

champs. The Cardinals overcame a seven-stroke deficit on day one to win the tournament with a 649. Brainerd was runner-up at 663.

"We have a tough conference and a tough section, and to end the year making the cut and finishing sixth shows the girls how successful the year has been," said Head Coach Tim Murray. "The girls really played well at sections and found everything working."

The six girls picked by the coaching staff to participate in the section meet came down to simple math.

"Growing up, I played hockey, and I can remember it being near impossible to know the exact line you should put out there,' Murray said. "For the section lineup, it simply came down to scores. These six had the lowest scores throughout the year and late in the season.

Murray felt a chance to see the course earlier in the year at pre-sections, along with a relaxed frame of mind was a key reason for their success.

"At sections, they were relaxed," Murray said. "We have talked all year about just getting out there and playing golf - kind of a whatever happens, happens, mentality. And it finally came together."

Wurm and Rohlin had finished 1-2 in the majority of events this season, but for the rest of the girls that shot varsity events, while the scores finished near the bottom of the leaderboard, they were winners in Murray's eyes.

'We talked about all year that they were hitting the ball well and making good, smart decisions, but the scores just hadn't shown that," Murray said. "Section

scores finally showed how far they've come, and it was really exciting to see the scores where I knew that they could be. Every girl has worked to improve every day and every meet."

Unlike any other season in years past, this year's squad had to fight through some poor spring conditions, making the season shorter with a schedule that forced them to compete in multiple meets throughout a week.

With a lot of time missed in the classroom, Murray still had multiple golfers excel.

"The girls handled it better than I could have hoped," Murray said. "Between supporting other sports, to participating in National Honor Society, to participating in Unified Prom, to staying caught up in school, to figuring out what their own post-secondary life looks, they really found a way to balance it all, and they should be proud of their accomplishments and success.
