Abortion would become illegal in ND under 'trigger' law

BISMARCK Abortion would be outlawed in North Dakota if the U.S. Supreme Court overturns the landmark 1973 Roe v. Wade decision and allows states to prohibit the procedure.

A leaked draft opinion from the high court published Mon-day, May 2, by Politico sug-gests the justices might do just that in the coming months.

Writing on behalf of a supposed majority of the court, Justice Samuel Alito called the Roe v. Wade decision "egregiously wrong from the start" and said it should be overturned. The leak of a draft opinion, which could change

'Not on my watch': Walz vows to uphold abortion access in Minnesota

ST. PAUL — Abortion would remain legal — at least right away — in Minnesota under a draft U.S. Supreme Court opinion that would overturn the landmark Roe v. Wade decision and return the issue of abortion access to the states.

Politico late on Monday, May 2, reported that the high court was poised to strike down the precedent based on a leaked copy of a draft opinion. In the draft opinion penned by Justice Samuel Alito, the majority writes that "Roe was egregiously wrong

Fargo Sioux Falls-based development group's bid to buy the former Fargo Cass Public Health building was accepted by the Fargo City Commission on Monday. May 2, paving the way for construction of a \$38.5 million hotel and housing project downtown.

The agreement to sell 401 Third Ave. N. to Green Acre Development and Lloyd Companies, along with ESG Architecture and Design of Minneapolis, was approved on a 3-1 vote.

Commissioner John Strand voted no. and Commissioner Dave Piepkorn recused himself.

Piepkorn is part owner of the DVAW building

(TruGreen), which Green Acre/Lloyd is acquiring, along with a parking lot owned by American Federal Bank, to complete their project about a block north of the Public Health site at Fourth Avenue North and Fourth Street.

Green Acre/Lloyd plans to build an AC by Marriott upscale hotel with 115 rooms, 108 market-rate apartments in a second building and 167

covered parking spots shared between them. That project will be completed by 2024.

Green Acre/Lloyd will also raze the Public Health building and turn it into a surface parking lot for use by American Federal Bank.

MBA Development had offered to build a \$13 million, 68-unit apartment building with main floor parking on the Public Health site.

an addition in 1994. Both developers had offered \$500,000 for the property.

ND seeks to join lawsuit to decide who owns riverbed



FARGO — The state of North Dakota is seeking to intervene in a lawsuit to determine ownership of the bed of the historic Missouri River flowing inside the boundaries of the Fort Berthold Reservation.

At stake in the legal dispute is who has legal rights to oil and gas revenues worth "well over a hundred million dollars" — the state of North Dakota or the Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation, which occupies Fort Berthold Reservation.

The tribes filed the lawsuit in 2020 in U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C., seeking to establish that they are the rightful owner of the riverbed and the mineral wealth beneath it. The legal move came after the Trump administration, at the urging of the state of North Dakota, reversed decades of administrative decisions and concluded that the state was the owner.

The solicitor for the Department of the Interior in the Biden administration reversed the Trump administration's decision, however, restoring the government's long-held position that the riverbed and minerals beneath it were held in trust by the U.S. govern-

Authorities ID man who died after shootout with Bismarck police officers

BISMARCK — The Bismarck Police Department on Tuesday, May 3, released the name of the man who died after he and

officers exchanged gunfire in a mobile home park.

Eric Anthony Hermanson, 31, died on Monday, May 2, in a mobile home park in east Bismarck after he allegedly shot at Hermanson officers during a foot pursuit. Hermanson

and two Bismarck police officers were involved in the shootout.

Authorities said Hermanson, a Bismarck resident, barricaded himself in a shed where they later found him deceased from an apparent gunshot wound. It's unclear whether Hermanson sustained the gunshot from the shooting with the officers or if it was self-inflicted, officials said. No officers were injured in the incident.

mobile home park investigat- Public invited ing a stolen vehicle, officials did not confirm whether Hermanson stole the vehicle.

The Bismarck Police Department has not released the names of the officers involved in the shooting, which the North Dakota Bureau of Criminal Investigations is now investigating.

Hermanson has an extensive criminal background, according to court records, and he was a registered sex offender as of

March 4. The North Dakota Sex Offender Registry states Hermanson was convicted of gross sexual imposition in Williams County District Court in 2012. His risk level was "low" and he was classified as having "delinquent" status, meaning he did not submit proper registration to law enforcement about his current whereabouts or a change of name, according the state's sex offender registry. The registry states "Delinquent offenders cannot be mapped, as their address is unknown."

Hermanson has pleaded guilty to multiple felony theft charges, the most recent of which was filed in December in Emmons



Redlinger said she offered some new ideas and city officials can learn from her experiences.


City Commissioner John Strand said he is proud of the city as it offered another top leadership position to a woman. Gayhart replaces long-

They're manipulating the system

''m not an economist. Unlike the brainiacs in Washington, at least I'll admit it. I'll say with reasonable certainty, however, that the indiscriminate shower of nearly \$6 trillion in COVID relief



money that bailed out a whole host of industries that didn't need it – including millions to Trump and Kushner enterprises triggered, in large part, the inflation we're experiencing today. They should have used a trough.

For the wealthiest among us, anyway.

Despite the fact that the Biden administration steered more benefits in their \$1.9 trillion package to poorer communities, minorities and small businesses, Republicans, on cue, are suddenly very concerned about fiscal matters. Look at those gas prices! And those grocery bills are through the roof! Yeah, it's all Biden's fault. You malleable twits. Are you not paying attention?

If everyone contributed selflessly, you'd have equilibrium. Balance. Unfortunately, many people are selfish and lazy, so we're left with the shiny brass ring of capitalism that's out of reach statistically for most people. But, capitalists are the best salespersons in the universe. We can all be rich! Anyone can be president! Don't forget to buy a lottery ticket.

Despite the fact that every meaningful social safety net has come from Democrats — Social Security, Medicare, workers rights, farm subsidies, rural electrification, civil rights, the Affordable Care Act — that's conveniently forgotten when Republicans cynically pass their cyclical economic mess on to Democrats. Trump sloppily increased the national debt by 36% with COVID handouts and tax cuts for the wealthy. How's that trickling going for you?

That's not to say that billionaires haven't bettered aspects of society or that they're all fascists. Steve Jobs connected us. Elon Musk's electric cars are one solution to climate change. Privatized space programs may be transformative. Leona Helmsley supplied thousands of rural hospitals with CAT machines. Carnegie built libraries. Bill Gates fights AIDS. All good things, but it's not enough. Economic power is political power and it's used to personal advantage which naturally disadvantages others. Meaning you.

The decimation of the middle class began with Reagan's attack on organized labor. Somehow, Republicans have managed to convince people that having unions fight for better wages and benefits is bad for them. You may as well shoot yourself in the foot if ammunition wasn't so expensive.

The teacher shortage is completely artificial

By John P. Calvert in the next 10 years America will have to replace more than 2 million school teachers who are set to leave in a protracted wave. Spot shortages have already appeared and several states are in bidding wars for certain specialties. North Dakota will lose about 40% of its current teachers. All around, the numbers are daunting where will so many replacements be found?

Two things should be kept in mind. First, the shortage is completely artificial. America has millions of college graduates who could be excellent teachers, but they are barred from teaching simply because they are not licensed. Why do we license teachers? Not to ensure that the math teacher is competent in math, but to ensure that she knows something about pedagogy, i.e. the technique of teaching. And the teacher colleges have traditionally regarded technique as far more important than substantive knowledge. If Einstein were to knock on the schoolhouse door with an offer to teach physics, someone with a degree in education would shoo him away as unqualified.

This undue emphasis on technique means that teachers will have less expertise in the subject they hope to teach. Thus fewer than half of history teachers have more than a minor in the subject. A fifth of English teachers don't even have a minor in the subject. Most other subjects are similarly shortchanged in favor of technique, so that most teachers are not as well

prepared in their subject matter as they should be.

Do teachers really need years of immersion in pedagogy? W. James Popham, a researcher at UCLA, has found that inexperienced and uncertified teachers get results that are every bit as good as the graduates of the teacher colleges.

Second, the pedagogical programs required in the ed schools are a miserable means of preparing teachers. Few education departments are selective in their undergraduate admissions; most of their majors come from the lower half of collegebound high school seniors and their SAT scores are among the lowest of all who enter college.

This makes ed schools notorious as sanctuaries for substandard students, many of whom choose an education major because it is the easiest way to get a degree.

When 60% of Massachusetts education grads bombed the state's first licensure test. Chancellor John Silber declared the education schools "bankrupt" and demanded that henceforth their faculties should be as learned as their students,

or nearly so.

The suspicion grows that there must be a better way to get good teachers and indeed, more than 40 states have seen in the superabundance of degreed people possibilities for avoiding the ed schools' monopoly on certification. Massachusetts, for instance, now uses hefty bonuses to recruit top liberal arts students into teaching, as well as lawyers, engineers,

and other established professionals who may be contemplating a career

New York, Texas and California, and other states also have programs that bypass those pointless ed school hoops. But alas, many of them simply mimic the ed schools' pedagogical training.

The most widely-cited experiment in certification is New Jersey's. The state in 1984 set new standards for licensure, requiring teachers to have liberal arts degrees, pass a content area of the National Teachers Exam, and undergo practice teaching. This plan has obvious advantages. It broadens the candidate pool, shortens preparation time, and brings different theories of teaching into the classroom.

Though the educational establishment received the New Jersey plan with volcanic anger, it has since become mainstream. Currently it accounts for a third of the state's teachers and is the main source of minority teachers. Since 1984 the state has not had to issue a single emergency certificate.

Almost half of our recent college graduates have jobs that don't

require a degree. Among them are millions of talented people whose degrees are not in demand, so they take what they can get. They wait tables, drive cabs, night-clerk at the Stop-&-Go. You've met lots of them. Shall we go on pretending that in this embarrassment of riches we can't find teaching talent?

Most Republican members of Congress were either complicit in aiding Trump toward that end, or at the very least unwilling to be all that critical of Trump and his machinations publicly.

Yet you're on track to lose control of Congress.

A FiveThirtyEight.com analysis of the national polling shows Republicans with a consistent lead on the generic ballot. Which candidates Republicans actually choose in the primaries will give us a clearer picture, but many Democrats already seem to be conceding that their party will lose control of at least one house of Congress, if not both.

"It may be too late to prevent a blowout in the fall, but the future of progressive politics and indeed our democracydemands that we revive our relationship with rural communities," reads a recent New York Times column from a young, left-wing state lawmaker in Maine who is pleading with Democrats to start caring about

rural voters again. As a conservative, I'm not enthusiastic about electing Democrats, but I am worried that when Democrats in places like North Dakota aren't competitive, the Republicans feel little pressure to be better leaders.

But this problem isn't just rooted in the demise of Democratic appeal in rural America. President Joe Biden's administration hasn't gone well. He may not be the tinpot tyrant Trump aspires to be, but you aren't good simply because you aren't bad.

Americans are struggling with inflation and workforce shortages. They've observed our disastrous withdrawal from Afghanistan, and Biden's doddering indecision over Ukraine. There isn't a lot of faith that Biden and his party know how to address what's facing Americans.


During the Obama years, the conventional wisdom was that tough border rhetoric, among other issues, would drive voters like Latinos away from the GOP even as the white Republican base became a smaller percentage of the electorate.

That hasn't happened. In fact, there's been a rightward shift in Latino voters. Not only did Trump and congressional Republicans perform well with Latinos in 2016 (relative to past campaigns), but in 2020 they did even better.

In some places, like Florida, they did much better. Democrats need to be

Delegates weigh in on apparent court decision

GRAND FORKS — If a leaked document portends a decision by the U.S. Supreme Court to overturn the federal law that allows abortions, American women will vote in record numbers in the coming elections, predicts Minnesota Sen. Amy Klobuchar.

Meanwhile, the office of Republican John Hoeven – North Dakota's senior senator – said the senator "remains committed to protecting the unborn" and if the draft opinion reflects the final decision, "it would have his support."

Klobuchar, a Democrat who mounted a run for the presidency in 2020, was among the first members of Congress





to react to news of the leaked court document, as reported Monday evening by the news organization Politico.

The 98-page document suggests the Supreme Court will vote to overturn Roe v. Wade, the half-century-old ruling that legalized abortion nationwide and has been law - and argued politically – ever since.

While Politico first reported it Monday evening, few members of

However, the basis of the document is consistent with his long-term efforts "to advance prolife legislation, support programs that protect the health of mothers and preserve laws passed at the state level to respect the sanctity of life," the statement said.

Hoeven does not support efforts to codify Roe v. Wade into federal law, as some were suggesting Tuesday morning.

Biden pledges to work to protect 'fundamental' right to abortion

WASHINGTON - President Biden on Tuesday called a woman's right to obtain an abortion "fundamental" and urged voters to elect candidates who support that right in order to pave the way for Congress to pass legislation protecting access to the procedure nationwide.

The Democratic president made his remarks after a leaked draft Supreme Court decision surfaced showing that its conservative majority is prepared in a Mississippi case due to be decided by the end of June to overturn the 1973 Roe v. Wade decision that legalized abortion nationally. The court confirmed the authenticity of the leaked doc-

Supreme Court launches probe into leak

U.S. Chief Justice John Roberts on Tuesday said the Supreme Court will investigate the leak of the draft decision which he confirmed as authentic — indicating that a majority of the nine justices are set to overturn the constitutional right to abortion.

He directed the court's marshal to launch an investigation

The leak of the draft opinion has been described as a rare, if not unprecedented, occurrence, according to reporting from Reuters.

The news sparked an immediate reaction from state and federal officials overnight. Abortion advocates were quick to note that even if the decision stands, abortion services would still be legal in the state. And until the court hands down a formal opinion, abortion services would continue across the region, provider organizations said.

"First, our doors are open today and our doors will remain open every day for abortion care as long as legally possible," said Sarah Stoesz, Planned Parenthood North Central States president and CEO. "This leaked opinion is horrifying. We all knew the day could come that safe and legal abortion would be decimated in our country, and now we are facing that reality."

Minnesota abortion providers have said they were preparing for an influx of out-of-state patients if the court rules to overturn Roe v. Wade and triggers state laws that limit services around the region.

Meanwhile. abortion opponents have said they'll continue pressing state lawmakers to restrict access to abortion services in the state.

"When this decision is finally handed down, the real work of pro-life organizations across the country will begin," Minnesota Family Council said in a statement. "As we have been doing for years, we will work to protect women and children in Minnesota from abortion at the Legislature, in the courts and through elections.'

Under current law, Minnesota requires a 24-hour waiting period between the first contact with a provider and an abortion procedure and requires physicians who perform abortions to read from a script before the procedure. State law also mandates that both parents of a minor have to sign off before an abortion.

The state has seen a relatively steady decline in induced abortions since 1980 and the total number of procedures reported to the state in 2020 was less than half that reported four decades ago. In 2020, the Minnesota Department of Health reported that 807, or roughly 9% of the total 9,108 abortions in the state, were induced in residents of Iowa, Michigan, North Dakota, South

before publication, is unprecedented in the modern era, according to court experts.

The North Dakota Legislature passed a "trigger" law in 2007 that would ban abortion within 30 days if the Supreme Court ever changed direction on the controversial pro-

The law would make it a Class C felony for anyone to perform an abortion, unless a pregnant female performs an abortion on herself. A Class C felony is punishable by up to five years in prison and a \$10,000

There would be exceptions to the abortion ban if the mother's life is in danger and in cases of rape or incest.

Attorney General Drew Wrigley said his office is still studying its role in the potential implementation of the trigger law, though he noted the Supreme Court has not officially made a ruling that overturns Roe.

Wrigley said if the law were in place, local state's attorneys would be charged with prosecuting violations of the law, but special prosecutors from his office would also have jurisdiction.

A dozen other states have similar trigger laws, including Texas, Arkansas, Idaho, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Okla-homa, South Dakota, Tennessee, Utah and Wyoming. The Guttmacher Institute, a pro-abortion rights research organization, estimates a total of 26 states, including South Dakota and Montana, are "certain or likely" to ban abortion if the Supreme Court overturns Roe v. Wade. If the high court overturns Roe,

the U.S. Congress could pass legislation to make abortion legal or illegal across the whole country. The Red River Women's Clinic in

Fargo is North Dakota's lone abortion provider. Director Tammi Kromenaker called the draft opinion 'absolutely devastating" but not totally unexpected from a court that has signaled it might dismantle Roe.

Kromenaker said the clinic is committed to "maintaining the status quo" and has been working on a

contingency plan to move its facility

to Moorhead if abortion becomes

illegal in North Dakota.

Minnesota is "less hostile" to abortion rights and would allow the clinic to operate, Kromenaker noted. She would not disclose whether the clinic has purchased property on the

other side of the Red River. Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz vowed Monday to uphold legal abortion in his state if he is reelected later this

Kromenaker noted that abortion is still legal in North Dakota for the time being and those with an appointment can still come into the

Former U.S. Attorney Tim Purdon, a Bismarck lawyer who specializes in American Indian law, said North Dakota's American Indian tribes could technically allow abortion clinics to operate on their reservations even if the state were to ban abortion. There are currently no abortion clinics on any of North Dakota's five reservations.

Socially conservative North Dakota lawmakers have a recent history of passing strict anti-abortion laws, many of which have been shot down by courts after costly legal battles.

The Fargo clinic successfully sued North Dakota in 2013 after lawmakers passed the nation's first bill banning abortion after the detection of a fetal heartbeat. The Supreme Court declined to take the case, effectively upholding lower courts' decisions to block the law from going into effect.

Prominent North Dakota political figures from both sides of the aisle began to chime in on the draft opinion leaked Monday.

Gov. Doug Burgum said he welcomes "the prospect of this issue being returned to the states where it belongs," but the Republican noted the Supreme Court has not yet issued an official opinion. U.S. Rep. Kelly Armstrong, R-N.D.,

said overturning Roe v. Wade "would be a tremendous victory for the unborn and for states' rights." North Dakota House Minority

Leader Josh Boschee, D-Fargo, criticized the draft opinion in a tweet, saying that "none of us are safe from the GOP's overreach." "Are we not a nation rooted in

individual liberty, self determination & limited government intervention?" Boschee said.

and subcontractors in multiple states, including North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota and Colorado.

The Attorney General's Office initiated a consumer fraud investigation in October 2021, after Glasser Images suddenly closed its doors and posted notice that it would not provide refunds.

To date, the attorney general's office has received 539 complaints alleging claims of more than \$1.4 million.

The closure of Glasser Images left wedding couples without photographers for immediately pending weddings, while other couples were denied the promised photos from a variety of special occasions.

Wrigley said the Consumer Protection Division of his office has conducted an extensive investigation and found substantial evidence supporting the allegations in the complaint.

Investigators gathered financial and accountrecords, internal and external communications, and testimony from about 20 witnesses.

"Our complaint alleges that Glasser Images had been experiencing serious financial problems for years, but falsely blamed the business closure on the pandemic," Wrigley said in a statement announcing the action taken by his office.

"Despite the business's serious undercapitalization, Jack Glasser continued to borrow from banks, the government, friends, and family, while simultaneously enjoying a lifestyle of high-end dining, travel, and lux-ury vehicles, all at the expense of his business customers." Wrigley

Tim O'Keeffe, an attorney representing Glasser Images and Jack Glasser, issued the following statement Tuesday eve-

"Jack has been devas-

Glasser Images and the negative impact it has taken on his clients, employees, subcontractors, and the community. In that spirit, Jack get his clients' memories back to them, and has cooperated throughout the attorney general's investigation with complete transparency," O'Keeffe wrote.

"Unfortunately, despite assurance from the assistant attorney general that he shared Jack's desire to help Glasser Images' clients, he decided to issue this civil lawsuit before even sharing it with Jack — revealing that the AG's Office chose to grab some cheap headlines, regardless of it helping nobody but himself... We maintain that this is a failed business and not an elaborate conspiracy,' O'Keeffe added.

The suit alleges that at a time when Glasser Images was in financial trouble, Jack Glasser and his business partner, Jace Schacher, would regularly use Glasser Images to pay for meals and drinks, including at Pirogue Grille and The Luft in Bismarck, where they went multiple times a week.

The lawsuit also alleges that in May of 2021 Glasser and Schacher used Glasser Images' credit card to pay for a \$10,000 trip to Wyoming, including \$8,000 for lodging alone.

About two weeks before that trip, Glasser claimed to his accountant that Glasser Images qualified for \$2 million in Economic Injury Disaster Loan funds based on its

tated by the closing of Glasser asked for the accountant's help and insight on obtaining the funding, according to the suit, which claims the business ultimately was approved for nearhas worked tirelessly to ly \$400,000 in federal disaster loans tied to pandemic relief.

Shortly after the business was approved for the funds, Jack Glasser sent an email to employees telling them he was delaying payroll, the suit

Despite the company's precarious financial position, Glasser Images continued to take advance payments from clients for a year knowing it likely would not be able to provide what it promised, according to the suit, which claims Jack Glasser's accountant suggested he consult a bankruptcy attorney.

Instead, the suit says Glasser Images continued to solicit advance payments from clients and potential clients without disclosing its poor financial condition, right up to the day it closed.

(Jack Glasser's) narrative is that Glasser Images closed abruptly on Oct. 7, 2021, due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the business," the suit states, adding: "This is nothing more than a ready-made excuse employed by Jack and Glasser Images intended to garner sympathy from the public."

The attorney general's lawsuit seeks to ban Glasser from providing future photography services, restitution for consumers and subcontractors, and civil penalties.

THE NEW WALK-IN

Fargo woman launches last-minute booking platform for spa, salon appointments

Fargo new online platform designed for booking lastminute spa and salon appointments and created by a local industry professional shares a common thread with many other digital-age tech startups.

Jess Azure, a licensed master esthetician and former massage therapist, recently launched Spadesso, a website made specifically for lastminute appointments. While Spadesso wasn't founded in a garage, the product of dropping out from Harvard or hatched during a crosscountry odyssey, Azure does share a similar story with the likes of Jobs, Gates and Bezos.

The common link, Azure recounted to The Forum, took place while she was participating in the Fargo Moorhead West Fargo Chamber of Commerce leadership program. At an entrepreneur day, she explained the idea for Spadesso to a fellow participant. The conversation started like many other successful business pitches, "Hey, I have this crazy idea," Azure

recalled saying. Once she received the validation she was searching for — that "this just might be crazy enough to work" moment — Azure began digging deeper. It kicked off a process that's drawn on decades of experience and has played out over more than two years, resulting in Spadesso's launch Thursday, April 14.

A data- and experience-driven concept

Azure has a broad range of work experience under her belt. It was that experience that informed her research as she ironed out the

details for Spadesso. After her stint in the salon industry, Azure worked at a hospitality company before becoming a realtor. Still, she always felt drawn to spa and salon work. "Having the early experience in the industry, I knew that I

wanted to be involved



somehow," she said. "I never really knew what that meant.

Spadesso, which Azure said is "near and dear to my heart," had always been on the back of her mind, but the concept needed refinement. Inspired by the use of data analysis in the hospitality field, Azure realized she needed the same level of scrutiny to make Spadesso a reality.

Azure quickly noticed there were "a lot" of entrenched online scheduling platforms. Knowing that, she needed a way to make Spadesso unique. Once she dug a little deeper, she unearthed several trends that helped her settle on the lastminute scheduling in which Spadesso specializes.

Azure rattled off several of her key findings. For example, 80% of bookings are made on mobile devices, she said. On top of that, half of clients book appointments on the go and 40% of clients sought appointments the very same day. She also discovered that while clients think of making a spa or salon appointment up to 12 times a year, they only do so a third of the

Taken all together, Azure realized Spadesso needed to be a mobile-friendly, easy-to-use scheduler focused on "today, tomorrow and the day after tomorrow," she explained.

Drawing from her own experience in the industry, Azure knew that salon and spa professionals had bigger concerns than marketing and scheduling. "Having that experience, I'm able to kind of put myself in their shoes," she said. "My focus

was not on, 'How

am I going to market

myself?' My focus was

on, 'How am I going to provide a really great service?"

She's also witnessed first-hand the shifting business model in the industry, with more and more professionals moving to either booth rental or ownership. While it's "all a very wonderful thing, Azure remarked, it's led to a disconnect between providers and the public. For providers who don't advertise, it's difficult to reach new clients. It's another gap Azure hopes Spadesso can bridge.

'The new form of a walk-in'

Azure began exploring the Spadesso concept back in 2020, while the COVID-19 pandemic was ravaging spas and salons across the country.

Once shops began reopening, Azure realized clients would be looking for appointments as quickly as possible. . With travel at a lull, she also expected that people would be craving new local experiences. The lightbulb went off later tȟat year when some of her friends mentioned how difficult it was to find an appointment at the last minute.

Unfortunately though, walk-in appointments have become something of a fossil in the industry, to the point where they are nearly "unheard of' nowadays, Azure said. "When we think back a long, long time ago, walk-ins were probably a very normal element of owning a salon or spa," she remarked. "Things have kind of changed over the

years." The inability to get a walk-in appointment can be particularly problematic when it

comes to massages.

Clients tend to have

acute needs, meaning

they can't wait two weeks to be seen when

they tweak their back. To that end, Azure hopes Spadesso can bring back the walk-in appointment. "I think that maybe this is the new form of a walk-in, in a way, that lastsecond option," she said.

Spadesso is also an ideal choice for people who are new to the area or don't have a referral. She views it much like an online travel booking site; a place where people can see all their options in one spot. "When you're thinking about (booking) a flight or a hotel, your first thought is, 'Where can I go to see what all my options are?" Azure commented. "That's what I really love about our site too is that we present those options to you in a very simple, unencumbered way.

A long road ahead

Spadesso, much like any tech start-up, has "a long journey ahead of us," Azure said.

For now, the platform is meant to complement rather than overtake a provider's existing booking system. Štill, Azure didn't rule out the possibility of expanding her "today, tomorrow and the day after tomorrow" timeframe.

With the right mix of interest from service providers and customers, she'd also like to roll Spadesso out beyond the Fargo area. A web app is also among her end goals, she said. If the concept is a success, she'd ultimately like to move beyond just haircuts and massages as well, even looking for possibilities in other industries.

Most importantly, though, Azure hopes Spadesso will be front of mind next time a provider has an opening to fill or a client is on the hunt for a lastsecond appointment. "When I'm thinking appointment, I think Spadesso," Azure envisioned. "When I'm thinking, 'I need a resource because I don't even know where to begin on this marketing journey,' I think Spadesso.'


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



"I just want to spread the word that the NMU coaching staff is the best," Schiller said. "They're all great guys and I really think they're going to do something special with that program."



Bergstraser has been the top assistant coach for the Dragons since May 2018, helping the program reach the NCAA Division II tournament two times during that time frame. He was a graduate assistant from 2015–2017 when the Dragons posted a 54-12 record and two trips to the NCAA tournament.

"Fortunately, Watlhall placed me in a lot of positions to act as head coach," Bergstraser said "You've got to make a lot of decisions as a head coach and I've always provided suggestions. Those suggestions that I've provided, I've always had in the back of my mind would be right for our program and I would provide those suggestions if I didn't think it was a decision I

would make." Bergstraser was an assistant coach at Quincy (Ill.) from 2017-2018. Prior to that and his first stint with the Dragons, he was an assistant coach for the University of Wisconsin-River Falls. If hired, this would be his first

college head coaching job.
"I'm excited to be a head coach and I really do hope that opportunity is here at MSUM because I've had a hand in building something special here," Bergstraser said. "I think it couldn't be any more perfect of a situation. I've put in my time here and while I was here we've had some success, it's not all because of me, but I think I've brought in a handful of good players as our whole staff has worked to get good players."

Bergstraser pointed out that Walthall has a strong track record of having his assistants moving on to becoming successful head coaches. Minnesota-

Duluth head coach Justin Wieck, Minnesota-Crookston head coach Dan Wiesse and newly hired South Dakota head coach Eric Peterson were all assistant coaches for Walthall at MSUM prior to becoming college head

coaches.
"He's done a good job of molding people to be successful at their next step," Bergstraser said.

Bergstraser said managing the transfer portal is one of the biggest challenges on the college landscape for head coaches no matter the experience level. He's played a vital role in recruiting for the Dragons during his time as an assistant.

Bergstraser said he's ready to lead a

program.
"There's going to be a lot of tough conversations and tough decisions to be made and I'm very comfortable with those situations and that's just part of coaching," Bergstraser said. "I'm going to make mistakes just like many other veteran coaches do and I'm going to learn from them quickly and not have a lot of repeated mistakes.'

The Dragons posted a 19-12 record last season and won the NSIC tournament championship before losing to eventual national champion Northwest Missouri State in the first

round of the NCAA tournament. 'It's a special situation for me because I've obviously been here," Bergstraser said. 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Wild should use goalie depth while it can still make a difference

he Wild don't have a goaltending problem, not with two good ones. But do they have a goalie issue? They will if they can't even up their first-round, best-ofseven playoff series against St. Louis on Wednesday.

Nine times out of 10, rolling Marc-Andre Fleury out for a postseason game is a no-brainer. The veteran has his name on three Stanley Cups and last season led Vegas into the Western Conference final — two years after leading the Golden Knights into the Cup final. The issue is that Minnesota has Cam Talbot, better down the stretch than his fêted teammate, on the

Had Bill Guerin not acquired Fleury, his former Pittsburgh Penguins teammate, at the March 21 trade deadline, coach Dean Evason and the Wild would run with Talbot and feel good about it, just as they did last season in a seven-game series against Vegas.

Maybe it still is a no-brainer for Wild coach Dean Evason. He might not have exactly greased the skids Tuesday for Fleury's return in Game 2, but the coach made it clear he didn't blame the goaltender for Monday's 4-0 loss in Game 1 at Xcel Energy Center.

Fleury left a lot of rebounds out there for the Blues, who turned four of them into goals. But three of those goals were, for all intents and purposes, the result of power plays, even if the third — all were by left winger David Perron came a few seconds after the clock had wound down on a Blues man-advantage.

Perron might have been the fortunate recipient of three rebounds that just about found his tape but, Evason noted, "There's

nobody there to contest

"There's not a soul around him, right?" Evason said. "That's where we need people in that area to collect. That's the ultimate example. He tips it and gets his own rebound, and there's nobody to help out. That's not Marc-Andre Fleury's fault. That's us for not being around and

clearing the puck."
The Blues' victory was complete, stem to stern. That includes goalie

But Fleury is allowed to leave rebounds, especially likely when he's making difficult first saves. His first big task, in fact, was stopping a penalty shot by Ivan Barbeshev at 3:50 of the first period. Blues goaltender Ville Husso left some juicy

Why change

now?

Some of this might simply be aesthetic. Fleury, 37, is something of an anachronism among goaltenders in the way that Martin Brodeur used to be an anachronism during his last days in New Jersey. Modern goaltenders are technicians, trained to stay on their feet. Fleury more of a pure athlete, diving, lunging and scrambling for pucks others might not

But he also needs his skaters to sweep away rebounds.

Evason says he doesn't look past the game in front of him and that's probably smart, especially in the postseason, when every loss is a nail in a team's coffin. One presumes he'll start the goaltender he feels gives the Wild the best chance to even this series before it heads for St. Louis.

As he said on Sunday, he has two good options, so the choice is an easy one. But down a game, home-ice advantage lost, it's at least a little harder.

If Fleury goes out Wednesday and the Wild win, there is no issue. But Evason said Monday night he suspects if the Wild are to make a deep playoff run, both goaltenders will be required. Is a 1-0 deficit in a seven-game series too early to tap that depth? No. And waiting until they're in trouble might be too late.

Minnesota's goaltender depth is an advantage, and the Wild should use it before it's too late to make a difference.

A quick review of ND fishing regs and definitions

West Fargo t was mid-March when the first open water fishing reports from the Missouri River started feeding the spring fishing frenzy of anglers. Some anglers have two months of fishing behind them, while others wait for Memorial Day weekend, signaling the kickoff of summer fishing.

First things first. There's always time to review fishing rules and regulations. While it may be convenient to ask your fishing buddies, bait shop or fishing equipment experts, the best advice is to check the regulations yourself.

Anglers can find the 2022-24 North Dakota Fishing Guide on the North Dakota Game and Fish Department website, gf.nd.gov, or at Game and Fish Department offices and license vendors throughout the

Noteworthy regulation changes for this year include:

► An increase in the statewide smallmouth/ largemouth bass daily limit from 3 to 5 and possession limit from 6



► Allow for the taking of walleye during the darkhouse spearfishing season for the Missouri River System, Devils Lake and Stump Lake.

► Allow for the use of legal live baitfish at Crown Butte, Kettle Lake, Nygren Dam and Sather Dam.

A new license was required as of April 1, and if you've not been fishing, the 2022-23 fishing licenses can be purchased on the Game and Fish website.

If you have ever wondered about some of the specific definitions for North Dakota anglers and waters, here are some of the more important:

▶ Game fish are bluegill, burbot, channel catfish, chinook salmon, crappie (black and white), largemouth bass, muskellunge (pure and hybrid), northern

pike, paddlefish, sauger,

saugeye, smallmouth bass, sturgeon (pallid, shovelnose and lake). trout (brown, lake, rainbow and cutthroat), walleye, white bass,

yellow perch and zander. ► Legal live baitfish are fathead minnows, creek chubs, sticklebacks, white suckers and rainbow smelt.

Some of the more common rules and

regulations include:

Depositing or leaving any litter (including refuse, bottles, cans, etc.) or other waste material in the water, on shore or on the ice is illegal.

► It is illegal to introduce anything into waters of the state for the purpose of attempting to attract fish (e.g. chumming, artificial light, acoustic equipment, etc.) that is not attached or applied

to a lure. ► Stocking of any live fish, live fish eggs, live amphibians or other live aquatic organisms into any waters of the state is illegal except with the appropriate license or permit issued by the

Game and Fish director. ► Transportation of any live fish, live fish eggs, live amphibians

or other live aquatic organisms is illegal.

Fish may be filleted for transport, unless size limits apply, under the following conditions:

► Each individual portion of the meat removed from a fish is considered a fillet.

▶ Two fillets are counted as one fish.

► The packaging of fish must be done in a manner so that the fillets can be readily separated and counted. If fillets are frozen, they must be packaged so that the fillets are separated and thus can be easily counted without thawing.

► Gifted fish, including packages of fish, must be accompanied with the following information from the individual gifting the fish: name, fishing license number, phone number, date, species and number of fish gifted.

► Except for legally gifted fish, it is illegal to possess or transport another individual's game fish or parts thereof without the license holder accompanying or as otherwise permitted.

Dodgers promise a 'electric' atmosphere at COVID-delayed All-Star game

Los Angeles ajor League Baseball's All-Star game returns to Los Angeles in July after being delayed by the COVID-19 pandemic and officials on Tuesday vowed to make up for lost time by putting on an unforgettable show.

Los Angeles last hosted the game in 1980 and the event has grown quite a bit since then.

It now encompasses nearly a week of activities including yoga, a beach clean up and batting cages in Santa Monica July 15-17, a celebrity softball game, concert and MLB draft on July 17, the Home Run Derby on July 18 and the 92nd All-Star Game on July 19.

"This city is going to be electric, it's going to be hot and happening," Gil Cedillo, a member of the Los Angeles City Council who represents the district Dodger Stadium is in, said at a news conference at the ballpark.

"As we move out of this pandemic we're going to move forward with great optimism and faith because we want to put this pandemic behind us. We want to welcome the nation and show them the great city of Los Angeles."

The game, which pits the best players from the National and American leagues against each other, was originally scheduled to be held at Dodger Stadium in July 2020 but was postponed due to the pandemic.

Last year's edition was held at Coors Field in Colorado.

"We are the city of big events and big parties, and that's what we're going to have in July," said Dodgers president Stan Kasten.

"It has been a long time coming, but it will be worth the wait."

Dodgers pitcher Clayton Kershaw said he wants to be named to his ninth All-Star game, which appears likely given the fan-favorite's stellar 3-0 start to the season.

"I hope I make it because it'll be fun," said Kershaw, who became the Dodgers' all-time strikeout leader last weekend.

"This is such a great place to play and I think everybody knows that. All the road teams say what a great place Dodger stadium is and we're excited to share it."

Phil Mickelson stunned the sports world last May by winning the PGA Championship at age 50, becoming the oldest player to win a major championship.

Since then, he has been steeped in controversy because of derisive comments he made to Golf Digest and the Fire Pit Collective about the PGA Tour and the Saudi Arabian regime bankrolling a rival golf league.

Mickelson skipped the Masters in April, and, although he's officially registered to play in the PGA Championship on May 19-22 at Southern Hills in Tulsa, Okla., there's no guarantee he'll be there.

- Q: Do you think Phil will show up and play at Southern Hills?

- Harig: It's rare, but it's happened before. One instance that comes to mind is when Tiger [Woods] won the PGA at Southern Hills in 2007 and then didn't play in '08 because he was out with knee surgery.

The PGA was in August then. We knew for months that Tiger wasn't going to play because immediately after the U.S. Open he had surgery and they

told us he'd be out for the year. Q: You've covered golf for a long time. What's something about the book that might

surprise people? - Harig: Phil was Tiger before Tiger. If you're a certain age, you might not realize how great Phil was as a young player. He was every bit as heralded as Tiger as a young kid. Tiger ended up getting more attention because he won all those U.S. Amateurs and he was a phenomenon. His dad was kind of a bombastic figure, and Phil's dad was in the background. But if you took their amateur records and put them in front of somebody, and that person didn't know who they were or what they did as pros, you might say that Phil would have

Carnitas slightly crispy and totally delicious

f you are looking for an easy, yet delicious dinner idea to

celebrate Cinco de Mayo this week, my Slow Cooker Pork Carnitas are the perfect choice for a weeknight fiesta. Packed with a savory blend of citrus and spice flavors, these pork carnitas are fall-apart tender and yet still delightfully crispy on the edges. It is a

good thing they are easy to make, because they have become a crave-worthy favorite in our nome.

Until I started my home bakery business, SarahBakes, I had only used my slow cooker to keep dishes warm while entertaining. But, when faced with the challenge of producing dinner for my family while the oven was tied up with baked goods, I finally succumbed to the temptation of easy cooking and have zero regrets about it. Now, on busy baking days, I can simply pop a piece of meat into my slow cooker at noon and forget

about it until dinnertime. Slow cooking is a terrific

way to transform inexpensive, tougher cuts of meat into a dish that is mouthwateringly succulent — and affordable. I used a nearly 3-pound, bone-in pork shoulder roast for this recipe, which I found at Hornbacher's last week for just \$1.79 per pound. Round out that bill with one orange, onion

and jalapeno pepper, two limes, five garlic cloves, so chicken stock (or even just water) and a sprinkling of pantry spices, and this humble dish can easily feed a family of four for about \$10.

The prep for this recipe is simple. First, I rinse the roast and pat it dry with a paper towel so that the spices will adhere to its surface. I will trim the top layer of fat if it is thicker than half an inch, but I rarely have to.

SLOW COOKER PORK CARNITAS

Serves: 4 to 6

Ingredients:

3 pounds bone-in pork shoulder, or 2 ½ pounds boneless

Kosher salt and black pepper

2 teaspoons dried oregano

1 teaspoon ground cumin 1 teaspoon chili powder

1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper 1 medium yellow onion, sliced

1 jalapeno pepper, coarsely chopped

5 cloves garlic, coarsely chopped 1/4 cup fresh lime juice (about 2 limes)

1 orange, zested and juiced

1 ½ cups chicken broth or water

Directions:

Pat the pork roast dry and season generously with salt and pepper on all sides; set aside. In a small bowl, combine the oregano, cumin, chili powder and cayenne pepper; set aside. Place the onion, jalapeno and garlic in the bottom of the slow cooker. Add the pork roast and rub half of the spice mixture over the top and sides. Turn the roast over and repeat with the remaining spices. Turn the roast over again until evenly coated. Add the lime juice, orange zest and juice, and chicken broth. The liquid should come up to the top inch of the pork, so add more broth or water if needed, but not enough to submerge the roast. Cover the crock pot and cook on high for 4 to 5 hours or on low for 7 to 8 hours, until the meat is very tender and easy to pull apart. If the liquid appears to be reducing too much, add more broth or water by the quarter-cup as needed.

Preheat the oven broiler to high heat and line a baking sheet with aluminum foil. Remove the pork roast from the pot and place it on the baking sheet, reserving the juices in the

Use 2 forks to pull the meat into shreds and discard the bone if present. Spread the shredded meat out on the baking sheet in an even layer. Place the baking sheet under the broiler for 5 minutes until the edges of the pork start to brown and become crispy. Remove the pork from the oven and pour 1/4 cup of the reserved liquid over the shredded meat, tossing with tongs to evenly coat.

Return the pork to the broiler for 5 minutes and repeat this process. After adding the second 1/4 cup of the liquid, broil for another 3 minutes and then remove from the oven and transfer the pork to a serving dish. Add another ½ cup of the reserved juices and toss

Serve immediately in tacos, sandwiches and salads, or atop a crispy tostada. The cooked pork can be refrigerated for up to 3 days, or frozen for up to 3 months. The reserved juices can also be refrigerated for several days or frozen for later use.

Next, I generously season the entire roast with kosher salt and fresh black pepper, and then I prepare the aromatics. I cut the onion in half and then cut each half into half-inch slices, and I only rough-chop the jalapeno and garlic cloves so that they will infuse, but not overpower, the pork with flavor. I fill the bottom of my slow cooker first with the cut veggies, and then I place the seasoned pork roast on top.

For the spices, I use a blend of dried oregano, chili powder, ground cumin and cayenne pepper. To ensure that no spice is left behind, I wait until the roast is in the pot before adding the spice rub. Once the roast is coated in the mixture, I add the juice and zest from the orange, but just the juice of the limes as the zest can turn the meat bitter. Finally, I add enough

chicken stock (or water) to fill the pot up to the top inch of the roast, and then I cover the pot, turn the slow cooker on and walk away. These pork carnitas will cook on high for about four to five hours, and on low heat for eight to 10

As Margraten set out to hold a 75th anniversary celebration in honor of Dutch liberation in 2019 and 2020, cemetery volunteers reached out to Americans to search for photos to put alongside their gravestones.

And boy did American genealogy nuts in North Dakota and Minnesota come through! Of the dozens of men on the list, there are now only seven Minnesotans buried at Margraten without photos and one North Dakotan. See the bottom of this story for the names still in need of photos at graves in the Netherlands. Many have been the subjects of extensive searches, but hope is still alive that someone out there might

Flood forecasting numbers always create some confusion

By John Wheeler

FARGO — Whenever the rivers rise enough to make the news, the river stages cause confusion. Where do these numbers come from? Here is a primer. At older river measuring points, zero feet was the bottom of the river. If the level of the river today is 14 feet higher than zero, then the stage is 14 feet. However, river bottoms shift with the current over time, so this number is not necessarily the depth of the river. Instead, it's just an arbitrarily chosen,

fixed point.

WEATHER TALK

At some level higher than zero, where minor flooding starts to occur, is the flood stage for each location. Flood forecasts are given for the heights the river is expected to rise above the flood stage. In more recent years, newer river points were given heights relative to sea level, but this caused all kinds of confusion, so they dropped the first digit or two. One can never compare one river point to another.





ruffed dummy's last heart. LAST CLUB

gotten rid of."

Declarer then led a club. When Cy took the king, he had only spades left to lead, and South ruffed in dummy and threw his

last club. Making five.

When South led a club to his ace, Cy should have been wary; clearly, South didn't hold the A-Q. If Cy gets rid of his king of clubs, he avoids the impending end play. East will score his ten and queen for down one

BRIDGE

DAILY QUESTION You hold: ♠ 5 ♥ K 7 5 2 ♦ A Q 8 5 ♣ J 9 6 3. Your partner opens one spade, you bid 1NT, he rebids two spades and you (perhaps questionably) try 2NT. Partner bids three diamonds. What do you say?

ANSWER: Partner suggests six spades, four diamonds and minimum opening strength. If he held a stronger hand with that pattern, his second bid would have been two diamonds or three spades. Pass. Your chances of making any game are poor at best.


