NRHEG bounces back in consolation round

After a tough 11-0 loss to Le Sueur-Henderson sent the NRHEG softball team to the consolation bracket of the double-elimination section tournament, the Panthers bounced back and advanced to the consolation semifinals with a 7-1 win over the Maple River Eagles on Saturday, June 5.

Sidney Schultz got it started with a single and then got into scoring position by stealing second base on the next pitch. Sophie Stork then drove Schultz with an RBI double. Grace Tufte followed with a single, which drove in Stork.

NRHEG added two more runs in the second inning and one in the fourth to give itself a 5-0 lead before Maple River scored its lone run.

Head Softball Coach Wendy Schultz said the Panthers as a team hit much better than they did against Le Sueur-Hender-

Faith Nielsen had the biggest hit of the game with a triple and Stork and Knudson each hit a double.

In addition to their strong offense, she was also proud of how NRHEG's defense played.

"The girls had many balls hit to them defensively and they made the plays. I'm so proud of the way they played in the oppressive heat conditions," Schultz said.

On the mound, Stork was named the winning pitcher. She tallied four strikeouts, one walk, gave up seven hits and just one earned run.

Since the Panthers showcased strong hitting, fielding and pitching, Schultz called it a complete team win.

By beating Maple River, NRHEG advanced to the consolation semifinals where it'll face Lake Crystal-Wellcome Memorial (LCWM), which boasts a 20-2 record.

The boys team won its quarterfinal game against Northfield in thrilling fashion when Flecther Schulz scored in the third overtime to give the Huskies a 10-9 win. The Huskies advanced to the semifinals where they faced the top-seeded Lakeville North Panthers. The Panthers proved why they're seeded so highly by cruising to a 20-6 win.

Meanwhile, the girls team faced a familiar foe, the Century Panthers, in the quarterfinals. The Huskies beat the Panthers 5-2 in April, but lost 5-4 in May so the playoff matchup represented the rubber match and Century came out on top 11-10 after Annie Moran's shot at the buzzer was just wide of the net.

Against Northfield, the Huskies took a 2-1 lead after Caleb Belting and Wyatt Oldefendt each scored in the first quarter, but the Raiders responded with back-to-back goals and took a 3-2 lead into the second quarter.
