WCA-Ashby secures spot in Class AA state playoffs

FARGO — Before the biggest snap of his life, West Central Area-Ashby quarterback Evan Paulson may have felt figuratively that he had the weight of the Knights' communities on his back. Seconds later, Paulson may have felt that literally.

The stout Paulson took the snap, lowered his head and, with the help of about 1,000 pounds of offensive linemen, road-gradered the pile of bodies over the goal line for the winning points in the Knights 19-14 win over Osakis in the Section 6AA championship game Friday in the Fargodome.

"I just kept moving," Paulson said, "and our linemen had a great push in there. Just pushed my way in."

The 9-1 Knights play the Class AA quarterfinals against Section 7AA champion Moose Lake/ Willow River (8-0) at 7 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 11, in Brainerd, Minn. MLWR has five shutouts and have outscored their opponents by an average of 50-7.

West Central Area-Ashby wasted little time trying to get the lead back. Paulson hit Cole Anderson for a 38-yard gain that field and returned it to put the Knights on the Osakis 15 with 5:13 to play. But one play later, Paulson's throw into the end zone was intercepted for a touchback.

"We knew we still had to keep making plays," Paulson said. "We never quit the whole game, even after we hit some tough spots. That interception was tough. So we had to go do it again.

Osakis wanted to gain yards and burn clock,

"It made it 1st-and-20 go-ahead score, calling instead of 1st-and-10 when we're trying to run clock," said Osakis head coach Bill Infanger. "We wanted to pound it in there and eat up those four minutes. (The penalty) put us in a tough spot."

With Osakis forced to punt with 2:49 to play, the Knights' Olson fielded it at about midthe Silverstreaks' 32. They moved to the 15 but faced a 3rd-and-10. A shifty run by Sykora netted nine and, on maybe an even more important QB sneak, on fourth down, Paulson drove ahead for the first down.

With 54 seconds left, Paulson scored the go-ahead TD a play later and linebacker Mattson

Hoff intercepted Mages at midfield and returned it 14 yards before sliding to the turf with 47 seconds left.

"As far as two-minute drills, that's about the best set up as you can be," said West Central head coach Nate Wood. "With plenty of time, we could run whatever we wanted and know we'd still be able to get another play in."

Despite the tense moments and pressure situations, the Knights thrive, Sykora said.

"It really came down to the wire in the fourth quarter but we kept working," Sykora said. "It's a team effort and we worked hard. That's all we do, get the tough wins."

"Our guys just stuck with it," Empting said. "These guys are gritty, resilient, gutsy. They have my respect."

Alexandria showed all of that by rallying with less than three minutes left and down by two touchdowns. Senior quarterback Carter Steffensmeier had a long run down to the Bemidji 1-yard line, but he took a hard hit that took him out of the game for one play.

Senior receiver Kristen Hoskins took a direct snap on the next play and ran in a touchdown that made it a 7-point deficit after the Myles Sansted extra point with 2:48 left.

The Cardinals went to the onside kick next. Freshman Daniel Jackson faked the kick to the right before Sansted hit a perfectlyplaced ball to the left that took a high bounce. Alexandria jarred the ball loose as players collided, and junior Kelly Johnson jumped on it to give his team

the football back.

"It was going to the edge there, and it just came down in my hands," Johnson said. "We definitely needed it. Everyone on the sideline was telling us on that crew, 'Go get that onside kick.' It just ended up being me. We felt confident. We just got rolling right away, and we felt like it was our game. We took off from there."

Steffensmeier was back in on the offensive possession, and he hit Johnson on a 24-yard pass down to the 3-yard line. Will Heydt scored from 3-yards out, and Hoskins ran in the 2-point conversion to give Alexandria a 36-35

lead with 2:28 left. Both teams put up more than 400 yards of total offense. The Cardinals' defense stepped up when Bemidji was forced to pass as Pfeffer intercepted Jack Larson on the 13-yard line. Hoskins added his fourth touchdown as Alexandria scored 22 unanswered points in the final three minutes

Bemidji looked like a different team than the one that lost 38-20 to the Cardinals on Sept. 10. Ellis went 53 yards for a rushing touchdown on their very first offensive play of the game. The senior back finished with three touchdowns and almost 290 yards rushing on 23 carries.

Alexandria needed somebody to counter that star power, and Hoskins was there to do it. The future University of Minnesota receiver had two receiving touchdowns, two rushing touchdowns and almost 230 total yards. His interception on defense sealed the win on Bemidji's final offensive possession
