Lumberjacks hold on late for thrilling win

Granite City wins first of three straight games versus Willmar

The Granite City Lumberjacks have rarely found themselves in nail-biters, having played only two games this season decided by one goal.

However, the Willmar WarHawks gave Granite City a scare in the final period of their most recent showdown, scoring a pair of goals in a minute-and-a-half to cut drastically into a three-goal Lumberjacks lead.

Despite this sudden adversity, the Lumberjacks buckled down and picked up a 4-3 victory Nov. 5 at Willmar Civic Center Arena in Willmar.

"Every time we play them and beat them, it's a good win for us," said D.J. Vold, associate head coach. "I didn't think it was our best game, but we did enough to win."

Granite City and Willmar sit first and third in the West Division, respectively, and the game reflected that close competition. Neither team found the scoreboard for the first 28 minutes of the contest, with the Lumberjacks' man advantage coming up empty time and time against Willmar's penalty kill.

"The first period felt like kind of a chess match," Vold said. "Everyone was feeling each other out and that's why there was no scoring. We kind of went back and forth."

The WarHawks broke through with the first score of the game eight minutes and 24 seconds into the second period, and that appeared to be a wake-up call for the 14-1 Lumberjacks. On Granite City's first shift following the goal, Kullan Daikawa found the back of the net to tie the game up at one.



Youth a dominant theme for Storm'n Sabres on the ice

Girls hockey team looks to get to speed quickly after losing 13 players

There is plenty of newness when it comes to the Sauk Rapids-Rice/ Sartell girls hockey team for the 2021-22 season. One, the Storm'n

Sabres lost 13 seniors and have six eighth graders on the roster. Two, they have a sparkling new facility in which to practice in the RDR Arena – the second sheet of ice inside the Scheels Athletic Complex in

Sartell. "We've got a lot of young and new players," said Marty Anderson, who is in his 13th season as SRRS head coach. "There's been a lot of focus on getting them up to speed of what we're trying to do. We've had more turnover this year than I've ever had, and I've been pleasantly surprised with how they've taken to it. We'll continue to have growing pains, but I like the progression and work ethic."

The Storm'n Sabres are coming off a 4-12-2 record in a shortened 2020-21 season, and they will have to replace a huge chunk of their offense. Four of the top five scorers - Lauren Wensel, Rachel Wieland, Jayden Lommel and Morgan Cromwell -

graduated. Expected to replace that offense will be senior cocaptains Kelly Carriere, Erik Johnson and Chloe Reiter. Carriere is the top returning scorer with seven goals

and four assists last season, followed by Johnson with three goals and three assists. "It's definitely a

dramatic change with losing so many seniors, but we're seeing improvement going on," said Reiter, who had one goal last season. "We'll need to put together plays. As we progress and get to know each other more, we can put pucks on sticks more. I hope we can be in the top five in the section. We have a bunch of positivity, and we're communicating well." Early in the season,

the experienced defensive core of Johnson along with juniors Tia Vogt, Anna Lundeen and Peyton Sabart. Morgan Dorn, who played every game in goal as a freshman last season, is also back.

"We're going to be strong on the defensive end," Anderson said. "We've got four returning defensemen who will play a lot and a goalie who played every game last year. We'll expect a lot out of them and hope that solidifying the defensive end will lead to some offense."

with a save percentage of .870. She said she enjoys the responsibility and pressure involved with being a goaltender.

"I like that I have the ability to change the game," Dorn said. "I can make a big save and change the way the momentum goes. So far, I really like our defense. We have some strong skaters there, and we're hoping we can turn some of that defense into goals."

Anderson, an Ely native for the youth program, who played college hockey at Gustavus, said he has been impressed with his team's willingness to learn.

"You have to remind yourself that you probably can't expect them to know everything we're doing, so you've got to slow down a little bit and go through some more details that you take for granted with a more experienced group," Anderson said. "It's more of a teaching phase, especially in the beginning.

That's a good thing. It's fun to see young energy.'

The Storm'n Sabres got their first taste of action in a three-team scrimmage Nov. 6 in Lakeville and opened the season Nov. 11 at Rogers. Their home opener against North Wright County is at 3 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 13, at Bernick's Arena in Sartell.

The extra sheet of ice allows for the team to have consistent practice times in addition to extra ice time which Anderson said is extremely important.

"The extra sheet of ice has allowed us to practice a little bit more and a little longer," Anderson said. "We're not fluctuating to 6 and 9 p.m. practice times, which gives us some continuity. We take it in phases. We look at it as what is our progression up to Thanksgiving, then what's our progression to Christmas and then to playoffs?"

For Peterson, the chance to play at this level is not something she will forget.



Twins offseason primer

The 2021 season was an unmitigated disaster for the Minnesota Twins. Coming off two consecutive division championships, expectations were understandably high for an organization that boasted a solid core of young talent and a cadre of veterans who were signed to push the team over the top. However, instead of taking the next step forward, the vast majority of the team's core players regressed or battled injuries while the team's free agent signings

flopped. The result of that lovely combination was a woeful 73-89 record, which was a whopping 15.5 games below their projected over/under win total in Vegas. The Twins were worse than disappointing in 2021 – they were embarrassing.

Things really can't get much worse for the Twins in 2022. If you want to look at things through an optimistic lens, the team's weaknesses are clearly defined, and the front office reportedly has been given the green light from ownership to spend money to plug those holes in a strong free agent class. The team's three biggest needs are starting pitching, relief help and finding a shortstop who can 1, but it will likely be guys who get surprisingly hit his way out of a wet paper bag. Players who fit those descriptions are all readily available.

The problem with this front office regime in recent years has been that they've tried to thread the needle of not committing too much longterm money to free agents while still acquiring productive players. That's not an easy thing to do, and as we found out last year with signings like Alex Colome, J.A. Happ, Andrelton Simmons and Matt Shoemaker, you can't always rely on your coaching staff to polish up players you find in the bargain bin. I understand the Twins are a mid-market team and can't spend Boston, New York or Los Angeles money in free agency. I also understand they are going to consistently be a

losing team if J.A. Happ is the best starting pitcher they acquire in a given offseason.

the looming expiration of the current collective bargaining agreement Dec. 1. It seems increasingly likely that baseball's owners will lock out the players starting in December, and that will forestall any signings or trades. While I'm fairly confident things will

be resolved prior to the start of the 2022 regular season, I wouldn't be surprised if there's almost no significant movement with the free agent market prior to a frenzy in February. Remember, deadlines drive action, and the new collective bargaining agreement will likely be inked right before the start of spring training games when owners would start losing revenue. That hurts a team like the Twins, who like to find value by waiting out the market and signing veterans who missed out on top of the market deals. The Twins likely won't have that luxury this offseason.

We might see a few players sign prior to Dec. strong offers (like Andrew Heaney, who signed with the Dodgers for \$6.75 million despite posting a 5.83 ERA and 1.32 WHIP last season) or fringe players who want to lock in long-term financial security by taking under-market extended deals. Because it's unclear if draft-pick compensation will be required to sign free agents that were tendered qualifying offers, my bet is that none of the players in that situation will sign prior to Dec. 1.

In an upcoming column, we'll take a look at the available free agents to see who the Twins might pursue. Until then, let's cross our fingers the Twins can jump the market and ink a high impact player to a deal before December.

The fact the Sauk Rapids-Rice volleyball team topped Alexandria for the Section 8AAA title Nov. 6 likely came as a surprise to many. Not included in that group were the Storm players.

The team talked confidently about their chances against heavily favored Alexandria, and they obviously believed it. The Storm blew past the Cardinals in four sets in front of a large and ear-splitting crowd at Melrose Area High School to reach the state tournament for the first time since 1988. Scores were 25-18, 13-25, 25-18 and 25-22.

"When we came out and won the first set. it really shook them, and we kept coming at them hard," said sophomore Ava Athman, who had eight kills and four blocks. "I'm honestly in awe right now. It just came down to wanting to achieve our goal. Everything clicked. We worked together as a team and it all fell into place. We wanted this one.'

The Storm played Kasson-Mantorville in

The Cardinals were the overwhelming top seed in the section and were ranked fifth in Class AAA.

The Storm (13-16) had other ideas. They came out aggressive from the opening point and served notice they would not go away quietly, taking a 17-8 lead in the opening set on their way to a convincing win.

The Cardinals got the wakeup call and won the second set in the same fashion. SRR did not panic, pulling to an 18-14 lead in the third set.

"We decided to

start back at o-o with our record and knew we only needed to win three games to make it to state," junior hitter Morgan Eggert said. "We knew we could do it, and we all had the confidence in each other. We just came together to pull it off."

The fourth set was a back-and-forth affair, featuring many ties and lead changes. The Storm scored two straight points to pull ahead 21-19, leading to an Alexandria timeout.

Like it did all night, SRR found a way to

finish, clinching a victory and a wild celebration.

We were so confident coming in and they were pretty cocky coming into it, so we worked really hard to prepare and it paid off," said senior Darci Peterson, who had teambest 12 kills and 14 digs. "It doesn't feel real. I tried to cry, but I was just so happy I didn't know what to do. I dropped to the floor and found my favorite person, Hailee. It's so amazing.'

Senior Kieryn Hirdler led the Storm offense with 32 set assists to go along with four digs. Lexi Helmin added five kills and two blocks, Sophia

For coach Karen Beckmann, who is in her fourth year leading the program, the victory was a culmination of a team that has been steadily progressing since mid-October.

"We had been practicing really hard and looking at what they do, what we do and what we need to do to overcome them," Beckmann said. "The last three weeks, it's been coming together. They've been overcoming things and not quitting. The part that was cool is when things weren't clicking, they sat down, talked about it and figured it out."
