The Sanford Tri for Health returns for the 13th time, with a youth version set for Friday night and adult competition Saturday.

Chelsea Honnette, race director and one of seven board members for the triathlon, said the events are made possible because of sponsors and volunteers.

'We want to thank or local business for their continued support, and the volunteers," she said. "Not only the monetary community support, but the volunteers, too. Without either of those, we would not be successful."

Support from local businesses and organizations allows for every participant to receive a swag bag filled with a shirt and several other items.

Races Friday, Saturday

The youth triathlon starts at 6 p.m. Friday, with various age groups going different distances.

Those ages 5 to 7 will swim 15 meters, bike one mile and run one-quarter mile. Distances for kids 8 to 10 jump to 25 meters swimming, two miles on the bike and a half-mile run.

Kids 11 to 14 will swim 50 meters, bike four miles and run one mile.

On Saturday, the adults take to the course, starting at 8 a.m.

The beginner triathlon has a 150-meter swim, nine-mile bike ride and two-mile run. The sprint triathlon includes a 300-meter swim, 12-mile bike ride and 3.1-mile run. High School was a bit of a surprise and the last ticket to state was punched long after most people had left the meet.

In between were a few more pleasant surprises, a few school records, a few sure-fire qualifiers and — unfortunately — a few heartbreaks.

In all, the Huskies punched their ticket to state in 10 events, claimed a girls' team championship and tied for first place in the boys' standings.

"I'm really pleased," head coach Rafe York said. 'We had three school records, which is pretty awesome. A lot of good performances; a lot of kids stepped up."

Hanson sets two records, qualifies in three events

JCC's first state qualifier was probably its most surprising.

Senior Peyton Hanson was a sure bet to make it to state in the 300-meter hurdles and a favorite to go in pole vault — which she did — but wasn't really on the radar in the 100-meter hurdles.

Hanson finished second in the race in a school-record time of 16.74 seconds.

"I was very shocked I got second in the 100s and got the record," Hanson said. "The 100s are a lot about stepping and I nailed every single one."

"I was shocked," York said. "She's been struggling all year and, out of the blue, she put it all together."

Hanson's trip to state in the 100 hurdles was a surprise, but her success in the 300 hurdles and pole vault wasn't.

But how she made it to state in the pole vault is a bit surprising.

Hanson had never cleared 10 feet, 4 inches in her life, but knew she needed to do so if she wanted to get to state.

"Ten-four was what we were practicing all week because there were like five girls who cleared 9 feet, 9 inches and 10 feet, See T&F on B4

Last Wednesday, all three girls had games on the same night.


I coached Hallie's soft toss team at the Riverside Elementary fields, doing my best to lob strikes for



"That was one of my goals this year," Boyum said. "I knew I had a chance all year to make it in all three seasons.'

Junior Caleb Vancura entered last year's section meet — JCC was in Section 3A last season — as the favorite to win the discus and shot put but missed the meet to go to a wrestling tournament.

This season, he had his sights set on making it to state in both in JCC's new section.

He was in good position most of the shot put competition until Windom's Alex Altman hit a big throw late and put Vancura in third place with a personalbest distance of 48 feet, 9 inches.

Vancura — like Landherr and Farmer - rebounded later in the meet, finishing second in discus.

Vancura broke his own school record in the event on his second-to-last attempt, which flew 154 feet, 11 inches.
