Section 7AA Girls Hockey Defending champs back to state

Light on drama. Heavy on dominance.


After powering through an undefeated regular season, the topranked Andover girls hockey team clinched a chance to defend its state title by defeating Grand Rapids/ Greenway 6-1 in the Section 7AA championship March 20.

Any chances of an upset for GR/G were dealt an immediate blow, as Andover's Ella Boerger found the net less than a minute into the action. The Huskies added a goal later in the first period as Gabby Krause scored her 24th goal of the season to make it 2-0.

Andover stretched its advantage to 5-0 in the second period on a pair of goals by Peyton Hemp and a score by Madelynn Jurgensen, then traded goals in the third, with Hemp completing a hat trick as she lifted her season total to 33 goals.

Krause also finished with three assists, Boerger had two assists and Courtney Stagman earned the win in net.

Andover reached the section finals by defeating Princeton 15-0 in the quarterfinals and Elk River/ Zimmerman 8-2 in the semifinals March 18, capping a two-month


Anoka finished with a trio of state qualifiers and St. Francis had an event champion to lead area gymnasts during the Section 7AA Championships in Forest Lake March 19.





It took reversing a regular season outcome, on the road, in the quarterfinals.

Then it took flipping a pair of previous defeats the latest by 33 points just two weeks prior - once again on the road, in the semifinals.

Four all-state swims powered an 11th-place team finish for Coon Rapids at the Class AA Boys Swimming and Diving State Championships at the University of Minnesota March 18-19.

Will Melsha provided the top individual placement for the Cardinals, earning fifth place in the 100-yard backstroke in 50.83 seconds to set a new school record.

Tyler Schultze posted a sixth-place finish in the 100 breaststroke in 56.52, also a new school record in addition to an All-American Consideration time.

The 200 medley relay team of Will Melsha, Schultze, Nick Melsha and Brian Tran earned sixth as well and also set a new school record in 1:35.25, with Will Melsha adding a final all-state swim in the 200 IM, earning seventh in 1:53.21.

Schultze also earned 10th in the 100 fly (50.79), Tran earned 11th in the 100 breaststroke (57.69), Jack Simmer earned 14th in diving (330.70), the 400 free relay team of Matthew Strus, Will Melsha, Tran and Schultze earned 17th (3:15.85 school record) and Nick Melsha earned 21st in the 200 free (1:49.29).

The Cardinals finished with 81 team points in the meet, a 71-point

spike from a year ago. On the season, the Cardinals posted a 10-1 overall record, five school records and 38 additions to the school's top 15 all-time lists.

"What a great meet," Coon Rapids head coach Doug Donaldson said. "It was a fantastic season!"
