The Watertown-Mayer girls soccer team knew they would have a target on their back this season after the most successful season in program history last year. The Royals knew expectations would be high after last year, but their preseason ranking is quite a jump up. Watertown-Mayer broke into the top-10 rankings last year and now have jumped all the way up to the No. 2 ranking in Class A.

"I don't know if that's a good thing or a bad thing, but here we are," coach Joseph Perez said. "I don't put much into preseason rankings as we haven't played a game yet, but it does feel good that the girls are being recognized and the program is being recognized."

Though the road ahead is difficult, with conference opponents Holy Family Catholic and Southwest Christian also in the top 10 at No. 4 and No. 7, setting the stage for some big games this year.

Despite being one of the shorter players on the field, Heun doesn't often play like it, and her season-opener goal was no different as she took a pass from Mercedes Burmeister and headed it home.

"For her size, she's fearless," Perez said of Heun.

"Megan Barnhart, who moves up to the midfield this year after playing outside back last season also scored in the win, something the Royals are looking forward to after her shift in roles.

"[Maris and Megan] should do the bulk of the scoring this season for us," said Perez. "They're both seniors and a good group."

Another change this year is the formation, as the Royals move to a 3-5-2 this year.

"We probably hit the post about six times, it just wouldn't go in," said Perez. "I told them to keep shooting and eventually it will go in."

Another challenge in the game was playing on a turf field. The Royals practice on grass but soon will be playing on turf for home games after the field renovations. Early season matchups at Providence Academy and Orono, who both play on turf, will help them get adjust to the different playing surface, which they will debut in a Sept. 7 meeting with big Lake at 5 p.m.


