n hour before the doors opened for the College of St. Scholastica's first ever on-campus drag show, organizer and host Tom Henry, also known as Princess Buttercream, took a moment to reflect on the long history that led up to this performance. Buttercream and her fellow drag queens were hastily preparing to take the stage of the St. Scholastica theater Monday evening in the "Drag Invasion" show put on in conjunction with Zenith City Horror. "This is a very momentous occasion for the Twin Ports queer community because St. Scholastica has definitely had their run-ins with us over the years," Henry said. "The Main Club, where most of us do our shows, was started by a gay man who was fired from St. Scholastica. So we have that history.' Henry, a nursing major in their final semester on campus, has been trying to get a drag show on the campus for two years.
