JCC to offer transitional kindergarten

Jackson County Central schools will offer transitional kindergarten in the fall

Transitional kindergarten serves as a bridge between preschool and kindergarten

and seeks to provide students with the opportunity to develop fundamen-Kim Meyer tal skills needed for

success in a developmentally appropriate setting. The JCC Board of Education unanimously approved offering transitional kindergarten this fall at its meeting Monday evening in Jackson.

Kim Meyer, principal of Riverside Elementary School, said the concept is one that has been discussed for a few years now.

"Talking with staff and looking at research, it's a good thing," she said.

Transitional kindergarten will be open to students enrolled in kindergarten with May 1 to Sept. 1 birthdays, which make them the

youngest children in the grade. The curriculum will focus on state kindergarten standards and transitional kindergarten components, Meyer said, incorporating social-emotional learning.

"Families may choose transitional kindergarten for various reasons, whether it is for academic or social-emotional support or a combination of both," she said. "Transitional kindergarten curriculum allows each student to learn and develop at their own pace and in ways that lay a foundation for success as they continue their educational journey.'

Meyer said school officials gauged parental interest in transitional kindergarten during recent preschool open houses and kindergarten roundup and were surprised.

"We have 24 families interested and 15 to 16 on board," Meyer said, adding she envisions capping enrollment in the inaugural transitional kindergarten class at between 16 and 18 students.

"We were surprised to see that much interest,' said Barry Schmidt, superintendent of schools at


