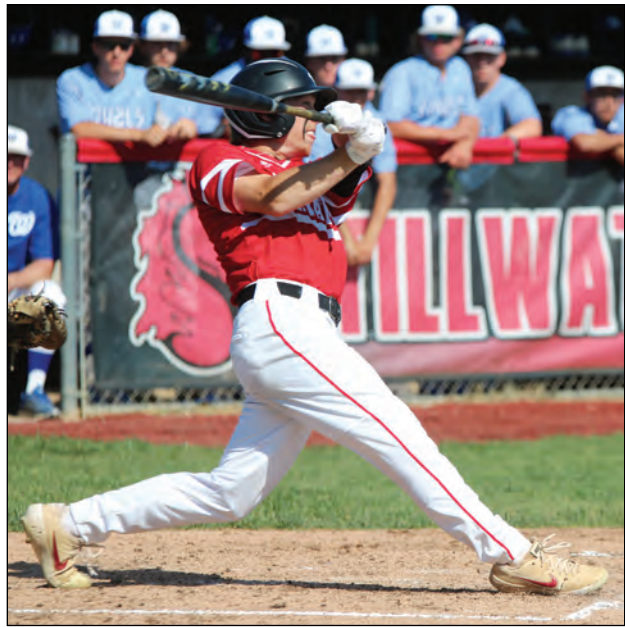

Stillwater wraps up third straight section crown

ROSEVILLE — It was a largely drama-free Section 4AAAA tournament for the Stillwater baseball team, which notched another shut-out while advancing to state for the third season in a row.

The top-seeded Ponies, who improved to 20-4, blanked Cretin-Derham Hall 5-0 in the section championship game on Wednesday, June 9 at Northwestern University. It was the third shutout in four games for Stillwater, which outscored its section opponents by a combined 34-3.

The Ponies will face an opponent to be determined in the state quarterfinals on Tuesday, June 15 at Chaska Athletic Park. The semifinals are scheduled for June 16. Stillwater is one of three Suburban East Conference teams to qualify for state as Park prevailed in Section 3AAAA and Mounds View advanced out of Section 5AAAA.

Gavin Zurn was sharp on the

ground for the Ponies, allowing just two hits and striking out eight in the complete game. He did not walk a batter.

“He didn’t allow anybody to third base and really didn’t have much pressure,” Stillwater coach Mike Parker said. “He didn’t walk anybody and his outing was really good, maybe his best outing of the year. When it’s warm out, he throws a little bit harder and he had really good velocity and that set up his curveball.”

Zurn, a North Dakota State University recruit, threw 62 of his 92 pitches for strikes and the Ponies played error-less defense behind him.

“The defense was super strong again,” Parker said. “Our fielders continue to play outstanding defense. All of our infielders, (Jack) Wallace, (Gavin) Madison, (Ian) Hanlon and (Alex) Ritzer all made really nice plays for us.”

Coming out of the losers bracket, the fourth-seeded Raiders (11-15)

would have needed to defeat Stillwater twice on Wednesday to capture the section title and advance to state for the first time since 2007.

“We didn’t want to play a second one,” Parker said. “We had depth and guys who were ready to play a different lineup in the second game, so that was a little bit of an advantage if we needed, but we looked at that first game as the championship game and were willing to use whoever we needed to win that game.”

Cretin-Derham Hall’s odds grew longer after the Ponies jumped in front 1-0 in the bottom of the first on a ground-out by Zurn. Alex Ritzer singled and Kade Peloquin doubled to put runners on second and third for Zurn.

Then in the third, Stillwater pushed two more runs across on two-out single up the middle by Casey Venske.

“That was a really big two-out hit,” Parker said.

Delayed destiny for Ponies

Stillwater upends Zephyrs to earn first-ever trip to state tournament

OAK PARK HEIGHTS — The Stillwater boys lacrosse team has been playing with purpose all season. In the postseason, the Ponies took a slightly different approach before earning a celebration that was more than two years in the making after defeating Mahtomedi 14-5 to capture the Section 4 championship on Wednesday, June 9 at Stillwater Area High School.

It is the first-ever section championship for the Stillwater program, which held its inaugural MSHSL season in 2008. But it wasn’t just this year’s team members involved in the post-game festivities as several of last year’s graduates who had their season canceled due to COVID-19 were on hand to see the Ponies earn that elusive state bid.

“I yelled up to the stands and made sure they came down here,” said senior goaltender Gunner Arens. “I wanted them to be a part of this and made sure to get them in the picture with the trophy because obviously it should have been two years in a row.”

Last year’s team featured 14 returning seniors and high expectations. This year’s cast was playing for them as well, but Stillwater coach Peter Flock didn’t want to add too much pressure to already weighty expectations.

“It feels like it was a long time coming,” Flock said. “Yeah, it’s definitely a little bit of weight off the shoulders, but we kind of as a team started to talk about that we wanted to stop thinking about the years prior. We kind of just had the mindset that it was just another game and it didn’t matter who

the opponent was or what the game was, it was just 48 minutes of a lacrosse game.

“We kind of had that message to honor the alumni, but closer to this game we peeled back from that and realized there’s no curse, it’s just a lacrosse game and that’s all it is. It’s two new teams and what-

ever happened before this with those two teams doesn’t matter.”

Mahtomedi had won the section five of the last six seasons and the Ponies were eliminated by the eventual section champion in 10 of the last 11 seasons.

“It feels amazing,” Arens said. “This whole season we’ve

just preaching on being different and being better than past generations. Especially from last year we had really high hopes coming off the 15-0 season from 2019 and we really thought we should have gone all the way then and Mahtome-

Stillwater cruises to comfortable victory in Section 4AAA

FOREST LAKE — Stillwater banked on the winning formula it has used all season while claiming its third straight title in the Section 4AAA girls golf tournament on Friday, June 4 at Tanners Brook Golf Club.

The Ponies, who are ranked No. 1 in the state by the Minnesota Golf Association, posted a winning total of 350 (330-320) to easily outpace runner-up Mahtomedi (702) and third-place White Bear Lake (763) for the title.

The section championship was the program’s 10th in the past 12 seasons and 18th overall dating back to 1984.

“I would say the girls played well,” Ponies coach Peter Deeg said. “It was not a lot of big numbers and not a lot of birdies, just very consistent golf, which is good. It’s one of the few times we’ve played Tanners without a really big number on the card. There’s still a little room for improvement, but we’re happy with the way it all shook out.”

Stillwater players finished 1-2-3 in the individual standings, led by medalist Caroline Monty with a winning total of 157 (79-78). Caroline’s older sister, Catherine, was medalist at this event in 2018.

Savannah Vincent finished second at 160 (82-78) and Grace Gabriel was next in third place with a score of 162 — boosted by a personal best score of 80 on Day 2 of the tournament.

Stillwater stays unbeaten in section tournament

NORTH ST. PAUL — The Stillwater softball team advanced to the championship round of the Section 4AAAA tournament with a 5-3 win over White Bear Lake in the winners bracket finals on Wednesday, June 9 at McKnight Fields.

It was the 10th straight victory overall for the Ponies top-seeded Ponies (22-1), who are seeking their third straight trip to state. Stillwater was scheduled to face fifth-seeded Woodbury in the finals on Thursday, June 10. The Royals (11-14) would need to defeat Stillwater twice to claim the section title.

“We just hope to play well again (on Thursday) and win another to make it three in a row,” Ponies coach Angie Ryan said.

White Bear Lake jumped in

front 1-0 on a solo home run by Mike Stowe to lead off the game, but pitcher Allison Benning settled in after that until putting a few runners on as the Bears tacked on two more runs in the fifth.

“Allison handled that really well and came right back and struck out the next batter and got the next three outs right in a row,” Ryan said.

Stillwater responded quickly to the home run by loading the bases in the bottom of the first. The Ponies settled for just one run after Morgan Wohlers scored on a passed ball.

The Ponies built a 4-1 lead after scoring three times in the third. Alexis Monty singled to start the inning and Benning followed with a double, though the Ponies had a potential run cut down at the plate. Cat Smetana delivered an RBI single and Keira Murphy drove a base

hit before Taylor Gray’s two-run single provided a three-run cushion.

White Bear Lake didn’t back down and Madie Petersen drove a solo homer in the fifth. Stillwater answered with a run on a base hit from Keira Murphy in the bottom of the fifth to provide the final margin.

Murphy also pitched the final two innings for Stillwater, allowing just one walk and one hit with one strikeout.

It was a much tighter game for the Ponies, who outscored their first two section opponents by a combined 27-0.

“We had to battle and be a little more gritty,” Ryan said. “It was definitely a more full team effort.”

“It was the last opportunity to play on the home field for our two seniors,” Ryan said. “Everybody stepped up definitely played well so that was fun. That was a fun way to go out on their home field.”

Hill-Murray unseats Ponies in section finals

OAK PARK HEIGHTS — Stillwater’s eventual surge came too late as the top-seeded Ponies fell to Hill-Murray in the finals of the Section 4 tournament on Wednesday, June 9 at Stillwater Area High School.

The Pioneers (11-5) scored four straight goals to open the second half and it was too much of a deficit for Stillwater, which had a string of nine straight section titles ended by the team it defeated in the finals two years ago.

Stillwater was riding a five-game winning streak since falling to Eden Prairie on May 18 and outscored its first two section opponents by a combined 32-6, but the Ponies (14-2) never got on track against the Pioneers.

“Honestly we didn’t execute our game plan,” said Ponies coach Ali Crofts said. “That’s what it came down to. We played sloppy and threw the ball away and didn’t capitalize on the possessions we had. We just didn’t take care of the ball.”

Hill-Murray, the No. 3 seed who barely slipped past sixth-seeded Roseville 9-8 in the section quarterfinals, blitzed second-seeded Mahtomedi 17-8 in the semifinals. The Pioneers carried a 3-2 lead into the break against Stillwater and scored two in a row to start the second half.

The Pioneers sat on that 5-2 lead for a long time. Crofts agreed the next goal was going to be critical to whoever scored it and the Pioneers were that team with about 11 minutes re-

maining. Hill-Murray also scored with eight minutes remaining to build a 7-2 lead before Stillwater regrouped for its final push.

Tori Liljegren, Grace Bancroft and Lydia Glass each scored for the Ponies during a two-minute stretch as they climbed

within 7-5 with 5:47 remaining. Stillwater also had opportunities after that, but were unable to take advantage.

“We were frustrated that it had taken us so long to put the ball away, but time was not on our side at that point,” Crofts said. “The

cards were stacked against us because we hadn’t produced the first three quarters of the game. I was happy they played together as a team, they just didn’t do it for a full game.”

The Pioneers eventually racked on an insurance goal with 21 seconds remaining.

“We won the ball off the draw, but they just didn’t translate to goals,” Crofts said. “It was probably one of our worst games. I don’t sugar coat things, that’s not how we wanted the season to end but we have grown a lot from Day 1.”

Glass and Bancroft finished with two goals each for the Ponies.

Hannah Beard, who missed the previous game due to injury, returned to the net for Stillwater and totaled 16 saves. “She had the best game of her career,” Crofts said. “The defensive unit was keeping us in the game, but we just weren’t capitalizing on our possessions. Their goaltender was really good and our attack could not get the ball around her.”

This will mark the first time since 2010 the state tournament will occur without the Ponies competing. Making it more painful for the Ponies is that Stillwater Area High School is the site for this year’s girls and boys state

tournaments next week.

“The theme was really to remember this feeling and never let it happen again,” Crofts said. “They seniors especially, they’ve only known success so I’d consider this a great wake-up call. Everything is not always going to go your way and it’s how you respond that is a life learning lesson, for sure.”

At Oak Park Heights, the Ponies were stingy defensively while cruising to a 10-2 victory over White Bear Lake in the Section 4 semifinals on Friday, June 4 at SAHS.

Stillwater jumped out to a 6-2 halftime lead and pulled away with four unanswered goals in the second half. Tori Liljegren scored two goals to lead a balanced attack for the Ponies, who received at least one point from 11 different players.

“It was a phenomenal team experience in that game,” Ponies coach Ali Crofts said. “Dealing with the heat and adversity, we had 22 of 24 play in that game.”

The game was much closer in the regular sea-

son when these teams met, with the Ponies recording an 11-8 victory on May 19.

Stillwater worked hard to make things as comfortable as possible for eighth-grader Rio Atkinson, who was making her first-ever varsity appearance with regular starting goaltender Hannah Beard sidelined.

“It was a phenomenal team win and protecting the cage with Rio in net and doubling across the field and just swarming their ball carriers, which didn’t allow them to run their game play or attack,” Crofts said. “We really controlled the momentum and played our game against White Bear Lake, which was so satisfying after playing them so close during the regular season. That was a satisfying victory.”

Kaylee Kloos finished with 17 saves in goal for the Bears (9-6).

di beat us then. This year we just waited 765 days to bring it back to them and that's what we did."

Stillwater opened up a 3-1 lead after the first quarter, but the second-seeded Zephyrs (10-6) evened the score at 4-all with a little over three minutes remaining in the first half.

That was when the Ponies seized control while scoring three straight goals before halftime. Sammy Ness started the momentum swing with a goal with about three minutes remaining and Carter Bies and Tommy Lindeberg each scored in the last 35 seconds of the half to build a 7-4 lead.

"That was huge because we had just fought off a two minute penalty and we just allowed one goal," Flock said. "It felt like it was going to stay a back-and-forth game, but we just went on a run and from that point on we never looked back. Without that run, I would have pre-

dicted it would have been a close game the rest of the way, but we just kept going."

"It was the biggest part of the game, honestly," Arens added. "We said coming into this game the biggest part was riding the wave and riding the momentum and that's what we did and put our foot on their neck and ended it."

Stillwater outscored the Zephyrs 7-1 in the second half.

Bies and Tomas Anderson each finished with three goals to lead the Ponies, who also received two goals apiece from Ness and Ben Shockency.

"I would say in this game, both sides of the field showed up and played really big," Flock said. "We've had games where the offense has played well and the defense has struggled, but most of the time it's the defense holding up the offense. We've always been kind of lower on the goals for average, but we just decided we're going to play a full all-around game. It seemed like our turnovers were down and we were winning the

ground ball battles. We just played a really simple, smart game and frustrated their big guys on the offensive side. Everybody played well."

With so much of last year's team consisting of seniors, it also created a situation with a largely inexperienced squad this year.

"I think Isaac Albers was a manager on the sideline and I was the only current coach on the sideline in 2018 so we had zero experience playing in a section championship game and Mahtomedi has been there all the time so experience was definitely not on our side," Flock said. "But this is a group that finds ways to win and it showed up here in the postseason."

The Ponies, who outscored their three section opponents by a combined 41-11, have continued to show improvement throughout the season.

"We're just much smarter as a team," Arens said. "We were lacking that lax IQ at the start of the year because we're a bunch of athletes and hockey play-

ers. We came out here and we played smart, fast, physical lacrosse and that's what led to the win."

"We're a super young team. This year we came in, I think we have five or six seniors in our starting lineup. Honestly we had to deal with a bunch of underclassmen and they've really stepped up and I'm really proud of them because they won that game for us."

Owen Knapp led the Zephyrs with three goals, which was just fine with the Ponies.

"We just needed to shut down No. 2 (Levi Lemke) and No. 7 (E.J. Chapentier) and that's what we did," Arens said. "They both had one goal each and we made the other players score goals and led to us winning."

Stillwater Area High School is the host site for this year's state tourna-

ment, which begins with the quarterfinals on Tuesday, June 15. The semifinals are scheduled for June 17 and the finals are set for June 19. Pairings are expected to be announced on Friday, June 11.

"She played really well and is getting it together," Deeg said of Gabriel. "That was good to see. Savannah and Caroline just played pretty solid."

All three players finished ahead of 2019 medalist Maddie Simon of Mahtomedi, who placed fourth with a score of 165 (81-84).

Stillwater has received consistent scores all the way down the lineup this season and the section meet was no different. Sam

Kane placed sixth at 174 (90-84) while Peighton Lynskey was just two shots back in a tie for seventh at 176 (87-89).

Jowan Abdullah did not factor into the team scoring, but even as Stillwater's sixth finisher with a score of 181 (91-90) ended up just one shot behind Mahtomedi's Maggie McCarthy (95-85—180), who grabbed the last of the five available individual state bids.

"That was one shot away from what would have qualified as an individual," Deeg said.

Monty, Vincent and Kane each competed at state when the Ponies placed fifth in 2019.

"We're excited to go play," Deeg said. "I think this team plays with a little bit of grit, which is good."

"I think if anything we might get a bit of a shock factor as everybody does at state, but I think more so than other years you're going to get a lot of rookies at the state tournament. We just put an emphasis on consistency and doing what we've always done. It's another golf tournament, so don't change your routine."

This was the 12th consecutive victory for the Stillwater girls since placing second in a Suburban East Conference meet

on April 19. Behind Monty and Vincent, who have set the pace at most events, the Ponies have been remarkably consistent while using scores from all six spots in the lineup.

The Class AAA state tournament will be held at Bunker Hills Golf Club on June 15-16, with tee times starting each day at 7:30 a.m.

"We can have two players have off days and still be fine," Deeg said. "For us, if one of our players has a bad day it doesn't hurt us like it would somebody else."

"Now it's just see what we can do at the state tournament. The deal is not to psych ourselves

out, but just go play our game."
