Stafford, Kupp come back on the Bengals for first L.A. Super Bowl title

Inglewood, Calif. hroughout their all-in boom-or-bust season, Rams coach Sean McVay and his players stuck with a common refrain.

During winning and losing streaks, after comeback victories and embarrassing defeats, they opined that they were authoring their own story, and they intended to finish with a flourish.

On Sunday, in Super Bowl LVI they penned the final chapter.

And it was a pulsating finish.

That trend continued Sunday afternoon as McGhee scored a game-high 22 points to lead the Dragons to a 77-63 victory against Minnesota-Crookston in Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference men's basketball at Alex Nemzek Fieldhouse.

McGhee has scored at least 12 points in nine consecutive games.

"Ever since Christmas he has just played very consistently," Dragons head coach Chad Walthall said. "I don't know what it is, but we're a better team when he's playing well on both ends.'
