Minder pitches shutout as Bulls beat the Lakers

Now that the calendar has changed to July, the second season for the Jackson Bulls has started.

Manager Scott Bahr breaks the season down into three phases, the first gearing up for the second, which is when the team prepares for the playoffs — which is the third portion of the season.

"As much as I don't want summer to be over, we're getting to that best time of the year," Bahr said last week. "Season No. 2 starts now."

Bahr said the Bulls need to play well now after a stretch earlier in which they lost four straight games and six of seven.

"We faltered," he said.
"The last two weeks haven't been our best baseball and we lost a couple games we felt like we should've won. Earlier in the year, there were a couple games against some really good teams that we had a chance to win and didn't quite get it done."

That means the Bulls have some important games the next week or so.

"We've kind of got our backs to the wall when it comes to league standings," he said. "We talked about trying to finish strong with our league games. We only have three left, but it looks to me like we kind of control our own destiny to get to second place."

Along with those league games, the Bulls have a couple non-league games left Bahr hopes will help prepare the team for a playoff push. One of those games came last Thursday at Lamberton, which the Bulls lost late.

"We mix in three non-league games and those are real," he said. "They're against Lamberton, Blue Earth and the Milroy Yankees and they're all perennial state tournament teams. If you want to try to make the state tournament, you're going to have to compete against those teams."
