Bemidji's Buffo forges family ties and more in year with Jacks

ilippo Buffo has only been a Lumberjack for one year, but he will certainly leave his mark in the Bemidji High School boys tennis record books.

The BHS senior and Italian exchange student qualified for the Class AA individual state tournament after capturing the Section 8AA singles title last week.

Buffo's section singles title is believed to be the first by a Bemidji player in at least 40 years.

"I'm happy that we're going to state, with the team, too,' Buffo said Monday, prior to the Jacks' first appearance in the team state tournament since 1973. Results from Tuesday's quarterfinal match were unavailable at press time. "We're going to try our best and see how it's going to go.'

But Buffo isn't the first Lumberjack to qualify for the singles state tournament.

Older brother Nic Buffo advanced to state in 2018 as section runner-up while also

Beavers to open 2021 season at North Dakota

BEMIDJI — The Bemidji State women's soccer team unveiled its 2021 schedule on Tuesday.

The Beavers will begin their first full season since 2019 with a nonconference match at Division I rival North Dakota on Sept. 3. The season opener follows two preseason scrimmages against St. Catherine on Aug. 21 and Hamline on Aug. 28. BSU and UND have previously met 10 times with Bemidji State taking the most recent three meetings dating back to 2007.

In total, the schedule features 10 home games, eight away games and three contests against 2019 NCAA Tournament teams.

The Beavers will host Northern Michigan in their home opener at Chet Anderson Stadium on Sept. 10 before closing nonconference play Sept. 12 at home versus Michigan Tech.

Sept. 17 marks the beginning of a full 15-match Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference schedule when BSU travels to Northern State, followed by a Sept. 19 match at Minnesota State Moorhead.

Minnesota State will visit the Chet on Sept. 24 to mark Bemidji State's first home league match. The game kicks off a six-game home stand that runs through Oct. 10.

The Beavers conclude the regular season Nov. 5 by hosting Minnesota Crookston.

The NSIC Tournament is slated to begin Nov. 10 with the championship game set for Nov. 14.

BSU completed the 2019 season at 12-6-1 overall, its 16th straight season finishing at or above .500, and placed fourth in the NSIC at 11-3-1. The 2020 season was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Bemidji State played three official matches and went 3-0 in a shortened spring 2021 schedule.

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

College Football Playoff could expand to 12 teams

The College Football Playoff could expand from four teams to 12 over an eight-team system, Yahoo Sports reported Tuesday, citing influential stakeholders.

Expanding the playoff will be the topic of discussion next month in Chicago when a working group evaluating the topic presents its finding to a committee of influ-

ential administrators. In concept, a 12-team playoff likely would include automatic bids for the Power Five conferences, plus the highest-ranked Group of Five teams. The other spots would be filled by

at-large teams. Under the current fourgame system, all partici-

pants are selected on an at-large basis. The CFP has been in figure into the expanded effect since after the 2014 playoff. season, and only 11 teams have appeared in the seven years: Alabama (six times), Clemson (six),

(two) and one each for his first U.S. Open since LSU, Georgia, Washington, Michigan State, Ore-

gon and Florida State. Unbeaten season Filippo Buffo is accustomed to playing on the clay courts of Italy, but he has taken well to

the hardcourts of the U.S. The Lumberjack entered the week unbeaten on American soil at 24-0 on the season.

"I'm playing good tennis," Buffo said. "I'm having fun." Buffo's success has not

altered his humility.

"One of the things that's so nice about him is, with all of his talent and hard work ethic, he's a really humble kid and a really great team-focused player," head coach Kyle Fodness said. "He never comes in thinking that his ability gives him special status on the team." Buffo will open the

16-player state singles tournament by facing Orono's Matias Maule, ranked No. 10 in Class AA, in the first round at 8 a.m. on Thursday, June 10, at Prior Lake High School.

Win or lose, Buffo will
