Lumberjacks teams spark as seasons end

Girls lose to rival; Moose Lake hits Mirage buzzsaw

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Both the Cloquet-Esko-Carlton and Moose Lake Area girls hockey teams bowed out of the Section 7A hockey tournament Thursday night.

The Lumberjacks were chopped down by the Hilltoppers and the Rebels were beaten 10-1 by No. 1 seed Proctor/Hermantown.

Against Duluth Marshall, the Lumberjacks were dead-even and scoreless through the first 10 minutes of the first period, but a goal at 10:13 by Emelia McGiffert would be the only goal of the period and it gave the Hilltoppers a 1-0 lead.

Any chance of a comeback in the second period was thwarted quickly by the Hilltoppers, who picked up a goal just 1:56 into the period and another before the 5-minute mark of the second period, which put CEC down 3-0. Katrina Thoreson notched the first goal of the second period and Meredith Boettcher added the second goal of the period for the Hilltoppers.

"After their third goal we took a timeout to try and regroup and to try and gather our composure," said CEC coach Courtney Olin. "I was proud of how we bounced back and continued to battle the rest of the game, even when we were losing on the scoreboard."



The final goal of the game came with just 18 seconds remaining when Maren Friday shot the puck into an empty net, making the final 4-0.

"Marshall is very quick and Maren Friday is an outstanding defenseman with poise and that was evident in our game," Olin said

CEC ends the season with a 9-8 record.

The Lumberjacks lose four seniors: Camden Pollard, Keelee Grashorn, Lily Hanson and Lauren Sertich.

"It was the most challenging season I've had as a coach between injuries, illness and all of the Covid setbacks," Olin said. "Through all the adversity, our team continued to work hard and have a great attitude."

Rebels run out of steam


Thursday night was also not kind to the Moose Lake Area Rebels, who dropped a 10-1 decision to a very good Proctor/Hermantown squad that is undefeated and now 18-0 on the

"We knew going into the game that it was going to be a battle," said Rebels coach Reilly Fawcett. "I thought we played a great first period. We kept them outside, won battles and were strong in front of our net."

After Macy Sieger scored at

6:27 to give the Mirage a 1-0 lead, the Rebels responded with a goal of their own from Julia Jusczak at 14:58 with the assist going to Mackenzie Hoffman. That seemed to breathe life into the Rebels who were outshot 26-10 in the period. That would all end in the second period when the Mirage scored eight straight goals.

"We expended a lot of energy in that first period and we just came out flat in the second period," said Fawcett. "The Mirage took advantage of their opportunities and executed on them. I tried to keep our team motivated, but it's never easy coming back from one goal after another."

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After opening the Section 7AA hockey tournament with a 2-0 home win over Duluth Marshall, the Cloquet-Esko-Carlton boys team was bounced from the tournament Saturday afternoon by a 4-0 score at the hands of Grand

The Lumberjacks struggled to start the game and were outshot 13-3 in the opening period, but somehow they kept the game scoreless at that point.

"We had a good game plan of getting out into the neutral zone to create some offense," said CEC coach Shea Walters. "They contained us well. Most of their shots in the first period were from the outside and were able to be seen by our goalie Zach Tyman."

Things changed dramatically in the second period when the Thunderhawks opened things up by scoring three goals. Just 1:58 into the second period, Hunter Bischoff tallied the only goal Grand Rapids would need, on assists from John Bonner and Braeden Holcomb. At 10:12 it was Holcomb adding an even strength tally on assists from Jack Peart and Sam Sterle. Exactly six minutes later, the Thunderhawks went ahead 3-0 when Joey

"We had several opportunities on power plays to generate momentum, but we just struggled to produce anything," Walters said. "Rapids was able to capitalize on some in-zone play. Again, many shots were from the perimeter. They were able to sneak in guys backdoor and able to find them. Our breakdowns in the defensive zone led to the three goals."

The final goal of the game was scored by Peart on an empty net, with Tyman on the bench for an extra attacker.

"Give credit where credit is due. Top to bottom, those Rapids players can skate and play," said Walters. "They moved the puck well, controlled the pace of play, and capitalized on their opportunities. They have a good team, but our failure to execute helped them establish their game."

The Lumberjacks finished the season with an 11-8-1 record and will lose eight seniors to graduation

"We will lose a fantastic group of seniors this year," Walters said. "They were a great group that I am proud of, and made it very enjoyable to come to the rink every day."

In an odd twist of fate, the Cloquet boys basketball team played Hermantown in their final regular season game on Wednesday and then had to turn around and face the Hawks again on Saturday in the Section 7AAA quarterfinals.

In both cases, the Lumberjacks came away with a win.

After taking a 24-point win on Wednesday in the regular season, the Lumberjacks cruised to another win over the Hawks on Saturday — this time by a 79-59

A big key to the win was Cloquet causing the Hawks to turn the ball over 33 times while turning it over only 15 times themselves. In all, the 'Jacks had a 29-9 advantage in scoring off of turnovers.

"I wasn't really surprised, but I wouldn't have been surprised by a close game either," said head coach Steve Battaglia. "They've got young talent that is dangerous, but we've got an old team that has been playing well."

Adam Schneider and Conner Barney led the Jacks with 20 and 19 points, respectively. Dylan Heehn also had a big night with 15 points for Cloquet. Alec Turnbull added nine points, while Caleb Hanson and Jack Sorenson scored five each. Tyler Issendorf recorded four points and Jordan Diver had a pair of points.

"He's a heck of a player – scores, can rebound, physical defender – he'll be one of the best players in the section next year."

After starting the season facing a lot of tough teams, the Lumberjacks finished by winning nine out of their last 12 games.

"We ended up winning the Lake Superior Conference, which is no small task when you consider Superior, Hermantown, and Grand Rapids all are powerhouse programs in our conference," Battaglia said.

Race turnout has grown from the initial turnout of two people three years ago, with more than 50 participants registering for this year's races.

Eighteen people signed up for the adventure run. The top finisher was Barry Fischer in 1:26:57, followed by David Sunnarborg in 1:29;02 and Sue Ulsby in 1:31:51, the top woman

Twenty-three people raced in the 15K bike race, making three rounds of the new bike trails through the park. Tom Miller took first place in 55:54, followed by

Travis Jones in 59:39 and Beth Freymiller in 1:02:19.

Freymiller also won the family-friendly 5K race (run on the trails), finishing in 30:44. She was followed by Elizabeth Deluca in 37:55 and Sandra Benney in 40 minutes even.

"We had the luckiest weather that we could have ever had: crisp enough to solidify the snow but warm enough so people were comfortable," Krohn said. "If we had planned it even one day later, it would have been a mess with much warmer temperatures. We could not have asked for a more perfect March day."
