

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father-in law and father of my wife Sharon. Irvin Voigt, who died at the age of 64 in 1984, served as a member of the Army Air Corps during World War II.

He was born in Perham on June 7, 1920, and enlisted on May 7, 1942, working as a mechanic on fighter planes in the European Theatre. Irvin was honorably discharged from military service on Sept. 22, 1945.

The Army Air Corp later

became the U.S. Air Force. Also buried at Pleasant Hill Cemetery are Irvin's brother, Julian, also a member of the Army Air Corps during World War II, and a son, Thomas Voigt, who served in the Vietnam War as a member of the U.S. Air

Force. Two other brothers of Irvin, Ted and Stanley, served in the U.S. Navy during World War II. More than 16 million men

and women served in the U.S. Armed Forces during World War II, and another 3.5 million worked as federal civilian employees during the war.

As a note of interest, Dwight D. Eisenhower, who had served as Supreme Commander of Allied Forces in Europe during World War II, visited Glendalough near Battle Lake in 1952 when he was a presidential candidate.
