Fargo commissioner to host town hall meeting on drag racing problem

FARGO — City officials are hosting an interactive town hall meeting to discuss concerns on drag racing and noise complaints on Fargo streets on Thursday, May 5.

The meeting will be from 5:30 to 7 p.m. in the city commission chambers at City Hall, 225 Fourth St. N. It will be broadcast live on TV Fargo 56 and the city's social media channels.

City Commissioner Arlette Preston will moderate the event, where the public will be encouraged to share their experiences and opinions. Representatives from the Fargo Police Department and city engineering department will be on hand to share insight into current operations and future plans.

Authorities ID man who died after shootout with Bismarck police officers

BISMARCK — The Bismarck Police Department on Tuesday, May 3, released the name of the man who died after he and officers exchanged gunfire in a mobile home park.

Eric Anthony Hermanson, 31, died on Monday, May 2, in a mobile home park in east Bismarck after he allegedly shot at officers during a foot pursuit. Hermanson and two Bismarck police officers were involved in the shootout.

Authorities said Hermanson, a Bismarck resident, barricaded himself in a shed where they later found him deceased from an apparent gunshot wound. It's unclear whether Hermanson sustained the gunshot from the shooting with the officers or if it was self-inflicted, officials said. No officers were injured in the incident.

Though the officers were at the

mobile home park investigating a stolen vehicle, officials did not confirm whether Hermanson stole the vehicle.

The Bismarck Police Department has not released the names of the officers involved in the shooting, which the North Dakota Bureau of Criminal Investigations is now investigating.

Hermanson has an extensive criminal background, according to court records, and he was a registered sex offender as of March 4.

The North Dakota Sex Offender Registry states Hermanson was convicted of gross sexual imposition in Williams County District Court in 2012. His risk level was "low" and he was classified as having "delinquent" status, meaning he did not submit proper registration to law enforcement or a change of name, according to the state's sex offender registry. The registry states "Delinquent offenders cannot be mapped, as their address is unknown."

Hermanson has pleaded guilty to multiple felony theft charges, the most recent of which was filed in December in Emmons County, court records show.

Fargo hires financial ops veteran as new city finance director

FARGO — A Texas woman with more than 20 years of experience in financial operations has been hired as the city of Fargo's new finance director.

Terri Gayhart, who is currently director of finance for the American Quarter Horse Association in Amarillo, was hired on a unanimous vote by the Fargo City Commission on Monday night, May 2.

Gayhart has had numerous finance director positions with several cities, including most recently with Las Cruces, New Mexico, from 2019 to 2021.

She has also been a city finance director for Odesa, Texas, and Mount Pleasant and Burlington in Wisconsin.

Gayhart, who will be paid a salary of \$169,215,

told the city commissioners via telephone at their meeting that she felt "really lucky to be joining such a great team."

"I'm so excited, this means so much to me," she said.

Assistant City Administrator Mike Redlinger said she was selected from a field of 18 applicants with six being virtually interviewed. On April 11, she was interviewed by a 10-member selection committee and was asked leadership, technical and behavioral questions.

Redlinger said she offered some new ideas and city officials can learn from her experiences.

City Commissioner John Strand said he is proud of the city as it offered another top leadership position to a woman.

Gayhart replaces longtime city finance director Kent Costin, who retired last month.

In 1979, Jim opened River Valley Printing where he spent much of his time for the next twenty years. In 1989, Jim returned to his passion for restaurants, opening Ollie's, a gourmet candy store and deli. Jim concluded his fulfilling career as Executive Director of the Chamber of Commerce, retiring in 2011.

Throughout his entire life, Jim was committed to serving the community. In 1975, he was a charter member of the Wahpeton Optimist Club, starting an endowment that continues to support youth organizations today. Jim was an entrepreneur, visionary, and local historian, happy to share a story over coffee with friends. Preservation of history was an ongoing passion with an innovative spark, always eager to try something new.

Jim is survived by his wife, Donelyn; sons, Benjamin (Lucy Lehmann) Wahpeton, Gabriel (Elisabeth) Washington DC, and Joseph (Joelle) Chaska MN; grandchildren, Wesley, Christina, Patrick, Lucy, and Jonas; sister, Carol (Bill) Daniels; in-laws Donald and Dorothy Prochnow, Bella Velazquez; and his dog Ruby. Minnesota State Moorhead assistant men's basketball coach Tim Bergstraser has been with the Dragons program for six seasons and associated with the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference, as a player or coach, for nearly 10. He's ready to take the next step in his coaching career.

Bergstraser is one of three finalists for the Dragons head men's coaching position and had his final on-campus interviews Tuesday, May 3.

"I've been part of a lot of successful programs and I do understand what it takes to

compete in this league," said Bergstraser, who played at St. Cloud State. "I've played and coached in it for almost 10 years now and I understand how this beast operates."

The 31-year-old Bergstraser has been an assistant coach for former MSUM head coach Chad Walthall for six seasons. Walthall stepped down as head coach early this spring after 12 seasons leading the program. Bergstraser has been the program's acting head coach since Walthall retired.

"This place has had a winning tradition here at MSUM and Walthall has done a heckuva job with that and I've been fortunate enough to

be with him for six of those years," Bergstraser said. "They've always done things the right way here with the program and on top of that we've always had outstanding people in our program. I think we've done a heckuva job of bringing in the right people to fit how we do things and fit the standards of our program."

Eastern Washington assistant coach Mark Darnall and Hillsdale (Mich.) College associate head coach Keven Bradley are also finalists and will have their on-campus interviews later this week. Bradley is also a finalist for the head men's coaching position at St. Cloud State.

# Schiller commits to Northern Michigan

17-year-old Moorhead hockey defenseman gets drafted by USHL's Cedar Rapids

MOORHEAD — It's been a whirlwind 24 hours for Moorhead hockey defenseman Joe Schiller.

Just after 6 p.m. Monday night, Schiller announced on social media his commitment to play Division I college hockey at Northern Michigan University. On Tuesday afternoon just after 12:30 p.m., Schiller was selected as the 114th overall pick by the Cedar Rapids RoughRiders in the United States Hockey League Phase II Draft.

Two major steps in the 17-year-old's hockey career were taken in a matter of hours.

Schiller has spent the last two seasons manning the blue line for Moorhead, switching between third

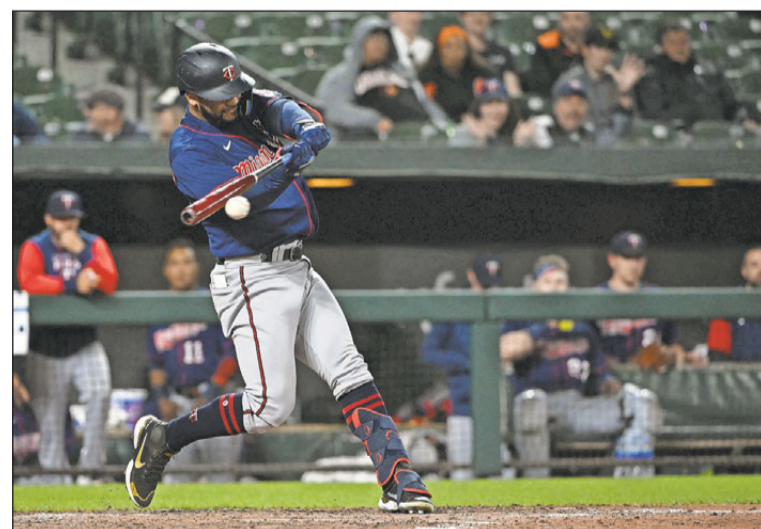
and second lines during his sophomore season before becoming a mainstay on the second line as a junior this past season.

Now, Schiller is off to being a RoughRider in the fall before joining the Wild-

cats in Marquette, Michigan, at a later date.

"It's obviously a tremendous honor," Schiller said. "It's really exciting and I'm just really excited for the future with Cedar Rapids."

# Jeffers helps lead Twins to fourth straight win

BALTIMORE — It was nearly two weeks ago after a lackluster game in Kansas City in which the Twins went down quickly and collected just five hits in a 2-0 loss, their fourth in their past five games, that catcher Ryan Jeffers predicted things would turn around soon.

"We feel really close," Jeffers said that day. "We feel

like we're almost there."

The next day, the Twins won, the first of what would become a seven-game winning streak. They've lost just one game since then, and on Tuesday, they rattled off their fourth straight win, Jeffers playing a leading role in the 7-2 victory over the Baltimore Orioles on Tuesday night at Oriole Park at Camden Yards.

# Wild should use goalie depth while it can still make a difference

The Wild don't have a goaltending problem, not with two good ones. But do they have a goalie issue? They will if they can't even up their first-round, best-of-seven playoff series against St. Louis on Wednesday.

Nine times out of 10, rolling Marc-Andre Fleury out for a postseason game is a no-brainer. The veteran has his name on three Stanley Cups and last season led Vegas into the Western Conference final — two years after leading the Golden Knights into the Cup final. The issue is that Minnesota has Cam Talbot, better down the stretch than his fêted teammate, on the bench.

Had Bill Guerin not acquired Fleury, his former Pittsburgh Penguins teammate, at the March 21 trade deadline, coach Dean Evason and the Wild would run with Talbot and feel good about it, just as they did last season in a seven-game series against Vegas.

Maybe it still is a no-brainer for Wild coach Dean Evason. He might not have exactly greased the skids Tuesday for Fleury's return in Game 2, but the coach made it clear he didn't blame the goaltender for Monday's 4-0 loss in Game 1 at Xcel Energy Center.

Fleury left a lot of rebounds out there for the Blues, who turned four of them into goals. But three of those goals were, for all intents and purposes, the result of power plays, even if the third — all were by left winger David Perron — came a few seconds after the clock had wound down on a Blues man-advantage.

Perron might have been the fortunate recipient of three rebounds that just about found his tape but, Evason noted, "There's

nobody there to contest it, either."

On Ryan O'Reilly's second-period, even-strength goal, which gave the Blues a 2-0 lead, he was standing alone at the corner of the crease and able to get his own rebound past a scrambling Fleury.

"There's not a soul around him, right?" Evason said. "That's where we need people in that area to collect. That's the ultimate example. He tips it and gets his own rebound, and there's nobody to help out. That's not Marc-Andre Fleury's fault. That's us for not being around and clearing the puck."

The Blues' victory was complete, stem to stern. That includes goalie play.

But Fleury is allowed to leave rebounds, especially likely when he's making difficult first saves. His first big task, in fact, was stopping a penalty shot by Ivan Barbeshev at 3:50 of the first period. Blues goaltender Ville Husso left some juicy

rebounds for the Wild, too, and the best Minnesota could do with any of them was hit the post.

For someone who thought Evason should have started Talbot on Monday, starting him in Wednesday night's game makes sense. Talbot was good down the stretch, and at his best after the Wild acquired Fleury, 8-0-3 with a 2.25 goals-against average and .926 save percentage. The two split time as the season wound down. Why change

now?

Some of this might simply be aesthetic. Fleury, 37, is something of an anachronism among goaltenders in the way that Martin Brodeur used to be an anachronism during his last days in New Jersey. Modern goaltenders are technicians, trained to stay on their feet. Fleury more of a pure athlete, diving, lunging and scrambling for pucks others might not get to.

But he also needs his skaters to sweep away rebounds.

Evason says he doesn't look past the game in front of him and that's probably smart, especially in the postseason, when every loss is a nail in a team's coffin. One presumes he'll start the goaltender he feels gives the Wild the best chance to even this series before it heads for St. Louis.

As he said on Sunday, he has two good options, so the choice is an easy one. But down a game, home-ice advantage lost, it's at least a little harder.

If Fleury goes out Wednesday and the Wild win, there is no issue. But Evason said Monday night he suspects if the Wild are to make a deep playoff run, both goaltenders will be required. Is a 1-0 deficit in a seven-game series too early to tap that depth? No. And waiting until they're in trouble might be too late.

Minnesota's goaltender depth is an advantage, and the Wild should use it before it's too late to make a difference.

# Wild's Spurgeon avoids suspension after vicious cross check

**Defenseman fined the maximum of \$5,000**

ST. PAUL — Minnesota Wild captain Jared Spurgeon should consider himself lucky.

A frustration play by Spurgeon late in a Game 1 playoff loss to the St. Louis Blues on Monday night at the Xcel Energy Center had many wondering whether the

32-year-old defenseman would be available for Game 2 of the first round.

With 1:46 left in the final period of the series opener, and the Wild trailing 4-0, Spurgeon got tangled up with Blues winger Pavel Buchnevich in the defensive zone. With both players kneeling on the ice, Spurgeon turned his attention toward Buchnevich, then delivered a vicious cross check directly to his ankle.

After being assessed a minor penalty in the immediate aftermath,

Spurgeon awaited his fate on Tuesday morning as the NHL Department of Player Safety reviewed the incident. In the end, Spurgeon was fined \$5,000, the maximum allowable under the NHL's collective bargaining agreement.

"Honestly, it's not something I'm really proud of," Spurgeon said. "Just happy he's alright. That was something that I usually don't do. That's not the player I am. Not very happy with myself, to say the least."

It was a very uncharac-

teristic play from Spurgeon. He's usually cool, calm and collected on ice, not to mention last season's runner-up for the Lady Byng Trophy, an award given annually to the player judged to have exhibited the best type of sportsmanship and gentlemanly conduct combined with a high standard of playing ability.

"I don't think he is that type of player," Blues center Brayden Schenn said of Spurgeon. "I think it's maybe in the moment where he is frustrated and tried

to take a shot at him. Good thing is, Buchy is OK. The league handled it the way they can. We can't really do anything about it."

In a lot of ways, the outburst from Spurgeon was a microcosm of the frustration that had been building up for the Wild throughout the game.

"We were frustrated last night and we took some bad penalties," Wild coach Dean Evason said. "That's a bad penalty. He knows it. We know it. We've got to clean it up. It's prob-

ably a good example, right? Not probably. It is a good example. When Jared Spurgeon does something like that, that means the group is off kilter a little bit. They'll rein it back in and he'll be the guy to do it."

Meanwhile, the Blues coach Craig Berube tried to downplay the situation, not wanting to give any credence to the hostile act while his team leads 1-0 in the best-of-7 series.

"It's whatever," Berube said. That's the league, not me. I have no comment on it."

# Giving Minnesota the Blues

Wild are an abysmal 2-8-5 in their past 15 meetings with the St. Louis

ST. PAUL — If the Minnesota Wild sound like a group trying to convince themselves that the St. Louis Blues aren't in their head, well, it's because that's exactly what's happening right now.

It's the only explanation for the Wild so casually moving on from Monday's 4-0 loss at the Xcel Energy Center in the opener of the NHL playoff series.

Any chance the frustration from Game 1 would linger?

"Nope," coach Dean Evason said. "This is gone."

What's the confidence level heading into Game 2?

"It's going to be a long series," winger Marcus Foligno said. "We know how to play these guys."

Really? The recent struggles would suggest otherwise.

Since the start of 2019-20 season, the Wild are an abysmal 2-8-5 in their past 15 games against the Blues. While that means the Wild have only beaten the Blues twice in that span, it looks even worse

when considering the flip side of the equation. Since the start of 2019-20 season, the Blues are 13-1-1 in their past 15

meetings with the Wild. It's starting to look at lot like those Chicago Blackhawks teams from the mid-2010's. Back

then, no matter how good the Wild felt they were heading into the playoffs, they never found a way to get past the Blackhawks.

As for the Blues, as much as the Wild claimed last week that things would be different in the playoffs, everything in Game 1 went pretty much just the way it always has between these two teams. Why should anyone expect anything different moving forward?

"Our ability to forget and move forward (this season) has been absolutely fantastic," Evason said after a sparsely attended optional skate on Tuesday morning. "It clearly has to be when the puck is dropped tomorrow night."

Truthfully, if the Wild want to have any chance in the series, they absolutely have to respond in Game 2.

If they find a way to even it up at 1-1 before heading to St. Louis for the next two games, that would give them a reason to be confident. If they fall behind 0-2, though, it's human nature that doubt might start to creep into the locker room.

In the meantime, the Wild deserve some credit for saying all the right things on the heels of yet another loss to the Blues. They don't sound like a group that has given up on themselves.

"There's no lack of confidence," captain Jared Spurgeon said. "When we're playing 5 on 5, we did have a bunch of chances that weren't going in for us. If we get our special teams playing better, it's a different game. It's the first game of a series that obviously didn't go our way. The next game is tomorrow, (and) we have to rebound."

Speaking of Spurgeon, he's lucky to be available for Game 2. He got slapped on the wrist with a \$5,000 fine Tuesday in lieu of a suspension for a vicious slash to Blues winger Pavel Buchnevich late in Game 1.

That moment of frustration from Spurgeon, while channeled in the wrong way, was a microcosm of what every player of the Wild was likely feeling as the final seconds ticked away in the Game 1 loss. They were

frustrated, and they had every right to be.

Asked postgame how difficult it is to move on from a frustrating loss in the playoffs, veteran goaltender Marc-Andre Fleury might have put it best. He's mastered the art of moving on throughout his illustrious career.

"It's not easy tonight," Fleury said. "As a team it's, 'What could we have done different to win this?' Then tomorrow comes and it's a new day. You learn from tonight and come back with a smile. Just keep working and get ready for next game."

That appears to be what the Wild are doing. They truly believe they can beat the Blues if they play up to their potential. At least that's what they're telling themselves heading into the rest of the series.

"Yeah, they've had our number," Foligno said. "We don't think about that. We are a team that focuses on the task at hand and takes it day by day. We lost Game 1. Now we're looking forward to Game 2."

## A quick review of ND fishing regs and definitions

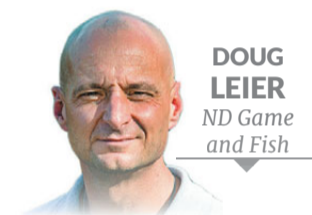

It was mid-March when the first open water fishing reports from the Missouri River started feeding the spring fishing frenzy of anglers. Some anglers have two months of fishing behind them, while others wait for Memorial Day weekend, signaling the kickoff of summer fishing.

First things first. There's always time to review fishing rules and regulations. While it may be convenient to ask your fishing buddies, bait shop or fishing equipment experts, the best advice is to check the regulations yourself.

Anglers can find the 2022-24 North Dakota Fishing Guide on the North Dakota Game and Fish Department website, [gf.nd.gov](http://gf.nd.gov), or at Game and Fish Department offices and license vendors throughout the state.

Noteworthy regulation changes for this year include:

- ▶ An increase in the statewide smallmouth/largemouth bass daily limit from 3 to 5 and possession limit from 6



to 10.

- ▶ Allow for the taking of walleye during the darkhouse spearfishing season for the Missouri River System, Devils Lake and Stump Lake.

- ▶ Allow for the use of legal live baitfish at Crown Butte, Kettle Lake, Nygren Dam and Sather Dam.

A new license was required as of April 1, and if you've not been fishing, the 2022-23 fishing licenses can be purchased on the Game and Fish website.

If you have ever wondered about some of the specific definitions for North Dakota anglers and waters, here are some of the more important:

- ▶ **Game fish** are bluegill, burbot, channel catfish, chinook salmon, crappie (black and white), largemouth bass, muskellunge (pure and hybrid), northern

pike, paddlefish, sauger, saugeye, smallmouth bass, sturgeon (pallid, shovelnose and lake), trout (brown, lake, rainbow and cutthroat), walleye, white bass, yellow perch and zander.

- ▶ **Legal live baitfish** are fathead minnows, creek chubs, sticklebacks, white suckers and rainbow smelt.

Some of the more common rules and

regulations include:

- ▶ Depositing or leaving any litter (including refuse, bottles, cans, etc.) or other waste material in the water, on shore or on the ice is illegal.

- ▶ It is illegal to introduce anything into waters of the state for the purpose of attempting to attract fish (e.g. chumming, artificial light, acoustic

equipment, etc.) that is not attached or applied to a lure.

- ▶ Stocking of any live fish, live fish eggs, live amphibians or other live aquatic organisms into any waters of the state is illegal except with the appropriate license or permit issued by the Game and Fish director.

- ▶ Transportation of any live fish, live fish eggs, live amphibians

or other live aquatic organisms is illegal.

Fish may be filleted for transport, unless size limits apply, under the following conditions:

- ▶ Each individual portion of the meat removed from a fish is considered a fillet.

- ▶ Two fillets are counted as one fish.

- ▶ The packaging of fish must be done in a manner so that the fillets can be readily separated and counted. If fillets are frozen, they must be packaged so that the fillets are separated and thus can be easily counted without thawing.

- ▶ Gifted fish, including packages of fish, must be accompanied with the following information from the individual gifting the fish: name, fishing license number, phone number, date, species and number of fish gifted.

- ▶ Except for legally gifted fish, it is illegal to possess or transport another individual's game fish or parts thereof without the license holder accompanying or as otherwise permitted.

## Blues play buzz killers, again, to spoil another Minnesota hockey party

ST. PAUL — A cursory glance at the St. Louis Blues playoff roster shows that they do not indeed have a player named Buzz Killington. Although Minnesota Wild fans might not believe that.

The two most-hyped games the Wild have played in this best season in franchise history have been the 2022 Winter Classic on the first day of January and the 2022 playoff opener on the second day of May. And in both instances, a division rival from Missouri showed up to ruin all the fun.

Unlike the New Year's Day extravaganza of outdoor hockey, at least it was above zero for Monday's postseason debacle. A sellout crowd poured into downtown St. Paul hours before the 8:45 p.m. puck drop, filled Rice Park with chants and colorful sweaters and filed into the rink determined that even after three decades of playoff futility among the state's

four major men's sports teams — the Wild, Twins, Vikings and Timberwolves — that somehow this would be different.

And almost from the first puck drop, they were handed an uncomfortably familiar menu from which to choose a few meager pickings. If you squinted at young Blues goalie Ville Husso as he kicked aside anything and everything thrown his way for his third shutout of the season you could've sworn he was Jake Allen. Or Corey Crawford. Or Jean-Sebastian Giguere. But definitely not Dan Cloutier.

In 2022, keeping hungry and festive Wild fans from having a good time is just what this St. Louis team does. In the Winter Classic, Minnesota fans by the thousands showed up, layered in all manner of clothing designed for ice fishing or skiing or deer hunting to stave off the cold (officially -5.7 degrees below zero at puck drop), but were ready to party. The Blues arrived in shorts, flip-

flops and Tommy Bahama shirts, then opened up a 5-1 lead on the way to an easier-than-it-looked 6-4 win.

Back in a more familiar setting on Monday, with a sellout crowd of better than 19,000 on hand, the Blues pulled a similar trick, leading 2-0 after a period and getting a hat trick from David Perron to snatch home ice advantage away just like that. By the time Perron made it 4-0 on a late power play, it was past 11 p.m. and the "I have to work in the morning" crowd had grabbed their coats and grumbled off to the parking ramps.

"It's not that warm outside, I'll tell you that. It doesn't feel much warmer," Perron said after the game. "It was a fun environment. I get it that it's good for their team and they get pumped up, but I think it's good for us too, to be able to play in front of that."

The night began with the triumphant return of gritty playoff mainstay Marcus Foligno return-

ing from what looked like a potentially devastating knee injury in the regular season finale. By the end of the night, Foligno was back in the locker room as the final minute ticked off the clock, having been whistled for consecutive minor penalties and a 10-minute misconduct.

Sure, it's just one game. Sure, the Wild have at minimum three more chances to fix what ailed them on Monday. Sure, they will pack the house again for game two, this time likely with Cam Talbot in the Wild net. Sure, this is the most successful team since an

expansion franchise with an odd nickname brought rain to what had become a pro hockey desert back in 2000. But in 2022, getting all excited and then losing, convincingly, to the Blues felt a little too familiar.

With or without the frostbite.

## BIG BASH IN LA

Dodgers promise a 'electric' atmosphere at COVID-delayed All-Star game

Major League Baseball's All-Star game returns to Los Angeles in July after being delayed by the COVID-19 pandemic and officials on Tuesday vowed to make up for lost time by putting on an unforgettable show.

Los Angeles last hosted the game in 1980 and the event has grown quite a bit since then.

It now encompasses nearly a week of activities including yoga, a beach clean up and batting cages in Santa Monica July 15-17, a celebrity softball game, concert and MLB draft on July 17, the Home Run Derby on July 18 and the 92nd All-Star Game on July 19.

"This city is going to be electric, it's going to be hot and happening," Gil Cedillo, a member of the Los Angeles City Council who represents the district Dodger Stadium is

in, said at a news conference at the ballpark.

"As we move out of this pandemic we're going to move forward with great optimism and faith because we want to put this pandemic behind us. We want to welcome the nation and show them the great city of Los Angeles."

The game, which pits the best players from the National and American leagues against each other, was originally scheduled to be held at Dodger

Stadium in July 2020 but was postponed due to the pandemic.

Last year's edition was held at Coors Field in Colorado.

"We are the city of big events and big parties, and that's what we're going to have in July," said Dodgers president Stan Kasten.

"It has been a long time coming, but it will be worth the wait."

Dodgers pitcher Clayton Kershaw said he wants to be

named to his ninth All-Star game, which appears likely given the fan-favorite's stellar 3-0 start to the season.

"I hope I make it because it'll be fun," said Kershaw, who became the Dodgers' all-time strikeout leader last weekend.

"This is such a great place to play and I think everybody knows that. All the road teams say what a great place Dodger stadium is and we're excited to share it."

## Should Mickelson play at PGA Championship?

In light of the recent controversy, defending champ might skip

Phil Mickelson stunned the sports world last May by winning the PGA Championship at age 50, becoming the oldest player to win a major championship.

Since then, he has been steeped in controversy because of derisive comments he made to Golf Digest and the Fire Pit Collective about the PGA Tour and the Saudi Arabian regime bankrolling a rival golf league.

Mickelson skipped the Masters in April, and, although he's officially registered to play in the PGA Championship on May 19-22 at Southern Hills in Tulsa, Okla., there's no guarantee he'll be there.

Three questions with Bob Harig, author of the just-published "Tiger & Phil: Golf's Most Fascinating Rivalry":

— Q: Do you think Phil will show up and play at Southern Hills?

— Harig: I hope he plays. But how does he go to a tournament and avoid the

crush? Maybe he'll do some sort of a sit-down interview with somebody, then not take any media questions. I didn't think there was any way he would skip

the Masters. Now I think anything's possible. Missing the PGA which would really be a shame given how big of a deal that was a year ago.

I find it sad in the sense that, forget about how we got to this point. That's another story. We can debate whether he deserves this or not. But the guy won the PGA last year, became the oldest major champion. The record had stood for 53 years. He won on a U.S. Open-style course, against a guy in Brooks Koepka who's won four majors. And he should be reveling in that right now. He should be able to live with that forever, no matter what he did.

— Q: Did you ever imagine a defending champion might miss a major that he'd just won?

— Harig: It's rare, but it's happened before. One instance that comes to mind is when Tiger [Woods] won the PGA at Southern Hills in 2007 and then didn't play in '08 because he was out with knee surgery.

The PGA was in August then. We knew for months that Tiger wasn't going to play because immediately after the U.S. Open he had surgery and they told us he'd be out for the year.

— Q: You've covered golf for a long time. What's something about the book that might surprise people?

— Harig: Phil was Tiger before Tiger. If you're a certain age, you might not realize how great Phil was as a young player. He was every bit as heralded as Tiger as a young kid. Tiger ended up getting more attention because he won all those U.S. Amateurs and he was a phenomenon. His dad was kind of a bombastic figure, and Phil's dad was in the background. But if you took their amateur records and put them in front of somebody, and that person didn't know who they were or what they did as pros, you might say that Phil would have the better pro career.

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## UCF reportedly negotiating \$17-20 million settlement to exit AAC

ORLANDO, Fla. — UCF is reportedly negotiating a \$17-20 million settlement with the American Athletic Conference to clear a path to the Knights joining the Big 12 Conference in 2023.

Cincinnati, Houston and UCF have been in negotiations with the AAC the past couple of months after all

three accepted bids to join the Big 12 last September. The intent was to join the league by July 2024 at the latest, hoping to join by 2023. AAC bylaws require schools to give 27 months' notice and pay a \$10 million exit fee, but an earlier exit would mean a negotiated settlement.

According to a report by Action Network's Brett McMurphy, that exit fee is somewhere in the "\$17 million

to \$20 million range." Initial reports had the AAC seeking \$30-\$35 million per school, which would be nearly double (\$17 million) what the league received from UConn in 2019 when the school left early to rejoin the Big East.

A settlement could be reached this month, according to the report.

UCF athletics director Terry Mohajir told the Orlando Sentinel last month that the

schools were still working through the negotiations, but he had hoped to have something finished by May.

"We're getting closer to a deadline that we really need to make a decision and they are, too," Mohajir said. "They've got incoming teams and we need to be collegial about this and to be sensible about this: collegial and sensible. I think [AAC commissioner] Mike Aresco

is collegial about it. They've got to try to move their conference forward as well."

Both sides are eager for a resolution, with the AAC looking to move on with its future. A future that involves adding six new members from Conference USA — Charlotte, FAU, North Texas, Rice, UAB and UTSA, hopefully by July 1, 2023.

# Celebrate Cinco de Mayo

## Carnitas slightly crispy and totally delicious

If you are looking for an easy, yet delicious dinner idea to celebrate Cinco de Mayo this week, my Slow Cooker Pork Carnitas are the perfect choice for a weeknight fiesta. Packed with a savory blend of citrus and spice flavors, these pork carnitas are fall-apart tender and yet still delightfully crispy on the edges. It is a good thing they are easy to make, because they have become a crave-worthy favorite in our home.

Until I started my home bakery business, SarahBakes, I had only used my slow cooker to keep dishes warm while entertaining. But, when faced with the challenge of producing dinner for my family while the oven was tied up with baked goods, I finally succumbed to the temptation of easy cooking and have zero regrets about it. Now, on busy baking days, I can simply pop a piece of meat into my slow cooker at noon and forget

about it until dinnertime. Slow cooking is a terrific way to transform inexpensive, tougher cuts of meat into a dish that is mouthwateringly succulent — and affordable. I used a nearly 3-pound, bone-in pork shoulder roast for this recipe, which I found at Hornbacher's last week for just \$1.79 per pound. Round out that bill with one orange, onion and jalapeno pepper, two limes, five garlic cloves, some chicken stock (or even just water) and a sprinkling of pantry spices, and this humble dish can easily feed a family of four for about \$10.

The prep for this recipe is simple. First, I rinse the roast and pat it dry with a paper towel so that the spices will adhere to its surface. I will trim the top layer of fat if it is thicker than half an inch, but I rarely have to.

### SLOW COOKER PORK CARNITAS

Serves: 4 to 6

**Ingredients:**

- 3 pounds bone-in pork shoulder, or 2 ½ pounds boneless
- Kosher salt and black pepper
- 2 teaspoons dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon chili powder

- ¼ teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 1 medium yellow onion, sliced
- 1 jalapeno pepper, coarsely chopped
- 5 cloves garlic, coarsely chopped
- ¼ cup fresh lime juice (about 2 limes)
- 1 orange, zested and juiced
- 1 ½ cups chicken broth or water

**Directions:**

Pat the pork roast dry and season generously with salt and pepper on all sides; set aside. In a small bowl, combine the oregano, cumin, chili powder and cayenne pepper; set aside. Place the onion, jalapeno and garlic in the bottom of the slow cooker. Add the pork roast and rub half of the spice mixture over the top and sides. Turn the roast over and repeat with the remaining spices. Turn the roast over again until evenly coated. Add the lime juice, orange zest and juice, and chicken broth. The liquid should come up to the top inch of the pork, so add more broth or water if needed, but not enough to submerge the roast. Cover the crock pot and cook on high for 4 to 5 hours or on low for 7 to 8 hours, until the meat is very tender and easy to pull apart. If the liquid appears to be reducing too much, add more broth or water by the quarter-cup as needed. Preheat the oven broiler to high heat and line a baking sheet with aluminum foil. Remove the pork roast from the pot and place it on the baking sheet, reserving the juices in the pot. Use 2 forks to pull the meat into shreds and discard the bone if present. Spread the shredded meat out on the baking sheet in an even layer. Place the baking sheet under the broiler for 5 minutes until the edges of the pork start to brown and become crispy. Remove the pork from the oven and pour ¼ cup of the reserved liquid over the shredded meat, tossing with tongs to evenly coat. Return the pork to the broiler for 5 minutes and repeat this process. After adding the second ¼ cup of the liquid, broil for another 3 minutes and then remove from the oven and transfer the pork to a serving dish. Add another ¼ cup of the reserved juices and toss to combine. Serve immediately in tacos, sandwiches and salads, or atop a crispy tostada. The cooked pork can be refrigerated for up to 3 days, or frozen for up to 3 months. The reserved juices can also be refrigerated for several days or frozen for later use.

## Flood forecasting numbers always create some confusion

FARGO — Whenever the rivers rise enough to make the news, the river stages cause confusion. Where do these numbers come from? Here is a primer. At older river measuring points, zero feet was the bottom of the river. If the level of the river today is 14 feet higher than zero, then the stage is 14 feet. However, river bottoms shift with the current over time, so this number is not necessarily the depth of the river. Instead, it's just an arbitrarily chosen, fixed point.

### WEATHER TALK

At some level higher than zero, where minor flooding starts to occur, is the flood stage for each location. Flood forecasts are given for the heights the river is expected to rise above the flood stage. In more recent years, newer river points were given heights relative to sea level, but this caused all kinds of confusion, so they dropped the first digit or two. One can never compare one river point to another.

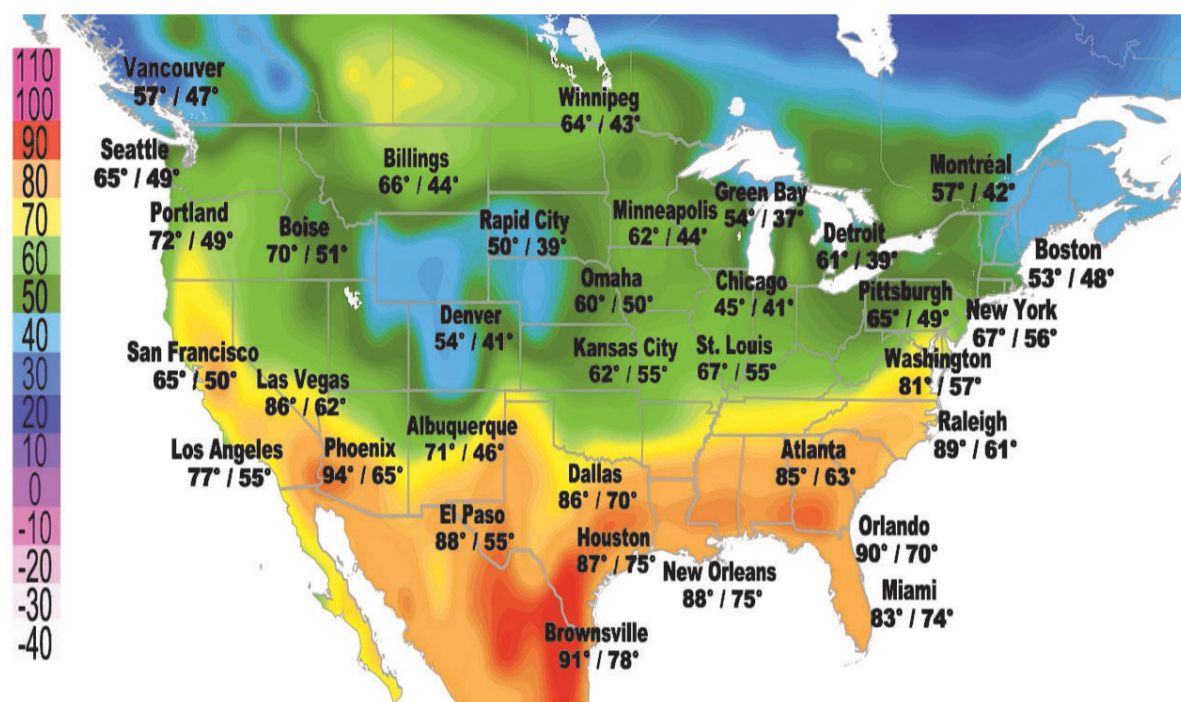

### BRIDGE

**A hoard day's night**  
"I heard you're dating a woman who is a hoarder," I said to Cy the Cynic in the club lounge. Cy has had dozens of "permanent" relationships.  
"We broke up," the Cynic said shortly.  
"Too bad."  
"What bothered me," Cy said, "was that she told me I'm the first thing she's ever gotten rid of."  
In a penny game, Cy was today's West. Against five diamonds, he led the queen of hearts and then the jack. Declarer ruffed, led a trump to dummy and casually returned a low club: four, ace, five. South next led a trump to dummy, ruffed a heart, took the A-K of spades, ruffed a spade and ruffed dummy's last heart.  
**LAST CLUB**  
Declarer then led a club. When Cy took the king, he had only spades left to lead, and South ruffed in dummy and threw his

last club. Making five.  
When South led a club to his ace, Cy should have been wary; clearly, South didn't hold the A-Q. If Cy gets rid of his king of clubs, he avoids the impending end play. East will score his ten and queen for down one.  
**DAILY QUESTION**  
You hold: ♠ 5 ♥ K 7 5 2 ♦ A Q 8 5 ♣ J 9 6 3. Your partner opens one spade, you bid 1NT, he rebids two spades and you (perhaps questionably) try 2NT. Partner bids three diamonds. What do you say?  
**ANSWER:** Partner suggests six spades, four diamonds and minimum opening strength. If he held a stronger hand with that pattern, his second bid would have been two diamonds or three spades. Pass. Your chances of making any game are poor at best.
