## Leaning on experience

Alexandria returns plenty of talent from 14-win team

The Alexandria baseball team didn't have the end to the 2021 season that it wanted to when Alexandria fell 8-7 to Rocori in the Section 8-3A elimination game.

The Cardinals are looking to put that result in the past and use it as fuel to get back to that point.

"Our section is hands down the best outstate section in the state of Minnesota," Alexandria head coach Jake Munsch said. "Each year, there are multiple teams from the CLC that are entering the state tournament. So any night, if you don't play well, you're going to lose. # Braeden Sladek commits to Kansas

Alexandria standout to play in the Big 12

nyone following Alexandria's Braeden Sladek from a young age could have seen a commitment to a golf program in a major Division I conference coming.

That came to fruition a week before the start of his junior season with the Cardinals. On March 14, Sladek made his verbal commitment to the Kansas Jayhawks out of the Big 12 Conference.

Sladek talked to multiple different

programs around the country. Notre Dame, Auburn, Iowa State and Kansas State are some of the coaching staffs that had reached out. In the end, it came down to a decision between staying home at the University of Minnesota or heading a little bit further south to Kansas. That warmer climate and the opportunity to play through a longer golf season was a big factor in why Sladek chose the Jayhawks.

"I wanted to go somewhere I could play year round," Sladek said. "I can in Kansas. It's definitely not 80 degrees and sunny every day. There's ups and downs and some snow here and there, but you can basically play year

round. That was a lot of my decision. I didn't want to go somewhere (as far away as) like Florida or California. But Kansas is still kind of that Midwestern area, but yet it's year round."

Sladek has played in Alexandria's varsity lineup since his 7th-grade season. He won the Section 8-3A individual championship as a 7th-grader and has been All-Central Lakes Conference every year in the program.

Sladek is coming off of a 2021 summer where he set a course record at the Geneva Golf Club in Alexandria with an 11-under par 60 in June. He traveled the country competing against other top juniors, qualifying for the U.S.

Junior Amateur, and then became what tournament organizers believe is the youngest Men's Division champion at the 100th playing of the Resorters Tournament at the Alexandria Golf Club this past August.

The 2021 Resorters Tournament, a matchplay event, drew a talented field that included many current and former Division I players. Winning against those types of golfers was a good confidence boost for the then 16-year-old. Kansas, led by head coach Jamie Bermel, first reached out to Sladek around that same time frame last August.
