

Meeting about kidnapper's release set for June 9

Holby convicted for 2017 Alexandria crime

ALEXANDRIA — A community notification meeting has been scheduled for 5 p.m. on Thursday, June 9, in relation to the release of a level three offender. Joshua Lee Holby, 36,

will be released from prison on June 14 to supervised intensive



Holby T h e meeting is set to take place at Alexandria City Hall.

Holby was convicted of kidnapping in January 2019, a charge for which he was sentenced to be committed to the commissioner of corrections correctional facility in St. Cloud for 86 months, with 491 days credit for time served.

He was also sentenced to pay \$1,988.36 in fees and must register as a predatory offender.

The maximum possible sentence for his charge was 40 years imprisonment and/or a \$50,000 fine.

Viewing storm's destruction

Congresswoman Fischbach and local legislators tour Forada in wake of May 30 tornado that ravaged the community

FORADA — On Thursday evening, June 2, U.S. Rep. Michelle Fischbach, congresswoman for the 7th Congressional district in Minnesota, along with several other legislators, toured portions of Forada that were ravaged by an EF-2 tornado.

While walking along Maple Lake looking at all the damage that was done by the May 30 tornado, Fischbach, along with State Rep. Mary Franson, R-Alexandria; State Sen. Torrey Westrom, R-Elbow Lake; and State Rep. Paul Anderson, R-Starbuck, spoke with residents, Forada City Council members, including

do that touched down near Forada on Memorial Day, May 30 also went through Nelson. Other tornadoes moved through at least eight other nearby counties in Minnesota, accord-ing to new information from the National Weather Service.

The tornado was part of a bowing line of severe thunderstorms that lifted northeast through western MinMinnesota during the late afternoon and early evening on May 30, the NWS said.

The following four tornadoes were in the NWS coverage area in the Twin Cities. Meanwhile, other parts of the state were also hit by tornadoes, according to the NWS. A total of 14 tornadoes were confirmed as of June 4.
