Primary election to decide county commissioner and U.S. Rep. vacancy

Four commissioner candidates vying for spot on General Election ballot

Local voters will have a chance to select two candidates for Le Sueur County 4th District Commissioner race and vote for the U.S. Representative District 1 vacancy during the Tuesday, August 9 special primary election.

Four individuals are running for the commissioner seat, which has been filled for the last 10 years by Lance Wetzel. Wetzel, along with Le Center residents Nathan Hintz. Bob Emmers, and David Priesler will be on the primary ballot. The top two vote getters will be placed on the November 8 general election ballot

Le Sueur County District 4 includes the cities of Kilkenny, Le Center, and Waterville and Cordova, Kilkenny, and Waterville **Townships**

The other special election race will be for the U.S. Representative District 1 office which will fill the office which had been held by Jim Hagedorn, who passed away earlier this year.

Twenty candidates filed for this office and there was a May 24 primary held, which trimmed the 20 candidates down to four.

The four are Haroun McClellan (Grassroots-Legalize Cannabis Party), Richard B. Reisdorf (Legal Marijuana Now Party), Brad Finstad (Republican Party), and Jeff Ettinger (DFL Party).

The winner of this special election will fill the vacancy in term expiring January 3, 2023.

This is where things get a bit confusing for Le Sueur County residents. After spending many years in Congressional District 1, starting with the November election, Le Sueur County residents and a portion of Rice County residents will now be included in Congressional District 2.

District 2 will include all of Dakota County, all of Le Sueur County, all of Scott County, portions of Washington County, and a handful of townships and cities in Rice County including Morristown Township, the City of Morristown, Lonsdale, Dundas, Northfield, and Shieldsville Township.

The candidates for Congressional District 2 will be Angie Craig (DFL), Tyler Kistner (Rep), and Paula Overby (Legal Marijuana Now Party)



ballot will be a vote for one political party only for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, and Attorney General.

Indians, Morries advance to Regions

After a long weekend battling the elements, both the Waterville Indians and 11-2 on Saturday, July 30 to advance Morristown Morries amateur baseball teams have advanced to the Region 6C Playoffs.

These two teams have advanced to The final portion of the Regions four straight years. Both advanced to Class C State in 2019, with Waterville placing second at Regions and Morristown placing third.

Waterville defeated Wells for the third

13-60 League Tournament Championship, downing the Wildcats, 13-3 in seven innings.

Morristown knocked off Janesville, to Regions. In a seeding game Sunday, Minnesota Lake defeated the Morries, 6-1

The top four teams from the 13-60 League and the River Valley League will make up the 8-team Region 6C Tourney. Waterville will host fours games on Saturday, Aug. 6 and four more on August 7. The final four games will be played in time this season Sunday, July 31 for the Belle Plaine Saturday, Aug. 13. The top

three teams will advance to the Class C State Tournament, which will be held in Dundas, Faribault, and Miesville.

Morristown will start the Regions with an 11 a.m. game Saturday, August 6 against No. 1 seed Jordan. Waterville, the No. 2 overall seed, will play St. Peter at 7 p.m. Saturday. Both teams will play Sunday, August 7 regardless of how they do in the opening round. Morristown will play at 11 a.m. if they lose to Jordan or 4:30 p.m. if they defeat the Brewers. Waterville will play at 1:30 p.m. if they lose or 7 p.m. if they defeat St. Peter.
