Dominant half lifts Bison past Becker

Buffalo posts 13-2 section quarterfinal home win over Bulldogs; St. Michael-Albertville rematch comes in semis

The final score couldn't have been more lopsided than the 13-2 home win the Buffalo girls' lacrosse team posted in the Section 8 quarterfinals Wednesday, June 1, against Becker.

Eleven of the Bison's 13 goals came in the opening half. The second half ended with a 2-1 advantage for the home team. The lack of offense in the final 25 minutes had a little to do with some improved play by Becker's goalkeeper. The other had to do with a switch in personnel and offensive mindset.

"The goal wasn't to run the score up, it was to play good lacrosse and work on things that will be critical in competitive games, said Head Coach Peter Robson. "We were slowing it down a little bit and trying to get everybody in the game. We played our entire roster. I don't think it was so much letting the pressure off the gas pedal as much as giving our team different looks. We still were able to keep pressure on the other team.

Offensively, the second-seeded Bison wasted no time early on to jump on the seventh-seeded **Bulldogs**

Bella Weiche opened the scoring just 15 seconds into the contest. Bailey Mischke made it 2-0 at the 1:38 mark. The lead grew to 4-0 on goals by Ellie Toussaint and Scarlett Peterson. Becker scored its first goal with 11:08 left to play in the half, but Buffalo answered with four more unanswered goals to bring an 11-1 lead into the half.

Mischke scored three of her four goals in the game in the first half. Only a freshman, her 29 goals through 14 games rank second on the team

to Toussaint's 43. Mischke scored six goals a year ago as a first-year varsity play-

"I think one of the biggest changes this year from last is my confidence is high-Mischke said. "Just knowing I have the support from my team, in that they want me to succeed, gives me a lot of confidence.

Mischke felt the week

leading into the playoffs created an even closer bond with her teammates. Buffalo played the final game of the regular season without its coaching staff.

"I think, just staying together and keeping a positive mindset about everything helped us get through that," Mischke

As the No. 2 seed, Buffalo

was guaranteed at least two home games as long as they kept winning. The Bison's win setup a semifinal home game played Tuesday, June 7, against No. 3 seed St. Michael-Albertville. Results of this game will be recapped in next week's paper.

Going in, the Bison were confident. They won a 12-9 home game earlier this

season against the Knights. Win or lose, the fact it's a home game makes a big difference.

"St. Michael is a longtime rival, and it's an exciting game to have at home," Robson said. "Obviously, this is an amazing field and we love playing here. The energy from our home fans is a huge plus for the girls."

In a record-setting year for offense, it was the 13th time in 14 games Buffalo has held its opponent under 10 goals, something Valli and his defenders take pride in.

"It starts with Braden in goal. He's been playing amazing this year," Valli said. "We're lucky enough this year to have a really good offense. Our defense has been really good this year with sliding.

The defense was put to the ultimate test in Monday's playoff loss to Chanhassen. The 19 goals by far were a season-high

The Storm built an early 4-1 lead, thanks to three goals from Carter Van Holland, who ended the night with six goals and two assists. Chanhassen staved off two different comeback attempts late in the opening two quarters.

Goals by Jerde and Valli pulled Buffalo within 4-3 after one quarter. Trailing 10-4 late in quarter two, Kology's second goal of the game, followed by a Youngquist tally made the score 10-6 at half.

"At the beginning of the game, I thought for sure we could pull this off," Kology said. "But they possessed the ball really well. It's hard to score when you don't get the ball.'

The Storm scored four unanswered goals in the opening three minutes of the third quarter, but this time, Buffalo had no answer. Chanhassen would later score five more second half goals, while allowing none.

who Kology, scored twice, ended his junior season with 73 goals and 87 points, both currently lead the state. Even though his season came to an end. he didn't feel shame losing to one of the state's perennial powers.

"We have the hardest section by far," Kology said. "Chanhassen and Shakopee are really good. If we were back in Section 8, I think we could have easily swept through.

Head Coach Chad Hayda came into the season optimistic about his team's chances, but knew firsthand the section tourney would be a gauntlet.

"I think we're still a topeight team in the state,' Hayda said. "It's tough to get out of this section. It has three of the top-five teams in the state. At the end of the day, we got the butt whooping we needed to kind of propel us into

next year." The butt whooping Hayda was referring to not only came on the scoreboard, hung in early, but defending all game led to a lopsided second half.

"They had the midfield depth, and we didn't today," Hayda said. "We didn't have the ball all game, so we got tired really early. That's' when the floodgates started happening, and it went downhill in the second half. Deep midfield teams like Chanhassen have always given us problems.'

Even after suffering a rare loss, moods weren't too down after the season-ending defeat.

Kology and Nuss will lead a strong returning senior class in 2023. Nuss finished the season leading the state with 52 assists. His 78 points also finished among the state leaders. Buffalo also returns juniors Dalum, Moseley, Valli, and Malaki Hansen.

Buffalo graduates five seniors that helped post a 14-1 season and its first Lake Conference title. Carlson scored over 100 goals over his career. Helmbrecht also graduates, as does Pedersen and Tanner Huebner.
