Renville County poised to approve sales tax

OLIVIA — The Renville County Board of Commissioners is expected to approve a local option sales tax at its next meeting.

The commissioners indicated their support for the proposal after hosting a public hearing on it at their meeting

The commissioners since last spring have been discussing the possibility of a local option sales tax to raise funds for road improvements. During those discussions, they have indicated that they were hoping to hear public comments on the idea before acting on it.

The public hearing provided no such opportunity. There were no members of the public present at the meeting or online to offer comments.

Board Chair Randy Kramer and commissioners indicated that they have heard some comments from constituents during casual conversations, but the issue has apparently not generated any strong sentiments.

The chair noted that the comments he has heard generally were along the lines of while people did not want a new tax, they realized the need and desired to see roads improved.

That's exactly what is intended.

The resolution the commissioners plan to adopt will specify that revenues raised by the local option sales tax will be dedicated toward reconstructing a nine-mile stretch of County Road 11 between its intersections with County Road 6 north of Renville and U.S. Highway 71 north of Olivia. The road is an important east-west artery for moving

ST. PAUL — Several Minnesota state lawmakers vying for re-election on Tuesday, Aug. 9, bucked challenges from more extreme members of their political parties to advance to the general election.

A pair of Republican senators hoping to return to the Legislature came out ahead in Tuesday's primary elections after they lost local endorsing contests to anti-establishment candidates backed by Action 4 Liberty.
