With a 4-1 win over Annandale May 31, the Watertown-Mayer softball team won their fifth playoff game and earned a spot in the Section 5AA Championship game.

"[It feels like the] highest point of the mountain right now," Jada Kosmatka said.

The No. 7 seeded Royals overcame the odds, upsetting the No. 1 seeded Rockford Rockets a week prior, and defeated another ranked team in Annandale to reach the championship.

"If I were to be honest, I thought we could make it far, but I didn't think we could make it this far," said Abby Otterness.

Their run up to the section title game includes five playoff wins as the Royals won 10 of their 11 games heading into meeting with Maple Lake June 2.

"We're peaking at the right time," said coach Bethany Loether. Our team bought into the mindset of coming in every single pitch, ready to take on every pitch. We're working together as a team. I'm really proud of this team."

Watertown-Mayer never gave Annandale a chance to get in the game, as Otterness was dealing a stellar game on the mound. After shutting out Norwood Young America earlier in the day, allowing just two hits in a 5-0 win, Otterness held the Cardinals without a hit for six innings, finishing the game with 12 strikeouts compared to one hit.

"She did phenomenal, she got 14 innings in today and never once did she waver," said Loether. "She trusted in her team. She had the mindset that she just needed to get her job done and everyone else will be right there with her."

Anja Gilbert also came close to a spot at the state tournament with a pair of personal records. Gilbert reached the finals in both the 100 and 300 meter hurdles, posting career best times of 16.59 and 50.68 seconds to take fifth and eighth.

Also posting personal bests for the Watertown-Mayer girls were Ellie Lommel in the 400 (1:07.89), Bryn Domjahn and Kira Frisbie in the 800 (2:48.28 and 2:50.03), Ava Rousseau in the 1,600 (6:26.77), Sophia Oscarson in the high jump (5-0) and Charlotte Becker in the 100 hurdles (19.97).

Five boys also posted personal bests at the section meet - Joe Meier in the 100 (12.65), Jack Jewison in the 200 (25.45), Caleb Barnhart in the 1,600 (5:13.35), Lonne Gilbert in the 300 hurdles (53.22) and Micah Schmidt in the triple jump (35-08).
