Fitzpatrick started the state prelims with a one minute and 18 second pin of Crookston's Braxton Volker. He followed it up with a 4-0 decision of Fooston-Bagley's Keegan Senger.

He then narrowly defeated Sawyer Sim-mons of Royalton/Upsala in the finals with a 2-0decision to get into the state championships.

"It was a mental game as well as a physical one," Fitzpatrick said. "I just didn't let anything get to my head and focus on one match."

What stood out to Rangers head coach Brian Wood on Fitzpatrick's state prelim performance was he didn't let his opponents get points.

"He's going to control the match and do what it takes to win," Wood said. "Whether it's on his feet, on top, getting that initial takedown. He's really focused on what it takes to be excellent at wrestling."

Fitzpatrick's performance at the state prelims vaulted his record to 38–1. He opens the state championships against Tucker Wills of Lake Crystal Wellcome Memorial.

Although Fitzpatrick is the top-seeded wrestler for the state championships, he is the second-ranked wrestler for his weight class.

With the help of Wood, Fitzpatrick doesn't focus on where he is in the rankings.

Wood has noticed John Paul Fitzpatrick becoming more and more serious about wrestling this year.

"He's a farm kid so he's always working

Bemidji State stuns Wisconsin, advances to NCAA East Regional final

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. -Bemidji State is one win away from the Frozen Four.

fourth-seeded The Beavers stormed out to a 2-0 first-period lead and knocked off top-seeded Wisconsin in a 6-3 victory in the NCAA men's hockey East Regional semifinals Friday afternoon at Bridgeport, Conn.

Ethan Somoza bucketed two goals and an assist in the first-round upset in a tenacious performance by BSU (16-9-3).

"Our word all week was attack," BSU head coach Tom Serratore said. "That's how we play. We're a puck-pressure team and we wanted to make sure that we played our game."

The Badgers (20-10-1) fell behind early and trailed 2-0 at the first intermission. Bemidji State outshot UW 16-7 in the opening frame and were in control out of the gate, keeping Wisconsin's high-powered scorers in check. "I don't know. Maybe

Koster uses pandemic down time wisely

Blueliner added speed to make a splash for the Gophers

LOVELAND, Colo. — The pandemic has been a challenge for everyone, world-wide, but in crisis there is often opportunity.

For Minnesota Gophers freshman defenseman Mike Koster, the sudden cancellation of his USHL season a year ago was a challenge. But as his body healed, and as Min-nesota rinks slowly opened back up, it became an opportunity.

By this point in any hockey season, it has been said that nobody is fully healthy. But Koster admits that by the time hockey shut down due to COVID-19 in March 2020, he was dealing with multiple ail-ments — most notably a high ankle sprain — as the Tri-City Storm trudged toward what they hoped would be a long playoff run.

Back home in Chaska, Minn., with nothing but time on his hands, Koster was able to truly rest and recuperate. And in June when there was ice time available at the arena adjacent to Mystic Lake Casino, which is tribal property and was able to re-open with fewer restrictions in place, Koster got back on the ice with a familiar face guiding him to the next stage of his hockey career. "He's one of the more focused athletes I've worked with, and I've worked with some pretty darn good athletes that worked hard," said Jack Blatherwick, the legendarv Minnesota hockey trainer. "I think he's a really good example of how important it is to be 100% focused on what you're doing and not just mindlessly doing it hard. I've worked with him for years, and he always worked hard, but this last summer was so focused that he improved more than at any other time."

so common to the southwestern Minnesota prairie.

Mike was a forward when the Kosters moved to Chaska a decade ago, but training with Pitlick for a summer team, he got an interesting offer.

"Lance Pitlick turned me into a defenseman," Koster said. "He said I could be a practice player and get into about half the tournaments as a forward, or I could play full time on defense. He saw that in me when I was about 11."

High-quality quartet Nearly nine years later, Koster is part of one of the more renowned young defensive groups in college hock-ey, alongside Brock Faber, Ryan Johnson and Jackson LaCombe. Much was made about the Gophers playing without three of the four in December, as Faber, Johnson and LaCombe made Team USA for the World Junior Championships, and returned to Minneapolis with gold medals. Gophers coach Bob Motzko said he honestly expected to lose four defensemen instead of three to the red, white and blue.

"When you look at our team and the accolades the three World Junior guys have gotten, Mike is maybe under the radar a little bit. He very well could've been on that team as well," Motzko said. "Spending that year in the USHL was tremendous and he really worked hard on his skating in the off-season. That really shows." The skating skills, using what Blatherwick calls "defenseman agility" which means the ability to change directions and use edges rather than the end-to-end speed that forwards favor, is what catches vour eve. It's reminiscent of the way Cale Makar was able to get around the rink en route to winning the Hobey Baker Award for UMass in 2019, and what Makar does today for the Colorado Avalanche. "He's got great edges and can corner and change direc-tions in an instant," Motzko said of Koster. "That's what he does." For his part, Koster credits the coaches he has had along the way, along with being able to take advantage of special situations to get more ice time. As a youth in Marshall, that would mean a blizzard, when school was closed and the rink was open to only a select few. Last summer, that meant the pandemic, which allowed extra time to follow Blatherwick's lead and get ready to make an immediate splash in college. "With my size, being able to get around the rink is a huge advantage," said Koster, who entered his first NCAA tournament with three goals and nine assists in 29 games. "Thinking the game and putting yourself in the right spots, and having a skill set where I can get pucks on and off my stick quickly so I can get up in the rush."

Wolves close with 22-0 run, rally past Rockets

Karl-Anthony Towns finished two assists shy of a triple-double and was the linchpin of a remarkable closing stretch for the Minnesota Timberwolves, who erased a 19-point, second-half deficit in their 107-101 victory over the Houston Rockets on Friday in Minneapolis.

Towns finished with 29 points, 16 rebounds and eight assists, tallying 14 points and two assists while the Timberwolves closed the game on a 22-0 run. They ended a threegame losing skid.

Houston led 101-85 on a 20-footer by D.J. Augustin with 7:31 left in the game. The Rockets then missed their final 14 shots and committed five turnovers. Augustin gave the Rockets their biggest lead at 91-72 on a 3-pointer with 1:50 left in the third.

Juan Hernangomez scored 19 points with nine rebounds and Naz Reid scored 16, with both coming off the Minnesota bench.

Christian Wood had 24 points and nine rebounds to lead the Rockets. Ben McLemore tied his season high with 21 points. John Wall paired 14 points

with a season-high 15 assists, but he made only 6 of 25 from the floor and committed seven turnovers. The Rockets' 21 turnovers yielded 18 points for the Timberwolves.
