Joseph Langen By Odin Langen "Our Northwest Corner – 1976" (red book)

In 1905, Joseph Langen came from Rosos, Norway, at the age of 18. He made his home at John Long's; his first years here were spent as a hired hand on several of the neighboring farms. He also worked one year on a "Company" farm, the "31 Farm," owned by L. H. Kaste of Minneapolis, which he later purchased.

It is now significant that we meet another family, the S. P. Almquists. They originated in Smaland, Sweden, and homesteaded about 3 1/2 miles north of Kennedy where they lived for several years. Mr. Almquist was one of the early school board members of the Kennedy School Board at the time the "old" school house was built. Later they bought a farm from a Mr. and Mrs. Olson who had homesteaded there. The Almquists had one daughter, Selma. Thus it seemed providence had arranged that Joe Langen and Selma Almquist be close neighbors. A romance blossomed, and they were married on July 2, 1911. So bear the Langen name in Kittson County. They became immediate farmers because of a freak accident, which claimed the life of S. P. Almquist, while he was giving medication to a horse.

Joe and Selma operated this farm until 1919 when they bought the north half of Section 31 in Skane Township. This was the original headquarters of the "31 Farm," which they operated until their retirement in 1951 when they moved to Hallock.

During the 32-year period, they struggled with all the problems that confronted everybody, particularly the farmer. This, included the Depression, grasshoppers, drought and almost nonexistent farm prices. Somehow, their determination brought them through all these adversities while raising a family of four children. Joe served for a short time as treasurer of the Skane Town Board.

While the farm and family were his prime interests, he found diversity and relax-

ation as a sports enthusiast. His attention was directed to all sports with emphasis on boxing and wrestling. He maintained a miniature amateur gym at home which had punching bags, Indian clubs, dumbbells, wrestling mats, etc. This characterized him as an authority on boxing and wrestling, so he refereed most such events in Kennedy during the Nels Gravgaard era. Nels promoted and participated in many boxing and wrestling matches in the old town hall in Kennedy in the 1920s. During the winter, Nels would run 5 ½ miles out to the Langen farm to train with Joe, then run back again to town. This sports enthusiasm has prevailed throughout the Langen history. His grandsons, Wayne and Lynden, have established some prominence in Kittson County and in college as baseball and basketball players, and is presently being continued by his great-grandsons.
Joe and Selma spent their

remaining years in Hallock where Selma died in 1965. Joe spent his last four winters in St. Petersburg, Fla., and then moved to the rest home at Hillsboro, N.D., where he passed away in 1971.

The Langens had four children. Percy, voungest. after having served his hitch in the Army, in the Japanese theatre, was discharged as staff sergeant and returned to Kittson County and married Della Swanson. They farmed the years. At this time tragedy struck with Percy's unexpected demise in the fall of

Amy, the next youngest, following high school, pursued the medical field. She served as a doctor's receptionist in Stephen and Grand Forks, and St. Michael's Hospital in Grand Forks.

married She then Howard Knudsvig from Buxton, N.D., in 1946. They still reside there operating a funeral home and a hardware store.

Elphie became a secretary following business college, then married a young attorney, George Sorlie, also from Buxton. They have since established the Sorlie Law Firm in Hillsboro. Elphie still works as a legal secretary in her husband's

Odin, the oldest, began farming in 1935 on his grandmother's farm.

Do you qualify for Social Security spouse's benefits?

Social Security benefits are a crucial part of millions of Americans' retirement income. If you don't have enough Social Security credits to qualify for benefits on your own record, you may be able to receive benefits on your spouse's record.

To qualify for spouse's benefits, you must be one of the following:

• 62 years of age or

· Any age and have in your care a child younger than age 16, or who has a disability and is entitled to receive benefits on your spouse's record.

Your full spouse's benefit could be up to one-half the amount your spouse is entitled to receive at their full retirement age. If you choose to receive your spouse's benefits before you reach full retirement age, you will get a permanently reduced benefit.

If you wait until you reach full retirement age to receive benefits, you'll receive your full spouse's benefit amount, which is up to one-half the amount your spouse can receive. You'll also get your full spouse's benefit if you are under full retirement age, but care for a child and one of the following applies:

The child is younger than age 16.

The child has a disability and is entitled to receive benefits on your spouse's

Kittson County

If you're eligible to receive retirement benefits on your own record, we will pay that amount first. If your benefits as a spouse are higher than your own retirement benefits, you will get a combination of benefits that equal the higher spouse benefit.

For example, Sandy qualifies for a retirement benefit of \$1,000 and a spouse's benefit of \$1,250. At her full retirement age, she will receive her own \$1,000 retirement benefit. We will add \$250 from her spouse's benefit, for a total of \$1,250.

Want to apply for either our or your spouse's benefits? Are you at least 61 years and nine months old? If you answered yes to both, visit www.ssa.gov/benefits/retirement to get start-

Are you divorced from a marriage that lasted at least 10 years? You may be able to get benefits on your former spouse's record. You can find out more by visiting www.ssa.gov/planners/ retire/divspouse.html more information.
