Ramblers' senior, 3-time All-State player, has sights on state tourney

What happened last year was fulfilling for Olivia Gardner.

But only to a point. Gardner and her Winona Cotter girls soccer team accomplished something that had forever eluded them. Among southeastern Minnesota's best teams for years, the Ramblers finally won the Section One, Class A championship.

In a normal year, that would have meant that a trip to the coveted state tournament was next. But not last year. The COVID-19 pandemic put the kibosh on all state tournaments last fall.

So, beating Dover-Eyota 3-0 in the section title game and finishing their season a perfect 14-0-0 felt good to the Ramblers. But great? Nope, not quite.

"It was kind of a bittersweet ending," said Gardner, a forward who has been named All-State for three consecutive years. "It was great to end with a win, but we've always wanted to go to state. That's always been a big goal of ours.'

It still is. Cotter, behind Gardner and a pack of fellow talented seniors, has made state its quest again. Cotter will be favored to make it happen, and this time it

is expected that the state tournament will actually be played, though nothing is guaranteed with COVID 19 still lurking.

HIGH HOPES

Gardner knows she's on a special team and one that might be even more special this season.

"I'm super excited about this season," said Gardner, who had 28 goals and 11 assists last year. "From what I've seen this summer, everyone on our team has improved so much. You can tell that we have a really good squad coming back."

There's no doubt who the leader is. It's Gardner, the team's undisputed top player — at least until fellow All-State player and senior midfielder Sera Speltz is deemed healthy enough to return after having torn her ACL in last season's section title game. Speltz's return is likely to happen a few weeks into the season.

Until then, Cotter has a great person to lean on in three-sport star Gardner, who is also a standout basketball player and sprinter in track and field. She's someone who Cotter coach Marie Barrientos has regarded as special for a long time.

t's tough to talk about individual accomplishments with Century junior Emily Garrison because the topic quickly switches back to her girls swimming and diving teammates.

Garrison had a stellar sophomore season for the Panthers in a highly unusual season. Due to COVID-19, nearly every meet was a virtual contest — with opponents swimming in their own pools — plus time spent with teammates was limited and no state was meet held in

"I wish we would have had a state meet," Garrison said. "It would have been so nice to compete, but I wasn't really that disappointed because the section meet was just like icing on the cake."

The Panthers should be primed for another strong season after going 7-0 in dual meets a year ago, winning the Big Nine Conference meet and placing second in the section.

Garrison was a big part of that success.

"She's a phenomenal wimmer for us." Centurv co-coach Dale Magnuson said. "She's strong in all four strokes; she really doesn't have many weaknesses, if any at all.'

Garrison's personal goal is to qualify for the state meet

in both individual and relay events. But she is even more excited about the prospect of a strong team season for the Panthers.

"I've improved by myself, but the team has gotten a lot stronger," she said. "The underclassmen are really strong this year and of course the upperclassmen are strong. I think we have the opportunity to break a lot of team records this year so I'm really excited.'

Swimming is a year-around sport for Garrison as she also swims for the Rochester club team. Magnuson said "she always gives 100 percent."

"She's just focused and dedicated to do as well as she can," Magnuson said. "She's always smiling, she has a good attitude towards things and she comes out of races very positive and just really works hard.'

"I feel like I'm pretty self motivated, but it helps to have a team goal that you're all working towards," Garrison said. "I think we have our goals set out for this season so I'm excited to see how far we can go."
