The Eagle volleyball team will open its season hosting Mt. Lake Area. The Eagles will start the season without junior all-conference hitter Kelsey Hanefeld due to injury, but return senior all-conference hitter Hali Tasler, as well as middle hitter Holly Larson and setter Shelby Mattson. Top returners for the Wolverines are outside hitters Janessa Peters and Paige Brown, setter Rachel Dukes and libero

Mikayla Falk. The Eagle football team will travel to Tracy for its annual preseason scrimmage. Other teams in the scrimmage include reigning Class A state champion Dawson-Boyd and 2010 Class A state champion Minneota, as well as Tracy-Milroy-Balaton, Wabasso and Springfield.

The Windom cross country team opens its season in Mt. Lake at the Wolverine Invitational. The boys return senior Ryan Helmoski, juniors Clay Elness and Nick Raverty and sophomore Aaron Axford. The girls return senior Megan Muller and junior Emily Axford.

The Mt. Lake Area football team finally learned its playoff fate, as the team was assigned to Section 2 Nine-Man.

Fantastic finish gives Knutson first title

When it came to the men's club championship at the Windom Country Club, Tyler Knutson had always been close to winning, but not quite close enough.

But on Sunday, Knutson saved his best for last.

Sitting in a tie for the lead going to the final hole, Knutson drove the green on the short par-four Hole 9. He then rolled in his eagle putt, giving him a 36-hole total of 151 and a two-stroke victory.

Anthony Buckentin finished two strokes behind with a 153. Kim Anderson and Brent Anderson tied for third, each with a 154, with Kim Anderson winning a handicap-hole tiebreaker.

"It was kind of a relief for me when that last putt went in," Knutson said. "I've been close before, so it was nice to finally win one."

The top of the leaderboard was tight throughout the tournament. Brent Anderson set the tone early, shooting an opening-round 34 on Saturday. But Knutson and Buckentin each shot a 35 on Saturday's back nine, each finishing the day with an even-par 72 for a one-stroke lead.

"I started out with three straight bogeys, but I was able to regroup on the second nine to finish even par for the day," Knutson said. "Buck and I were both pretty close the entire tournament, and Brent was right there after the first day as well."

Knutson took sole posses-

sion of the lead by firing a 39 in Sunday's opening round before the wheels started to

"I couldn't get out of the trees and took a double on Hole 2, and unfortunately, I carried that with me to Hole 3," Knutson said. "I ended up taking an 8 on Hole 3."

That allowed Buckentin to take a three-stroke lead.

Knutson pulled even for the lead with a par on Hole 6. Matching pars on holes 7 and 8 set up the dramatic finish.

"I was first on the tee and Hole 9 is a perfect threewood shot for me to the green," Knutson said. "I wanted to try to put a little bit of pressure on. When I hit it, I had a pretty good feeling I'd have a chance.

"But Brent and Kim were in the group before us and I wasn't certain of how they had finished. All I knew was I was tied with Buck. His tee shot ended up about 10 yards off the front of the green, so I knew there was a good chance he'd get up and down for birdie. That put a lot of pressure on my putt.'

But prior to arriving at the green, he wasn't sure just how long his putt would be.

"I thought it landed pretty softly," Knutson said. "So I figured I'd be pretty close. But the pin was in a frontright spot, which is kind of tricky.'

As it turns out, Knutson had about a six-foot putt for eagle. Meanwhile, Buckentin

wound up missing his birdie


"There was a bit of pressure on that putt, but I was able to knock it in," Knutson said.

The victory culminates

a strong season of golf for Knutson.

"I've been playing pretty well and the course has been in terrific shape all year," Knutson said. "And the conditions couldn't have been more ideal this weekend. Saturday turned out to be a great day for golf and Sunday was just as good.'

Smith claims 12th consecutive title

The more things change regarding the Windom Country Club's Women's Club Tournament, the more they stay the same.

The tournament moved to an 18-hole Saturday event this year and attracted a couple more players than past years. But the end result was the same.

For the 12th straight year, Tara Smith captured the club championship, finishing with a score of 84.

Lisa Hoffman shot an 89 to finish as the runner-up. Mary Hogan won the second flight of the tournament, shooting a 100.

For Smith, the year has seen her play far less golf than usual, after having a baby last spring and dealing with a knee injury much of the summer.

"I had really only played about three rounds of golf all year prior to the tournament." Smith said. "I really wasn't at peak form and wasn't sure if I'd play. But, if it was someone else, I would have tried to talk them into playing, so I had to follow my own advice. I went out, played 18 holes and had fun.

The rain that had been forecast for Saturday held off, leaving conditions ideal for golf.

"The weather was awesome," Smith said. "It really couldn't have been better for us. But the pin placements on Saturday were pretty tough. It was

tougher than they typically are during the summer, so you had to be aware of where you could miss.

"As a whole, I thought my short game was pretty good. My driver kind of let me down and I was playing out of the rough quite a bit."

Smith had high praise for the course's adding that considering how dry the weather has been, the course has been green all summer.

Now, the hope is to continue to build the women's tournament field. Smith said the tourney was moved to the Saturday of the men's tournament, rather than a Tuesday, to try to attract more players.

"We had a couple who probably would have played but had a couple of conflicts," Smith said. "But it was just fun to be out playing with the ladies, because I haven't had the chance to play much this year. And, right now, the ladies really want the club tournament to be a fun experience.

"We had at least one lady who had never played in the club tournament before. We tried to get a few more women to play and I think we'll get more to play in time. One thing's for sure. There was a lot more laughter with the women's groups than there were with any of the men's groups."

The Falcons return plenty of experience and will have good depth, particularly up front. RRC also returns eight of its nine defensive starters from last year.

The Falcons take on a Knight team that finished

last year with an 8-2 overall record, with both losses coming to Renville County West—including once in the playoffs.

This also is the final year for the St. Mary's football program, as St. Mary's will pair with Sleepy Eye Public for football, starting with the 2023 season.

Returning All-Sub-District players for the Knights are senior running back/linebacker Brandon Tauer and senior receiver/defensive back Kaleb Wait. St. Mary's also brings back honorable mention senior tight end/ linebacker Owen Weiss and junior receiver/defensive back Jon Petermann.

MLAC returns senior Kearney Wall and junior Kyla Wuertz in the middle and junior Alexis Romsdahl on the right side.


