field, including 57% on 3-pointers

In the tournament game, Cambridge-Isanti jumped out to a 12-2 lead, and while the Greyhounds did cut the advantage to single digits late in the first period, the Bluejackets eventually enjoyed a 33-20 halftime lead.

"Our defensive communication was good - even from the bench we could hear them talking," Ledahl said. "They knew which kids we could help off and which kids we couldn't, and which kids we would switch off and which kids we wouldn't. We just didn't give them any breathing room.'

C-I never let up in the second half, forcing Duluth East to shoot just 37% from the field and 20% on 3's. Meanwhile the Bluejackets offense had three players score in double digits, led by junior Mikayla Aumer's 22-point, eight-assist performance

Sophomore Evelyn Wiltrout finished with 11 points and eight rebounds, while junior Aiyana Knight also scored 11 points.

Cambridge-Isanti faced sixth-seeded Coon Rapids in the semifinals on Tuesday, March 23, in a contest that was not completed at press time. If the Bluejackets won that contest, they will advance to section championship against either Forest Lake or Andover on Thursday, March 25.

"The season came to an abrupt end, but the memories will last forever," coach Jarad Ziebarth said. "I wish to thank the players for their time and dedication to improving over the offseason. I especially would like to thank the seniors for a very special year.

"Because of a lack of numbers in the grades above them, many of these seniors were thrown into varsity roles prematurely and have taken their share of bumps and bruises throughout the years. This group paved the way for the players behind them to enjoy a JV and varsity team for many years to come. They are a great bunch of kids that will be missed."

Edblad earns state wrestling berth for C-I

To be clear, Cambridge-Isanti wrestling coach Neil Jennissen is no fan of COVID-19

'COVID-19 is a really tough disease that has caused a lot of grief and a lot of misery for a lot of people," Jennissen said.

It also delayed the start of the high school wrestling season, and it caused the MSHSL to create a condensed regular season as well as a new format to advance to the state tournament.

That format change involved advancing each section's top four wrestlers in every weight class into a "State Prelim," which brought two sections together to determine an "Elite Eight" for next week's state tournament.

Because the Class 3A meet, which was held at Coon Rapids on Saturday, March 20, was called the State Prelims, it meant that technically the Bluejackets advanced 10 wrestlers to the state meet.

"I guess it's kind of a COVID gift to say 10 of our kids are going to wrestle in the State Prelims," Jennissen said. "We were not seeded to get 10, so I would say in several cases we 'wrestled above our seed,' which is the goal. That means the kids peaked at the right time and wrestled well."

The Bluejackets will be represented

"Leo wrestled a really strong tournament," Jennissen said. "He beat Parker Lyden for the third time this year, and it's hard to beat a good wrestlers like Lyden imba in a "true second" match and suf-

by one wrestler at the state meet, fresh-three times in a row. But Leo brought the offense, and he never really allowed Parker to do what he wanted to do."

Sophomore Treytin Byers came very close to joining Edblad at state. Byers lost his first-round match at 160 by a narrow 7-6 score, then won three straight matches to earn third place. Since he had not wrestled Elijah Madimba, who lost in the championship, Byers faced Madfered a narrow 3-2 loss.

"I thought Treytin put together some really strong matches," Jennissen said. "In the true second match I thought he had a takedown, but he didn't get it - and lost 3-2. If he gets those points, perhaps his opponent tries to force things and maybe makes a mistake.

"But I thought Treytin really wrestled well in that upper weight class after wrestling at 138 last year. He was an eyelash away from making the final eight, and he put together a good tournament.'

Senior Andrew Stickney ended up fourth at 195 after rebounding from a first-round loss by posting two straight wins before losing in the consolation final by a narrow 3-2 margin.

"Andrew is only in his third year of wrestling, so it was nice to see him prove he belonged up there with the big boys," Jennissen said. "He's come a long way in a short amount of time.'

Jennissen also praised senior Wyatt Wothe, who won one of his three matches at 152 and proved to be a team leader on and off the mat.

"His weight class was pretty stacked, and I thought he wrestled well," Jennissen said of Wothe.

And senior Logan Lindquist wrestled eventual champ Spencer Johnson of Sartell-St. Stephen in a tough match at 120,

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a result that was Johnson's closest decision in the tournament.
