Report: Former pastor fired 3 years after alleged abuse

The alleged abuse occurred from August through October of 2018, beginning with "flirtatious" messages and progressing to nude photos and a video of Masopust masturbating, kissing and groping of her breasts and genitals, according to the

criminal complaint.

The first physical contact happened when the girl was working at Sunshine Tree and Masopust asked his mother-in-law if he could "borrow" the girl for an event. He took her up a back hallway near his office and began kissing her, the report said, touching her everywhere, though "Masopust

could tell she was not very receptive or responsive to his advances" and became more aggressive.

One Sunday, Masopust allegedly sent the girl of photograph of himself in his underwear as he was getting ready for church.

The girl told authorities she looked up to Masopust for such a long time and "it felt

weird to say no," the report said, and she indicated Masopust had been her pastor since she was in elementary school.

The texting continued, with Masopust eventually sending a photo of himself naked, and urging the girl to send him a nude photo, the complaint said.

Masopust reportedly kissed and groped her

in the basement of his family's home when the girl was there to babysit, trying to get access to her body under her clothing several times. Each time, she pushed him away and told him no, according to the court documents.

The alleged incidents stopped in October, when Masopust's wife found messages on his phone. According to a message he sent the girl, he was in Kansas because Perryman "sent him there to take some time off."

The girl moved away after she graduated from high school, but returned in late 2020 and went back to Northridge Church – eventually becoming an adult youth leader, at Masopust's wife's request.

In October 2021, three years after the alleged abuse ended, a former church member sent an anonymous letter to the state board that oversees the church, revealing the alleged abuse and asking for an investigation.

On Oct. 19, Masopust's wife called the girl and asked her to come to church. That's when the alleged victim met with two men from Minnesota Assemblies of God, and shared her story.

The allegations finally came to light in December, when the superintendent of Minnesota Assemblies of God went to Owatonna police to report "an inappropriate relationship." The man told authorities Masopust was fired after admitting to a "flirtatious" text message thread and sending the girl a photo of himself in his underwear.

When police contacted the girl the next day, she showed them a text she had saved on her phone. It was reportedly from Masopust and arrived on her 18th birthday, when he apologized "for everything that happened," and said he was "ashamed" of what he did, but hoped they

could remain friends.

The girl's mother said the church never told her anything about the alleged abuse.

In the state of Minnesota, members of clergy, daycare providers, administrators in non-profits and family members are all mandated reporters, designed to protect children and vulnerable adults.

As such, they are required by law to report "suspected abuse or molestation of any kind" to law enforcement within 24 hours, and if applicable, to child protective services within 72 hours.

Failure to do so is a misdemeanor, if not reported within three years.

During the three years since the alleged incidents, Masopust was an employee of Teachers on Call, the substitute teacher service used by Owatonna Public Schools.

Superintendent Jeff Elstad said Teachers on Call "does all of its own background checks" on employees, and there were no reports of any incidents with Masopust.

"It appears he was at the high school a couple of times," Elstad said, and in the REACH program, which was designed to help students needing support in the areas of relationships, education, accountability, character and hard

work.

The Minnesota Assemblies of God superintendent who reported the allegations to police told the Times via text that "we have made thorough and timely reports, not only to our National Office which oversees ministers' credentials, but also the Owatonna police... all disciplinary processes

are functioning."
He didn't respond to
a question about when
church officials first
learned of the allegations against Masopust.

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Taxpayers should deposit refunds into U.S. bank accounts in their own name, their spouse's name or both. They should avoid making a deposit into accounts owned by others. Some

banks require both spouses' names on the account to deposit a tax refund from a joint return. Taxpayers should check with their bank for direct deposit rules.

Get banked

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Some mobile apps and prepaid debit cards allow for direct deposit of tax refunds. They must have routing and account numbers associated with them that can be entered on a tax return. Taxpayers should check with the mobile app provider or financial institution to confirm which numbers to use.

Taxpayers must have their routing and account numbers for direct deposit available when they are ready to file. The IRS can't accept this information after a return is filed.

There is a limit of three direct deposit refunds made into a single financial account or prepaid debit card.

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


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TIMELINE:

June 2018: First "sexual-type" message; Masopust allegedly asks the girl what kind of underwear she is wearing.

August 2018: First physical contact; Masopust allegedly kisses and gropes the girl in a back hallway of Northridge Church.

Late summer 2018: Masopust allegedly sends a photo of himself in his underwear and a nude photo of himself to the girl.

September or October 2018: Masopust allegedly sends the girl a video of himself masturbating.

September or October 2018: Masopust allegedly kisses and gropes the girl while she was babysitting in Masopust's home.

October 2018:
Masopust sends the girl a message that they "can't talk anymore" because his wife "found the messages and got unset."

October 2018: Perryman sends Masopust to Kansas "to take some time off."

November 2020: Alleged victim returns to Northridge Church; Masopust's wife asks her to be an adult youth leader.

October 19, 2021: Representatives from Minnesota Assemblies of God visit Northridge; the girl tells her story. October 2021: Perryman fires Masopust as youth pastor for "conduct unbecoming a

pastor."

Dec. 21, 2021:

Kayla Mollenhauer,
a former member of
the Northridge Youth
Group, writes a Facebook post outlining
what she calls her "religious trauma," naming
Felicia and Sean Masopust. It was shared
nearly 200 times.

Dec. 23, 2021: The superintendent for Minnesota Assemblies of God goes to Owatonna Police to report the allegations.

Dec. 24, 2021: Owatonna Police contact the alleged victim and her mother, who come to the police station.

Jan. 24, 2022:

Jan. 24, 2022: Minnesota Assemblies of God sends "finding of fact" to OPD, confirming the allegations made about Masopust.

Feb. 1, 2022: Masopust is arrested at his home in Owatonna.

Feb. 2, 2022: Masopust makes his first appearance in Steele County District Court; bonds out of jail on \$5,000 conditional bail.

Feb. 4, 2022: Tammy Perryman resigns as director of Sunshine Tree, the daycare affiliated with Northridge Church.

Feb. 6, 2022: Mark Perryman resigns as minister of Northridge Church.
