Coyotes stay unbeaten with convincing win

The Heron Lake-Okabena/Fulda football team took command early and never relinguished control in a 44-26 win over Westbrook/Walnut Grove Saturday in Westbrook.

The Coyotes scored a trio of first-quarter touchdowns and led 30-6 at the half. HL-O/F led 44-12 in the fourth quarter before the Chargers scored the last two touchdowns.

Eli Fest had a hand in the first two Coyote touchdowns, first running for a 42-yard score before throwing a 26-yard touchdown to Matt Madsen. Madsen added the two-point conversion after the first touchdown.

Brayden Peil then scored from 2 yards out and Fest hit Isaiah Schmid for the twopoint conversion for a 22-0 first-quarter lead.

After the Chargers scored in the second quarter, Madsen ran in from 4 yards out and added the two-point conversion for a 30-6 lead the Coyotes took into the half.

WWG scored to open the third quarter, but Madsen again found paydirt, this time from 15 yards out. Fest completed the two-point conversion with a pass to Dominic White.

The final Coyote touchdown came on a 33-yard touchdown pass from Parker Murphy to Logan Erdmann in the fourth quarter.

Fest completed nine-of-11 passes for 82 yards and a score. He also ran for 119 yards and a touchdown on 11 carries.

Madsen rushed for 109 yards and two touchdowns on 15 carries. Peil ran for 22 yards. Eight different Coyotes had at least one catch. White hauled in three passes for 31 yards. Erdmann had one catch for 33 yards and Madsen had one reception for 26 yards.

Peil had a team-high 15 tackles, including five solo stops. Jaeden Strandberg had 11 tackles and force a fumble. Trevor King and Zach Thier each had 10 tackles, Cody Hennings had six and White had five. Madsen, Thier, Aiden Lang and Ryder Henning also forced fumbles. Henning also intercepted a pass.

HL-O/F improves to 3-0 on the season with the win. The Coyotes finished the regular season last night (Wednesday) against Red Rock Central and open the playoffs next week.
