Eichorn, Ruud head toward party nomination fight

Lueck says he won't challenge Kresha in new House district

BRAINERD — A battle for the Republican Party nomination is brewing between state Sens. Justin Eichorn and Carrie Ruud after redistricting placed the two incumbents in the same district.

Whiteout conditions cause multi-vehicle crash on Highway 371

C trong wind gusts ripping across Gull Lake's Hole-in-the-Day Bay brought whiteout conditions to Highway 371, causing a multi-car crash just before noon on Friday and shutting down both lanes of the highway for most of the day.

The Nisswa Fire Department responded to the crash, reported at 11:53 a.m. north of Brainerd. According to Nisswa Fire Chief, Shawn Bailey, there were 23 vehicles involved in the crash, including three semi trailers.

The Minnesota State Patrol reported that a sudden snow squall with white-out conditions was to blame for sending three people to Essentia Health-St. Joseph's Medical Center for treatment of injuries.

Leroy Marvin Lorentz, 66, St. Peter, was driving a 2021 Ram 3500 truck. Lorentz, who was wearing a seat belt, was transported to the hospital with non-life-threatening injuries. No airbags deployed in Lorentz's truck.

Wyatt Joseph Rech, 20, Akeley, was driving a 2019 Chevrolet Silverado. Rech, who was not wearing a seatbelt, the state patrol reported, was transported to the hospital with non-life-threatening injuries.

Law enforcement provides tips to avoid cybercrime

BAXTER — Though less often reported than other crimes, instances of internet and phonebased fraud and scams are on the rise and, according to officials, show no sign of slowing down.

In 2021, the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center released its 2020 Internet Crime Report. It states in one internet-based year, crimes have risen 69.4%, from 467,361 reported in 2019 to 791,790 reported in 2020.

FBI's The includes only incidents 12 percent of all estimatthat are self-reported through its online portal and that number is an understatement of how often cybercrimes occur, said Baxter Police Sgt. Victor Sofie. Most victims do not report their victimization, he said, as they are often embarrassed or may not even know they have been a victim of a crime.

In 2018, the New York Times interviewed the head of the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center and reported the "number of complaints only **CYBERCRIME:** Page A11

report represented about 10 to ed cybercrime victims in the United States in 2016, and a fraction of all victims worldwide."

By state, Minnesota ranks 24th on the number of reported cybercrimes in 2020 with 6,847 reported.

John Palcher, an investigator with the Brainerd Police Department, and Travis Loeffler, an investigator with the Crow Wing County Sheriff's Office, both talked about the increase in cybercrimes over the past few years.
